

"Life With Father"

Oscar Serlin's goose laid another golden egg at Ford's last night. His "Life With Pather" came through with an excellent production for its sixth annual visit to Baltimore and the audience laughed loudly and often at Father's frenzy.

With no offense to his predecessors, Carl Benton Reid, turned in a fine, thunderous performance as the apoplectic head of the red-headed Day family. His resounding damns and his hand-wringing appeals to heaven kept the first night audience howling.

Betty Linley As Mother

Betty Linley, playing a subdued mother, was an excellent foil to the elder Day. Her supply smiles and bewilderment at the antits of her husband, were in the best Billie Burke manner.

The story of the play must be known to everyone by now. Essentially a portrait of a liwonderfully family of the Victorian era in New York and of the frenetic few weeks in the Father is baptized, and Clarence, his ion, falls deseperately in love, it seems despited to go on for many years as a tender experience of all playgoers.

Mone of Father's stentorian assertions about the idiots "ruining" his railroad and why "did God make so many damned fools and Democrats" sound even more familiar than usual in an election year. Probably what makes "Life With Father" so interesting even after several visits is not that Father is entirely real, but that he is the kind of parent almost everyone would have been content with.

Father Part In Play

As played in the manner dictated by Cretaigne Windust, director, he seems a lovable but Gibraltar-like tower of strength, the kind of Father that would have stood squarely against anything insecure in the storld, even business cycles. He seems to infichor down the halcyon 19th-century life as if it were moored to his person and as the playgoer watches and hears him, he moves completely out of the 20th century and its juvirs.

The plush and velvet living room designed by Stewart Chaney still warms the eye as it always has. The new company does a fine 15th from the four boys. Sandy Campbell, Walter Kelly, Tom Moore and Byron Ellison to Clarence's first crush, Helen Taylor, who is the loveliest Mary Skinner we have ever seen.



Our speaker on September 27th is Helen Marie Taylor, the wife of (in a good old Virginia tradition) her cousin Mr. Jaquelin E. Taylor of Richmond and Orange, Virginia. Mrs. Taylor is the mother of four sons ranging in age from 23 years to one year.

Mrs. Taylor was graduated, with honors from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London, England in 1952 and received her teacher's training, with special studies in Architecture and Design, from the University of London.

Mrs. Taylor has taught and lectured on Shakespeare, Greek Classics, History of the Theatre, Development of the Theatre in the United States, at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, N. Y. C., Princeton University, and a number of Colleges and Universities and before Civic and Professional organizations throughout the United States. She is a Senior Professional Consultant for planning and programming and has served as a consultant and/or founder to a number of cities in connection with the establishment of Theatres and Art Centers.

Mrs. Taylor has been a guest speaker and critic on Theatre Architecture and Building at the National Conferences of the United States Institute for Theatre Technology and the American Institute of Architects. She has served on the American Institute of Architects national judges panel, representing the American performing artist, to evaluate current design in theatre, art and civic center buildings through the United States.

Mrs. Taylor has been an active producer, director, and actress in the theatre, in addition to her work as a professional consultant, and founder of professional repertory theatres. She received the Brandeis Award for her performance as 'Ophelia' in the Shakespeare-Wrights production of "Hamlet," N. Y. C. in 1957 which also received the "Best Dramatic Production of 1957 Award." For her

direction of "Love Poetry Through the Ages," she received the N. Y. C. "Public Library Award" in 1961; the "Award of Merit" was presented by the Poetry and Drama Ensemble for her direction of "Evenings With Great Writers" with the New York Pro Musica.

As a kinswoman of Edmund Pendleton, John Taylor of Caroline, James Madison, Zachary Taylor, and more recently General George Patton of World War II fame, it is not surprising that this daughter and granddaughter of lawyers, politicians and soldiers should couple an impressive record of acclaimed talents and professional experience with a dedicated, knowledgable, and active interest in civic affairs. Her determination to safeguard Richmond's civic treasurers, as well as her ability to identify, illuminate, and develop the value of existing facilities, has been amply demonstrated as has her determination to serve the good interests of the taxpaver.
