

WHAT IS NASAA?

The National Association of State Approving Agencies was officially incorporated in the State of Oklahoma in 1948,

"to bring together the sovereign states in a concentrated effort to improve education and training for eligible veterans."

WHAT DOES NASAA STAND FOR?

Since its inception, NASAA has believed that it is a working partner
with veterans. In fulfilling its commitment, NASAA believes that it should

WHAT ARE THE PURPOSES OF NASAA?

Through the operations for its various committees and regional and national meetings, NASAA represents its member agencies in matters affecting the education and training of veterans and in achieving the professional growt needed to provide the maximum assistance to veterans that is expressed in the Association's charter.

In striving to achieve this end, it is the purpose of the National Association of State Approving Agencies to:

- Promote high professional standards, policies, and ethical practices among the members,
- 2. Provide a better understanding of the role and functions of State Approving Agencies,

- Represent the mutual interests of the membership on matters coming before the Association,
 - Provide a forum in which the interchange of ideas and information can be facilitated,
 - Encourage and support quality education and training for veterans and other eligible persons, and,
 - Foster intercourse and cooperation between all concerned and interested agencies on matters affecting the education and training of veterans and other eligible persons.

WHO DOES NASAA REPRESENT?

Each designated State Approving Agency within a state, territory, or the District of Columbia shall be encouraged to maintain adequate representation in the Association. A large portion of these agencies are members of the Association, but we still strive for a 100% membership.

Members represent a spectrum of state agencies, such as Departments of Education, Governor's Veterans Councils, Veterans Service Offices, Labor Departments, Departments of Veterans Affairs, and others. These members have ties with many other state agencies which contribute to the training of veterans, such as the State Education Agency, School Licensing Authority, Apprenticeship Council, Office of Consumer Affairs, Office of Attorney General, Employment Security, and Vocational Rehabilitation.

WHAT IS A STATE APPROVING AGENCY?

The concept of the State Approving Agency originated with the G. I. Bill after World War II when the authors of the bill recognized the responsibility of the State for the education of its citizens. This concept and the intent of Congress in support of the concept has appeared in every G. I. Bill since that time.

The activities of the SAA's and the manner in which they have carried out their responsibilities have been reviewed many times over the intervening years by members of Congress and by the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. With each new G. I. Bill, Congress has reinforced its belief in the value of the SAA's. This is best exemplified by the following excerpt from the committee report on the post-Korean G. I. Bill:

"The system of approval of educational institutions by State Approving Agencies has proved its worth in connection with (Previous G. I. Bills)--. The Committee looks to the approval functions as one of the basic safeguards against abuse and therefore expects that these approval and supervisory efforts will be fully supported by the Veterans Administration."

WHAT DOES AN SAA DO?

- Determine whether or not a training institution complies with the law and with the State's Approval criteria,
- Perform regular supervisory functions to determine continued compliance with the criteria,

- 3. Keep the training institutions informed of their approval status and of changes in the laws and criteria,
- 4. Furnish information to the Veterans Administration as to the approval status of training institutions, and provide additional services as may be requested from time to time by the Veterans Administration.

AND THERE IS MORE!

Because of their ties with other agencies and other laws, the SAA may provide other services that are not performed by any other agency.

- Provide consultative services on state laws and regulations as they concern appropriate education and training,
- Provide a repository of information regarding schools, even those which may no longer be in existence,
- 3. Provide an unbiased and disinterested third party between schools, between schools and the public, between schools and other governmental agencies so that the differences can be resolved without litigation.
- 4. Provide recommendations for legislation concerning guidelines for training institutions.

Thank you for your letter and the information concerning a proposal by the National Association of State Approving Agencies for a White House Conference on Veterans' Education and Training.

