

Here, at long last, is my research paper on pro-life timing and strategy.

I sincerely hope you will have the time to peruse it, as it presents the complete argument for my thesis that the time remaining to the pro-life movement is very brief.

Let me say again that the matter of abortion is of the greatest pertinence to Mr. Reagan's presidency. Abortion is not just a moral problem, not just a social problem. Like slavery, abortion is a great crack in our nation's foundation of liberty and justice for all.

I personally doubt that our economic woes will cease as long as this open killing continues.

Dear Craig,

Over five months have elapsed since Carl Karcher, Mike Elliott, and I met with you at the Century Plaza Hotel, but the impact of that occasion has remained fresh in my thoughts. At that time I promised you copies of the charts I presented on pro-life timing and strategy, together with written information covering the key points.

Preparing this material developed into a rather time-consuming project. But the information is now ready for release, so I am sending you under separate cover a set of 14 slides and a cassette tape containing the narrative material. I will also send you a copy of my research paper, when reproduction is complete.

I am also sending copies of this information to key prolife people in Washington, such as Henry Hyde and Dr. Koop.

When you review the data, I think you will agree that the time remaining to the pro-life movement is very short. Although the Hatch Amendment is now moving through Congress, there is considerable doubt as to whether it will make it. If it fails, we will have to start all over. Meanwhile, over 3,000 babies a day are dying at the hands of abortionists.

I still firmly believe that a Presidential Proclamation is an essential step in the solution, even as it was during Lincoln's presidency. The Proclamation of Personhood does not conflict with other approaches. In fact it fits hand and glove with proposals such as the various amendments and the Human Life Bill.

Have you had opportunity to present my letter to Mr. Reagan? Is he considering the idea? I still strongly urge for him the same briefing we gave you, not because he isn't pro-life, but because he should see firsthand how urgent the problem is.

Please give me your comments on the strategy and timing presentation I am forwarding, and feel free to share it with anyone else.

As requested, here is a synopsis of results of a poll on abortion attitudes conducted by Yankelovich, Skelly and White for LIFE magazine as reported in the November, 1981 issue of LIFE.

The poll sample numbered 1,015 women for all sections of the U.S. and the error margin was put at roughly 3%.

While opinions vary by region, income group, religion, race and age, one significant consensus is clear: not one major grouping--including the most politically conservative--believes a woman should be legally denied the right to choose to have an abortion if she determines the procedure is necessary.

Put more specifically:

- 56% of the women polled agree the procedure is "morally wrong."
- 67% believe no legal obstacle should be placed in a woman's way once she's decided an abortion is necessary.
- 60% state flatly they oppose the congressional effort to declare the moment of conception as beginning of life and to extend the legal status to the fetus.
- 92% favor abortion when the woman's life is at risk.

Breaking these figures down further:

- Demographically, support for legal abortion drops to 61% among Catholic women, to 62% among women age 55 years and over, and 55% among women who've had 4 or more children. Meanwhile, 80% of all non-white women support abortion.
- Geographically, 54% of women in rural America support abortion, 71% of women living in central cities support abortion. Regionally, pro-choice sentiment runs highest, 75%, in the West.
- Two out of three pro-choice advocates also favor passage of the ERA, but this isn't a reliable guide to the abortion issue since 45% of women who oppose abortion would like to see ERA become law anyway.
- 62% of women who call themselves politically "conservative" favor legal abortion.
- Opposit swells when the question comes down to using government funds to pay for abortion. But, 75% of the women are willing to support public funding if the need for abortion results from rape or incest.

Dear Mr. Deaver,

We are very concerned about the lack of a coordinated strategy to accomplish the September Budget reduction recommended by President Reagan.

We do not believe that efforts on an amendment by amendment, appropriation by appropriation bill basis will be successful to accomplish in total any where near the President's Budget figures.

We request a meeting to discuss a strategy to accomplish the President's Budget in connection with the FY 82 Second Continuing Resolution which must be acted on by the Congress before November 20th.

The discussion would cover provisions in the Second Continuing Resolution which would prohibit spending at a rate greater than the levels recommended by President Reagan in September. This would accomplish the goals of many of the undersigned groups such as the elimination of The Legal Services Corporation and reduction of funds for Title 10.

Because of the time frame we request that this meeting occur on Tuesday or Wednesday, November 10 or 11. In this regard, please have someone contact Mrs. Helen Gombert, secretary to Mr. Howard Phillips of The Conservative Caucus, (281-6782), to advise us when this would be possible.

We are ready and willing to fight for the President's September Budget request as we did on Gramm/Latta I and II and Conable-Hance, but we must be clear in the approach to this effort.

TAPING: MESSAGE FOR RIGHT TO LIFE CONVENTION Monday, July 12, 1982

Last year there were more than one and one half million abortions in America. This is a great moral evil and an assault on the sacredness of human life.

No one in America is more sensitive to this enormous tragedy and no one in America has done more to put a stop to it than those of you attending this Right to Life Convention. It is you who have attempted to protect the helpless and speak for the unborn; you have carried the burden and fought the good fight. For this, God will bless you, and for this, millions of Americans, myself included, thank you.

