## National Council of Churches

The National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. is a cooperative federation of 32 Protestant and Orthodox churches which seeks to advance programs and policies of mutual interest to its members. The NCC was formed in 1950 by the merger of 12 inter-denominational agencies. The Council's member churches now have an aggregate membership totaling approximately 40 million. The NCC is not a governing body and has no control over the

policies or operations of any church belonging to it. The work of the Council is divided into 3 divisions — Church and Society; Education and Ministry; Overseas Ministries — and 5 commissions — Faith and Order; Regional and Local Ecumenism; Communication; Stewardship; and Justice, Liberation, and Human Fulfillment. The chief administrative officer of the NCC is Dr. Claire Randall, 475 Riverside Drive, N.Y., NY 10027.

In the Protestant Episcopal Church the days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Other days of abstinence are the 40 days of Lent, the Ember Days, and all Fridays of the year except those in the Christmas and Easter seasons. Ember Days (optional) are days of abstinence and prayer for ordinations and the increase of the ministry. They fall on the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the first Sunday in Lent, the Feast of Pentecost (Whitsunday), Sept. 14, and Dec. 13. Rogation Days (also optional) are the three days before Ascension Day, and are days of solemn supplication for God's blessing upon the fields and harvests of the world.

The Episcopal Church having adopted a revised calendar in 1979, the following changes in the foregoing table now obtain: \*The three Sundays before Lent having been suppressed, the number of Sundays after Epiphany are increased by three. \*\*These Sundays are no longer observed. \*\*\*The Sundays "after Trinity" are now counted as "Sundays after Pentecost," and are one more in number than formerly.

A lengthy dispute over the date for the celebration of Easter was settled by the first Council of the Christian Churches at Nicea, in Asia Minor, in 325 A.D. The Council ruled that Easter would be observed on the first Sunday following the 14th day of the Paschal Moon, referred to as the Paschal Full Moon. The Paschal Moon is the first moon whose 14th day comes on or after March 21. Dates of the Paschal Full Moon, which are not necessarily the same as those of the real or astronomical full moon, are listed in the table below with an explanation of how to compute the date of Easter.

If the Paschal Full Moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter is the following Sunday. The earliest date on which Easter can fall is March 22; it fell on that date in 1761 and 1818 but will not do so in the 20th or 21st century. The latest possible date for Easter is April 25; it fell on that date in 1943 and will again in 2038.

For western churches Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which

comes 40 days before Easter Sunday, not counting Sundays. Originally it was a period of but 40 hours. Later it comprised 30 days of fasting, omitting all the Sundays and also all the Saturdays except one. Pope Gregory (590-604) added Ash Wednesday to the fast, together with the remainder of that week.

The last seven days of Lent constitute Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday. The last Thursday — Maundy Thursday — commemorates the institution of the Eucharist. The following day, Good Friday, commemorates the day of the Crucifixion.

Easter is the chief festival of the Christian year, commemorating the Resurrection of Christ. It occurs about the same time as the ancient Roman celebration of the Vernal Equinox, the arrival of spring. In the second century, A.D., Easter Day among Christians in Asia Minor was the 14th Nisan, the seventh month of the Jewish calendar. The Christians in Europe observed the nearest Sunday.

Date of Paschal Full Moon, 1900-2199

The Golden Number, used in determining the date of Easter, is greater by unity (one) than the remainder obtained upon dividing the given year by 19. For example, when dividing 1981 by 19, one obtains a remainder of 5. Adding 1 gives 6 as the Golden Number for the year 1981. From the table then the date of the Paschal Full Moon is Apr. 18, 1981. Since this is a Saturday, Easter is celebrated on the next day, Apr. 19.


Here at last are the lists of religious leaders that we discussed together. I had hoped to have them for you sooner, but it took a bit of doing to get complete and accurate information for you.

The national denominational leaders list contains 62 denominations. NAE member denominations with over 10,000 members totaled 24, and are by definition all evangelical. The non-aligned denominations totaled 29. Some are evangelical some are mixed, and some are thoroughly non-evangelical. It seemed to me that none should be omitted from a White House invitation. The nine ACCC denominations would come within the broad label of evangelical, but they would prefer to call themselves fundamentalists.

