THE PRESIDENT'S NEWS CONFERENCE OF JANUARY 29, 1981

STRATEGIC ARMS LIMITATION

Q. Mr. President, you campaigned rather vociferously against the SALT II treaty, saying it was slightly toward the Soviet Union. Yet I noticed your Secretary of State, Mr. Haig, now seems to suggest that for the time being, at least, the United States will abide by the limits of the SALT II treaty and he hopes the Soviet Union will, too. How long do you intend that the United States should abide by the terms of a SALT agreement which you consider inequitable, and what do you consider its greatest inequities to be?

THE PRESIDENT. Well, the SALT treaty, first of all, I think, permits a continued buildup on both sides of strategic nuclear weapons but, in the main thing, authorizes an immediate increase in large numbers of Soviet warheads. There is no verification as to the number of warheads on the missile, no method for us to do this.

I don't think that a treaty—SALT means strategic arms limitation—that actually permits a buildup, on both sides, of strategic nuclear weapons can properly be called that. And I have said that when we can—and I am willing for our people to go in to negotiate or, let me say, discussions leading to negotiations—that we should start negotiating on the basis of trying to effect an actual reduction in the numbers of nuclear weapons. That would then be real strategic arms limitation.

And I happen to believe, also, that you can't sit down at a table and just negotiate that unless you take into account, in consideration at that table all the other things that are going on. In other words. I believe in linkage.

GOALS OF THE SOVIET UNION

Q. Mr. President, what do you see as the long-range intentions of the Soviet Union? Do you think, for instance, the Kremlin is bent on world domination that might lead to a continuation of the cold war, or do you think that under other circumstances détente is possible?

The President. Well, so far détente's been a one-way street that the Soviet Union has used to pursue its own aims. I don't have to think of an answer as to what I think their intentions are: they have repeated it. I know of no leader of the Soviet Union since the revolution, and including the present leadership, that has not more than once repeated in the various Communist congresses they hold their determination that their goal must be the promotion of world revolution and a one-world Socialist or Communist state, whichever word you want to use.

Now, as long as they do that and as long as they, at the same time, have openly and publicly declared that the only morality they recognize is what will further their cause, meaning they reserve unto themselves the right to commit any crime, to lie, to cheat, in order to attain that, and that is moral, not immoral, and we operate on a different set of standards. I think when you do business with them, even at a détente, you keep that in mind.



Today I hosted a meeting in my office with three officers of the American Legion:

Michael Kogutek, national commander Robert Spanogle, Executive director of Washington office Mylio Kraja, director national legislative commission

Also present was Bill Gribbin, deputy director of Congressional Relations.

The Legion representatives expressed concern that, if they came out and endorsed the President's economic package, they might lose out even if the Reagan bipartisan bill (Gramm-Latta) passed the House intact. (They are for Gramm-Latta because they get back most of they originally proposed V.A. cuts under the new proposal.)

They wanted assurances that the President would fight in the House-Senate conference for the V.A. provisions of Gramm-Latta, thereby assuring that GOP Senate conferees would not push for Senate-passed provisions which cut the V.A. as per the original OMB proposals.

The strategy devised at our meeting was that the Legion would contact Rep. Sonny Montgomery and ask him to call the President and ask him to write a note to Montgomery assuring that the Administration would support the V.A. provisions of Gramm-Latta in the House-Senate conference. Gribbin would alert Max Friedersdorf that a request would be coming from Montgomery.

The above request from the Legion was the single matter left to be resolved before the Legion would come on board in support of the economic package. During the meeting we solved their other major concern: I got Don Moran on the phone with Spanogle and me. The Legion was worried that V.A. has in the works a a Reduction in Force (RIF) in accord with the original OMB proposals. Moran agreed to immediately phone Acting V.A. administrator Rufus Wilson and direct him to cease internal moves to implement the cut of 1648 positions which the Gramm-Latta Reagan bipartisan proposal would restore from the cuts anticipated in the original OMB proposal.

American Legion Commander Kogutek agreed to keep in touch with me and make his endowsement when Rep. Montgomery gets the requested note from the President. **MEMORANDUM**

FRANK PHELPS JONES, DIRECTOR NATIONAL SECURITY AND FOREIGN AFFAIRS VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES

Phelps Jones retired from the United States Army as a colonel of infantry and was appointed to his present position by then Commander-in-Chief Joseph L. Vicites on March 10, 1972.