But now -- as Congress approaches the three quarter mark in its current session -- you deserve much more than thanks or mere verbal support. And certainly the hundreds of thousands and perhaps millions of unborn children who face extinction this year deserve much more than words -- they deserve to have their right to life fully protected by law. The time has come for Congress to face the national tragedy of abortion -- to fully discuss and debate on the House and Senate floor the heartbreaking dimensions of this tragedy. The time has also come for Congress to act -- to pass human life legislation.

Those of you who supported anti-abortion candidates in the 1980 election -- and those of us who as candidates actively spoke out against abortion -- cannot be accused of being irresponsible or overly zealous in our pursuit of human life legislation. We

have been patient and realistic. Last year we understood that past national policies had headed our country well down the road to economic disaster. We knew we had to deal with this momentous problem; we did so with urgency and effectiveness. I know that many of you supported and worked hard for this Administration's program for economic recovery.

But as I said a few months after taking office -- and in the midst of our attempts to change our economic policy -- this Administration does not and will not have separate agendas -- one for economic matters, one for the so-called "social" issues. Our concern is to make America healthy: economically, morally, in every way. Abortion is an inescapable national dilemma. It is a problem that cannot wait; it must be confronted.

The abortion tragedy is after all one of the greatest moral -- and potentially one of the most divisive -- issues to ever face this country. As history shows in the case of other such great issues, those men and women in public life who attempt to ignore them are only causing a deeper disarray in our national life and increasing the potential for disunity and disruption.

Like the Dred Scott decision, the Supreme Court's ruling that legalized abortion will continue to have a profound and painful impact on our Nation until it is properly addressed by the people through their elected representatives. Only the other day, a federal judge in Connecticut reopened the whole legal debate on this matter when he ruled that a fetus had civil rights including the right to sue an alleged attacker. Recently, a report by the Senate Judiciary Committee emphasized the far reaching impact of the abortion tragedy by concluding that the

effect of the U.S. Supreme Court decisions has been to legalize abortion right up until the moment of birth.

And only a few months ago . . . many of us read of a child in Bloomington, Indiana permitted by the courts to die only because he was handicapped.

As George Will would write in an emotional but carefully reasoned -- and I might add unforgettable -- essay, the freedom to do away with inconvenient life is now being extended -- just as those of us who are part of the Right to Life movement predicted -- beyond fetal life to entirely new categories of life.

But the truth is: moral evil knows no categories, it can never be carefully managed or easily controlled. If allowed to prosper, it grows and expands; it infects the body politic and eats away at the heart of a Nation. And it hurts the people — their moral vigor, our national stamina.

That is why the House and Senate must deal with the abortion issue. Major human life measures such as Senator Helm's Human Life Bill, Senator Hatch's Human Life Federalism Amendment and Senator Hatfield's Abortion Funding Restriction Bill deserve full consideration by the Senate this session. Believe me, in all of this, I share your sense of urgency.

You know, it has always puzzled me that those who favor abortion will argue that because a child is not old enough or perfect enough or wanted enough that it is an act of kindness to deny him or her the chance of life.

C.S. Lewis once wrote that "love is something more stern and splendid than mere kindness." This is a critical insight into

the present debate over abortion and it is something of what I meant when I wrote to George Will about his column on that child in Bloomington -- a column in which George mentioned his own handicapped son, Jonathan.

"Jonathan is indeed fortunate," I wrote, "that God has chosen the Wills for his parents; and, as I see from your column, the Wills are even more fortunate that God has given them Jonathan."

This is the heart of the matter. The world is not ours to superintend -- nor is innocent life ours to dispense with or terminate. Those decisions belong to another -- another to whom the mystery of evil and suffering in our world is fully comprehensible and who counts our resignation in these matters to our credit. It is his guidance we seek now and in all of our future efforts.

Obviously, the days ahead will be important ones in the struggle for human life legislation. And what you do during the next few days will be vital to the success of our efforts in this great cause. I want you to know that you have my wholehearted support and my fervent prayers for your success. Have a good convention and God bless you.

SUBJECT:

Issue Update on Right-to-Life

I discussed with Bill Gribben the idea of an issue update on right-to-life. He believes that the issue is such that plowing new ground or attempting a projection of the President's views based on past statements is inopportune.

Gribben suggests that an issue update on right-to-life should consist of a summary of the President's major statements on this topic. I concur.

I think an issue update could begin with an introductory section which simply states that, because there are currently at least three remedies being proposed to the tragedy of abortion, leaders of most major pro-life organizations have encouraged the President not to express preferences for one remedy over the others.

However, the introductory statement could continue, this is a major public issue and one on which the President has strong views. Therefore we are supplying an updated summary of major statements and positions of the President on the abortion question.

Ed, Doug Martin of my staff has obtained all of the source materials suggested by Bill Gribben for use in preparing an issue update. Attached is all of that information. I hope you find it useful.
