Dear Reverend Bridges:

Thank you for your letter of July 16 regarding the article in the <u>Baptist Press</u> headlined "McAteer Backed by White House".

You asked if the article were accurate. It is not.

Ed McAteer was not in communication with anyone at the White House respecting the particulars of the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans.

Ed has been for years a strong supporter of restoring voluntary school prayer which the Supreme Court has outlawed, reversing 170 years of previous legality. He was one of those invited to the White House on the National Day of Prayer, May 6, when the President announced his intention to propose a constitutional amendment to restore voluntary school prayer.

At that event, Ed warmly predicted to me that the New Orleans convention would endorse the President's proposed amendment. Many others present also told me they were supporting the President's proposal. As was entirely appropriate, I thanked each cordially.

The article you sent me is both wrong and misleading. Although my wife is a Southern Baptist, she did not attend the convention. I did not know the process by which the convention considered resolutions nor did I know what action, if any, Ed, or any other person intended to take at the convention. Aside from Ed's prediction, the next information I received regarding that convention was the Washington Post story reporting that the convention had endorsed the President's proposed amendment by a three to one margin.

In sum, neither I nor anyone else at the White House asked anyone to take any action regarding the New Orleans convention. Nor did we have any knowledge of events there until after the fact.

The role of the Office of Public Liaison is to facilitate communications regarding public policy between the Administration and organized groups. We have sent leaders of all major interested groups information regarding the proposed amendment. Enclosed is one of our packets on this subject. As soon as it is printed, I will send you a White House Issue Update on this topic which has been prepared for Administration spokesmen.

Public opinion polls indicate 75% of Americans favor restoring voluntary school prayer. The amendment enjoys significant support from a broad variety of religious leaders such as Dr. Adrian Rogers. Secular groups such as the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars have for years at their national conventions called for the kind of remedy the President has proposed. It is our hope that the Congress will act on this amendment this year and that the states will promptly ratify it.

Again, thank you for this opportunity to correct the error in the article which raised your concern.

McAteer backed by White House

WASHINGTON (BP) — An aide to President Reagan has confirmed that New Right leader Edward E. McAteer received White House encouragement to work for Southern Baptist Convention support of a constitutional amendment on school prayer.

Morton C. Blackwell, special assistant to the President, told Baptist Press that he and McAteer confer regularly and consulted before the New Orleans meeting. During that conversation, Blackwell said, McAteer predicted the SBC would endorse the prayer amendment.

Blackwell, whose primary duty is to line up support for Reagan policies as White House liaison to Christian and other religious groups and to conservative political organizations, told Baptist Press; "I thanked him very cordially."

In an interview immediately following the convention, McAteer told Baptist Press that a White House official, presumably Blackwell, called him two weeks before the New Orleans meeting, asking him if the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs would seek a resolution opposing the amendment and, if it did, to help deliver a resolution of support.

McAteer is founder and president of Religious Roundtable, an organization formed three years ago to work for New Right causes and support the candidacy of Ronald Reagan for president. The Southern Baptist layman, a member of Bellevue Baptist Church, Memphis, claims credit for recruiting prominent preachers, including Jerry Falwell, to New Right politics.

During his post-convention interview, McAteer declared of the resolution supporting the prayer amendment, "God intervened here today."