As to the Washington area religious leaders, the majority of the names would be considered evangelicals. Obvious exceptions are a number of Rabbis, and I have included some important ministers in the Washington area who should be included in your invitation whatever their theological position may be. Of course I would be happy to discuss any particular names on the phone.

I look forward to these meetings, the one with the President, and the other with Administration leaders. They should be important opportunities for developing support for the President's programs. If I can help you in any other way, I am at your disposal.

Morton: I have looked over the list of religious leaders being considered for a White House meeting with the President. I see no problem with the general list; however, I would like to make a few suggestions if the list is to be narrowed to a few dozen.

The most active and vocal ministers for the election of President Reagan were from the ranks of the Fundamentalists. This list includes Jerry Falwell (and Moral Majority state chairmen) and many of those who participated in the Round-table with Eddie McAteer, such as James Robison, Adrian Rogers and other Southern Baptist leaders.

Although I appreciate Bill Bright and the Christian Embassy people, they were not active during the campaign. I think that Bill should be invited because of his leadership roll in the Christian community. The same is true of Oral Roberts, Rex Humbard and Bob Shuller. They are all good men. However, do not by-pass the fundamentalists to accommodate mainline people.

The Catholic churchmen did not help at all with but a few exceptions; viz., Father Kenneth Baker of New York City and Father Fiori of pro-life fame. Bishop Robert Morse of the Episcopal church (California) was also a big help.

On the local level, Dr. William Howland of the National City Christian Church (Reagan family denomination) Rev. Ernest Gibson of the Washington Council of Churches and several Rabbis were the most helpful to me during the campaign. I am including a list of those who participated in the Inaugural Convocation. Several on the program should be considered for this event.

The Handbell Choir (retarded people) from Missouri was most impressive. I believe that they would come, at their own expense, to the White House. This would make great public relations and they are super good!

A personal note: DON'T FORGET TO INVITE ME !!!

My best to you, Elizabeth, and our many friends at the White House. Jim Baker was a real help to me... so was Margaret Tutwiler.

## Our New National Leaders

COMMISSIONER AND MRS. JOHN D. NEEDHAM

THEIR MANY comrade Salvationists and friends of the Army look forward to welcoming back home to America, to their new appointments by the General, Commissioner John D. Needham as National Commander, and Mrs. Commissioner Needham as National President of Women's Organizations, effective January 7, 1982. Commissioner Needham succeeds Commissioner Ernest W. Holz who retired on December 1.

Since January 1, 1980, Commissioner Needham has served as the British Commissioner, in command of The Salvation Army in Britain, the land of the Army's birth with its more than 100,000 Salvationists.

A fourth-generation Salvationist, Commissioner Needham was born in Ilkeston, Derbyshire, England, and at the age of seven came to the United States with his Salvation Army officer parents. In 1939 he and his wife Florence were commissioned in Atlanta, GA, as Salvation Army officers.

The Needhams distinguished themselves in a wide spectrum of Salvation Army leadership and service, including serving as corps officers, divisional youth secretary, divisional and general secretary, Salvation Army school for officers' training in Atlanta, Southern territorial public relations secretary, divisional commander in three divisions, territorial commander of the Caribbean and Central America Territory with responsibility for the Army's personnel and work in 19 countries (1973-1977), territorial commander of the Central Territory USA, with headquarters in Chicago (1977-1980), his last appointment in the United States before appointment as British Commissioner.

The national commander serves as chief

administrator, official spokesman and president of all Salvation Army corporations in the country. The Salvation Army in the United States operates more than 11,000 centers, including corps community centers, rehabilitation centers, residences, camps, day care centers, group homes, medical facilities and service units. It has more than 400,000 members, including 5,000 officers, and 24,000 employees.

Commissioner Needham is known as outgoing, friendly, an avid reader and scholar, and in the words of his predecessor, "having a deep concern for the spiritual life of the Army." He earned a reputation as one of the top experts in the country on public and voluntary service agencies and served as president of the Blue Ridge Institute for Southern Community Social Service Executives. He holds membership in the National Association of Social Workers, including the prestigious Academy of Certified Social Workers. He has been an active member of the Rotary Club for many years.

Mrs. Commissioner Needham has given distinguished service in her respective leadership roles, including that of national president of women's organizations in Britain, and prior administration of women's work in the territories and divisions where she and her husband have served.