The questions about a new GI Bill education and training program are many and complex. The President has recommended that the Chapter 32 Post-Viatnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) be continued. This extension will permit a thorough evaluation of the Program by the Department of Defense and the Veterans Administration. The Department of Defense Authorization Act of 1981, Public Law 96-342, established a pilot program under which certain individuals, who enlisted or reenlisted in the armed forces on or after October 1, 1980, and before October 1, 1981, will be provided educational assistance. The Department of Defense is reviewing the results of this pilot program to determine its effectiveness.

There is a Hilitary Manpower Task Force, which is chalred by the Secretary of Defense, Caspar Weinberger. The Task Force is composed of White House officials, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, the Secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force, and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The Task Force is currently studying recruitment, military pay, GI Bill benefits and the need for a permanent education and training program. After the Task Force has completed its work and reported its findings, the President will make recommendations to the Congress.

I have reviewed your Association's proposal. The Association's efforts and concerns must be commended. However, in view of the continuing evaluation of the Post-Vietnam Bra Educational Assistance Program, the Department of Defense pilot program and the current work of the Military Manpower Task Force, I do not believe that a White House Conference on Veterana' Education and Training is warranted at this time.

PROPOSAL

WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON VETERANS EDUCATION & TRAINING

I. Forward

Enacted by the Congress in 1944, Public Law 78-346 has been amended several times through 1980, but it remains the "G. I. Bill of Rights" in the hearts and minds of all veterans of military services in the United States. It was conceived as a means of preventing a repetition of what created in 1919 a dissatisfied veteran, one who had served his country in World War I and was demobilized with \$60 Separation pay, a railroad ticket home, and, all too often, no job. The act, popularly known as the "G. I. Bill," provided for readjustment to civilian life in a changed society.

An unexpected number of veterans used their education benefits. During the peak year of 1947, 1,158,000 G. I.'s were enrolled in college and 2,546,000 in other types of education and training. The World War II G. I. Bill ended on July 25, 1956. During its 12 year existence, 7.8 million veterans (slightly more than 50 percent of those eligible) received training. The total cost to the taxpayers was \$14.5 billion.

On July 16, 1952, President Harry S. Truman signed Public Law 550, the "Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952," passed by the 82nd Congress. P.L. 550 ended payments to the institutions and provided for payments to the veterans. The State Approving Agency was now required to insure proper record keeping as well as the normal process of approval of educational and training facilities in each State. When the Korean G. I. Bill ended on January 31, 1965, 2,391,000 (42 percent of those eligible) had received training or education. The cost to taxpayers was \$4.5 billion.

President Lyndon B. Johnson signed Public Law 538, the "Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966," on March 3, 1966. It is also known as Title 38 of the United States Code. The program went into effect June 1, 1966. This legislation provided benefits for Vietnam veterans and has subsequently been amended and extended to care for eligible recipients through 1980.

Since the close of World War II, about 18 million veterans have used \$52 billion to further their education or training, 7 million of them attending college. The Veterans Administration estimates that additional income taxes from veterans whose lifetime earnings were increased as a result of government assistance amount to several times more than the cost to the Federal government.

As we enter the 80's we find continued interest in having a "G. I. Bill" for education; however, the current view is no longer readjustment, but rather retention. Bills currently being discussed in Congress deal with the problem of not only getting people to join the service, but also to remain in service.

Generally Congress with input from the Veterans Administration $h_{\rm AS}$ developed a G. I. Bill as a means of alleviating immediate concerns, yet it does not appear that any educational program for veterans has been developed with a view to the future.

II. Statement of Purpose

A White House Conference on Veterans Education and Training should be convened to insure that future educational and training programs dedicated to veterans continue in the best interests of the veteran, government, and education.

III. The Conference

A. The conference should be held in Washington, D. C. early in 1982.

- B. The participants, to be invited by the White House, should be representatives of:
 - 1. National Associates of State Approving Agencies
 - 2. Veterans Administration
 - 3. House & Senate Veterans Affairs Committees
 - 4. Department of Defense
 - 5. Veterans Organization
 - 6. Higher Education
 - 7. Proprietary Education
