Dear Mr. President:

We, the undersigned members of the Nonprofit Mailers Federation, recognize that you have been trying to shrink the federal deficit by reducing spending for social programs, among others. We wanted you to know that nonprofit mailers have done their share. Further cuts of funds that underwrite nonprofit mail rates would force private sector charities to curb services and fire employees.

Unemployment at depression levels has caused demand for charitable services to soar. Higher postal rates will only mean fewer people served. Higher rates will also threaten the employment of five million or more workers for nonprofit organizations. In addition, at least another two million are employed by profitmaking firms which serve nonprofit organizations.

Last October, you justified deep cuts in federal spending for social services by shifting the burden to private sector organizations. You said at the time: "Now, we're not advocating private initiatives and voluntary activities as a halfhearted replacement for budget cuts."

Mr. President, to be an earnest replacement for budget cuts, we need postal rate stability.

We support your social policy to shift more responsibility to the private sector because we do feel the private sector provides services more efficiently than the government.

In order for your social policy to succeed, we urge you to adopt a policy to stabilize nonprofit mail rates in your budget for fiscal year 1984.

Dear Mr. President:

We, the staff of the American Kidney Fund would like to bring to your attention a matter of utmost importance. We are one of the thousands of charities that rely on direct mail solicitation to raise funds to support our life saving services.

As you may or may not know, the American Kidney Fund provides direct financial assistance to needy kidney patients throughout the United States, who can't afford the cost of their treatment related necessities not covered by any other source; including Medicare. We help with costs such as transportation to and from treatments, medications, special diet needs, home dialysis supplies and other necessities.

We rely on direct mail solicitation to support 93 percent of our budget. The additional increase in our postage cost that would result from a decrease in the appropriation to revenue forgone will severly curtail our ability to help those in need.

As a result of the January, 1982 increase in 3rd class non-profit postal rates, a patient that was placed on our waiting list for assistance died. Money budgeted for direct financial assistance had to be diverted to pay for increased postage. Had the American Kidney Fund been able to provide the requested funds for her transportation to treatment, the patient would be alive today.

With anticipated increases in gas prices resulting from the gasoline tax pending in Congress, demand for transportation assistance will soar. At the same time, the American Kidney Fund will be forced to dig further in its program budget to pay postage. The bottom line will mean less money available to help needy kidney patients and more premature deaths.

We urge you, Mr. President, to support full finding for revenue forgone. We feel that money appropriated for revenue forgone is not a subsidy but a minimal investment to help the private sector fill holes in the safety net.

We at the American Kidney Fund want to continue to provide our life saving services to desperate kidney patients, but we need your help.

## ARTICLES OF INCORPOPATION OF NONPROFIT MAILERS FEDERATION

To the Recorder of Deeds, D.C. Washington, D.C.

THIRD: This corporation is not organized for the pecuniary profit of its directors, officers, or members; nor may it issue stock nor declare nor distribute dividends, and no part of its net income shall inure to the benefit of any director, officer or member; and any balance of money or assets remaining after the full payment of corporate obligations of all and any kinds shall be devoted solely to the charitable, educational and benevolent purposes of the corporation.

The purposes of this corporation shall be:

- (a) to promote goodwill and cooperation between cultural, humanitarian, religious, scientific, educational, and recreational nonprofit organizations which communicate with contributors, subscribers, registrants or the public through direct mail;
- (b) to associate, together with direct mail marketing experts and suppliers, for their mutual benefit in order to foster public understanding and appreciation of eleemosynary institutions and to aid in the furtherance of their legitimate interests as nonprofit organizations;
- (c) to create and maintain a compact, representative, and centralized agency for concerted action upon all matters affecting the welfare and betterment of nonprofit organizations;
- (d) to promote, foster, and encourage, by the preparation and distribution of literature, pamphlets and otherwise, the sentiment and belief that nonprofit organizations provide an invaluable public service, to encourage public policy that facilitates this understanding, and to reduce unjust legislation; and
- (e) to distribute reliable information about members and their legitimate interests and to represent them and their interests in common in state and federal agencies and before the public.

The corporation shall have in furtherance of the aforesaid purposes all of the powers conferred upon corporations organized pursuant to the provisions of the District of Columbia Nonprofit Corporation Act.