The Needhams have four children, Walter, a retired colonel in the U.S. Army Engineer Corps; Philip, a Salvation Army captain who is city coordinator in St. Petersburg, FL; Miriam, an ordained minister who has a doctorate in theology; and John, a lieutenant in charge of the Salvation Army corps in Athens, GA.

We welcome our new national leaders and pledge the support of our prayers and work for God and the Army.

## PROPOSAL FOR RELIGIOUS BRIEFING

Submitted by Jerry Regier

### I. OPTIONS

A. Several questions need to be addressed and answered related to the scope, purpose, and desired result of a possible briefing. Some of these questions are:

1. What do you want to accomplish?
2. Do you want one or two groups?
3. Do you want the group to be receptive and agreeable?
4. Do you mind disagreement and/or hostility?
5. Do you want to brief or inter-act or both?

B. In light of the foregoing, I see several options which are as follows:

1. Briefing of 25 Evangelical religious leaders including media leaders -- this group would probably be receptive and agreeable to the President's policies.
2. Briefing of 25 Broader Religious leaders. This could possibly take two forms:
  - a. a broad group of leaders who would represent the religious spectrum and be supportive of the President.
  - b. a broad group of leaders who would represent the religious spectrum but support for the President would not be a determining factor; therefore there could be some disagreement or even hostility.
3. Briefing of each of the above two groups but ~~but~~ on separate days.
4. Briefing of 75-100 religious leaders representing the entire spectrum of the religious world.
5. Briefing of 25 Evangelical religious leaders from the Electronic Church - TV and Radio.



6. Briefing of 25 religious leaders from the press representing the print media.

## II. GENERAL WARNINGS AND ADVICE

1. Would not be good to just have far right moral majority types -- it would alienate many other evangelicals, main liners, and inter-faith groups.
2. Would not be good to just have religious leaders who represent main line religion -- it would alienate many religious groups who supported the President and reward many who did not support him.
3. Would not be best to separate the religious community into too many segments thus perpetuating existing rifts and distrust.
4. It must be decided if you want to face a group that is sympathetic, or one that may be hostile, or a mixture of both.

## III. OPTIONS ON PURPOSE

1. If main purpose is to brief them, that can be done effectively in either a large or small group.
2. If main purpose is to receive input and concerns, that can best be accomplished through several smaller meetings.
3. If the purpose is both, then a combination of large and small may be accomplished.

## IV. SUGGESTION WITH REASONING

### A. Choose a larger briefing (Option #4)

### B. Procedure

1. Have a breakfast in the State Dining Room for 75-100 religious leaders. This would provide for an "in White House" opportunity comparable to a meeting in the Cabinet Room but much better than a briefing in the Old Executive Building.
2. Have the President brief them on the economic package and issues relating it to them as citizens and as religious leaders. Religious leaders in a real sense represent grassroots American, Faith, Free-enterprise, and moral fibre -- all of which seem to be necessary ingredients for the success of the proposed economic package.

C. Why a larger briefing

1. The President would not run the risk of being overly tied to any one religious group -- particularly the electronic media and the religious leaders who supported him strongly in the campaign.
2. Those who did strongly support the President -- Moral Majority and the electronic media -- should not be alienated by exclusion but should be strengthened by inclusion along with a broader base. This would happen with a larger briefing.
3. The spectrum of the religious community which have not been supportive of the President need to be included in order to help implement the economic package.
4. New constituency and coalitions need to be formulated now at the beginning of the Administration without weakening the strong support of the conservative religious community.

V. CONCLUDING REMARKS

With these thoughts in view I have attached several lists:

3. Evangelical leaders
  - a. Small list
  - b. larger list
4. Broad religious leaders

Per our conversation of several days ago, Senator Helms is most interested in keeping abreast of the progress the White House is making in its discussions with religious leaders on how to expand private sector initiatives to aid the needy.

I would appreciate it if you keep me informed of your efforts in this area, and if possible, would love to sit in on meetings you have with religious community. The Agriculture Committee is particularly interested in examining what the private sector--churches, businesses, community groups, etc.--is undertaking in the way of food assistance to needy individuals. We intend to hold hearings in the spring or summer looking into such areas as soup kitchens, food banks, gleaning projects, and in particular, projects in which recipients of aid also participate in running the project: private sector workfare. We'd like to publicize the more successful initiatives so that they might be repeated around the country. Senator Helms' personal interests of course extend to other areas besides food aid.
