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
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

Dear Colonel Long:

Thank you for your letter of February 11, 1983, to President Reagan concerning recommendations of the Private Sector Survey (PPSS) on the military retirement system and the operation of military commissaries.

The military compensation and benefit system is extremely important in the support of our men and women in uniform. As elements of this system, military retirement and commissaries have operated toward maintaining a force with the age, experience, and skill mix to meet our manpower needs. We believe this is important as we meet our defense commitments.

The compensation and benefit system cannot be stagnant--it must remain responsive to our defense requirements. For this reason, we welcome recommendations for change that will help us to meet our management objectives better. However, we have long held that fundamental changes to our systems should be based on legitimate defense requirements. Toward that end, the President has directed that the Fifth Quadrennial Review of Military Compensation assess the military retirement system in relation to those requirements and recommend appropriate changes. Additionally, the Secretary of Defense has encouraged the Review to accelerate their efforts. I am confident that this review and analysis will result in recommendations for an improved system.

Thank you for your interest and support of our compensation and banefit system.

On behalf of this organization which represents eleven chapters in the state of South Carolina, I wish to respectfully comment on several matters affecting the retired members of the uniformed services.

We have been dismayed to learn of some of the draft recommendations of the President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control (PPSSCC), whose final report we understand is due to be submitted to you on March 31. While we hope that many of the draft recommendations will be dropped or greatly modified by the time of the final report, we urge the greatest care and consideration in whatever action is taken on the report.

Among the draft recommendations which we find highly distressing are: defer retired pay to age 60 for all military members retiring prior to completion of 30 years service; an offset of 37.5 percent of the Social Security Benefit; a forfeit of one dollar in retired pay for every two dollars earned from other sources; an immediate imposition of the high three rule, including the possibility of recomputing the pay of some who are already retired; the closing of all commissaries in the Continental United States.

When we first heard of the composition of the PPSSCC, we were greatly impressed by the apparent quality of its members. However, it is clear that they have little or no understanding of the damage that their deliberations can produce, virtually all of which are anti-military. The temptation will surely be great to achieve savings in the compensation areas, but I can assure you that a mature, highly motivated career force is absolutely essential for an effective military structure. To accept and support such areas as are mentioned above, would not only be devastating but would also be a failure to honor long-standing commitments to those who have served the United States Government.

In addition to the preceding comments which relate to the shortsightedness of the PPSSCC in its attempt to apply civilian standards without concern for the unique nature of military force management, we note that military retirees have already absorbed more than their fair share of the spending cuts approved by the 97th Congress over the past two years. Although we retirees account for only 3.5 percent of the entitlement portion of the 1983 budget, we sustained a 6 percent loss in benefits, plus other losses such that an average retiree might sustain a 10 percent lifetime reduction.

/I have no illusions that you will ever see this letter, but I do hope that a competent staffer with an input to the decision-making process does.



Dear Morton:

I have a belated request concerning Proclamation 4950 of June 30, 1982, "National NCO/Petty Officer Week, 1982," signed by the President on June 30 last.

The Non Commissioned Officers Association of the USA (NCOA) was singularly responsible for having the original resolution introduced in the United States Senate by the Honorable Strom Thurmond of South Carolina. A copy of the resolution is attached.

You may note that on page 2 of S.J. RES. 161, the fifth paragraph references the NCOA's 21st International Convention that was held during the same period covered by the resolution. Subsequently, that part was deleted on instructions from the House oversight committee.

Since it played the major role in having the resolution introduced in Congress and obtaining the necessary cosponsors to move the bills through the Senate and House, the Association will be honored if the President would prepare and sign a letter to the Association's president relative to the proclamation and having attached thereto a copy of same and a Presidential pen. The three items would then be framed and disployed at the Association's International Headquarters in San Antonio, Texas. A suggested format for the letter is attached.

For your information and records, the newly elected president of the Association is Fleet Master Chief Franklin A. Lister USN, replacing MCPO Robert Walker who has been acting president following the resignation of Mr. Normand Gonsauls on January 14, 1982.

The Executive Vice President for the 1982-83 year is Mr. Robert Frisbie, U.S. Army Retired, currently on The White House administrative staff.


It was my privilege, June 30, 1982, to attach my signature to Proclamation 4950, "National NCO/Petty Officer Week, 1982."