Born in Stamford, Connecticut, Jones attended local schools and the Phillips Exeter Academy, Exeter, New Hampshire. He enlisted in the infantry in December, 1941, and following graduation from Officers Candidate School in 1942, served in the 15th Infantry Regiment, 3d Infantry Division, throughout the North African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Phelps Jones was granted an honorable discharge in November, 1945 as a captain.

He served briefly as a reporter on the <u>Stamford (Conn.) Advocate</u> before entering Yale College from which he graduated in 1948. There followed a year of graduate study at Yale (International Relations) and two years in New York as assistant advertising manager of Simtex Mills, a division of the Simmons Company.

Recalled to active duty in June, 1951 for the Korean emergency, Colonel (then Captain) Jones was competitively selected for the Regular Army and served therein until his early and voluntary retirement.

Military duties included: instructor at the Infantry School; Korean service with the 40th Infantry Division; aide-de-camp to General Maxwell Taylor; service on the Army General Staff; Associate Professor of Social Science at West Point; battalion and brigade commander in Germany; sole U. S. Army selectee for Canada's National Defence College; Military Assistant to General Earle G. Wheeler, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; service with the 173d Airborne Brigade in Vietnam; and, service in the office of the Chief of Staff, U. S. Army.

Phelps Jones is listed in the Infantry Officer Candidate School Hall of Fame at Fort Benning, Georgia.

During his lengthening association with the V.F.W., Phelps Jones has advanced the security program of the V.F.W. both within and outside the organization, before successive Administrations and Congresses. He has made numerous appearances on local and national media to further a wide variety of V.F.W.-mandated positions.

Jones' decorations include: the Silver Star; Legion of Merit (3); Bronze Star (3); Purple Heart; Chung Mu (Korea); Croix de Guerre (France); Cross of Gallantry (Vietnam); and, the U. S. and Korean Presidential Unit Citations.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH

Veterans Organization Leaders

February 14, 1981

- -- In his announcement last week, the President listed Veterans Administration compensation and pension benefits where among the seven program areas where significant budgets cuts must not be made.
- -- Our overall economic situation, however, is grim. It was in the interest of the previous administration to make things appear as rosy as possible, but many things are much worse than most of us realized.
- -- In order for the government to be able to continue to meet its obligations to veterans, to afford an adequate national defense, and to provide for the other necessary functions of government, we must turn this country' economy around. That means a new era of restraint of government programs which burden productive taxpayers. That means fighting inflation by cutting government. To do that we need your help.
- -- Mr. Don Moran of the Office of Management and Budget will outline for you the problems now facing our economy. Then he will give you the parameters of the economic package which President Reagan will present to the nation next Wednesday.

This will give the veteran group leaders, who are generally supportive of the President's economic program, the advance notice they need so that they feel a part of the decision-making process.

Memorandum for the Files Meeting in Office of Ed Meese, March 31, 1981

Ed Meese Ed Thomas Morton Blackwell Bob Spanogle expressed for the entire group their personal support of the President and their relief at his rapid progress in recovering from his wound.

The veterans presented the attached letter to Mr. Meese from their respective National Commanders.

Gabby Hartnett expressed concern at the proposal to process veterans' claims at one (or three) central office(s) rather than adjudicate claims at the 57 regional offices as at present. He expressed the view that claims might now take six months to process.

Ed Meese pointed out that most claims are not processed in person by claimants and that it is largely now done by mail.

The veterans said they feel that OMB wants to vector the V.A. hospitals into the private sector.

Ed Meese said that the V.A. estimates quoted in the letter may be incorrect and that figures from within the bureaucracy are legitimately suspect. He said that the Administration proposes no cuts in V.A. medical personnel.

Cooper Holt said Don Moran at OMB has not talked to anyone at V.A. except Moran's own four people.

Mr. Meese pointed out that there are very large percentages of empty beds in V.A. hospitals. The veterans replied that one reason the beds are vacant is that there are not enough medical personnel to staff the wards.

The veterans said that the V.A. has economized better than the private sector hospitals. They said that 68 percent of V.A. patients have no medical insurance. Cooper Holt said 36 percent of V.A. patients have incomes less than \$2,000/year.

Mr. Meese said the goal of the President is to improve the quality of medical care afforded veterans, that the Administration is interested in moving the V.A. more in line with the Defense Department as a component of national defense. He said his own view was that the V.A. should report through a cabinet secretary, for better administrative control. Bob Lyngh said, "We are for that."

Mr. Meese said we will have the new V.A. administrator, whom we are close to picking, consult with the represented organizations as we develop veterans policy and programs. He promised to see that the questions raised in the veterans' letter were answered, by some of his own people as well as by OMB people. He closed by saying that the President, of all people, is not interested in slighting veterans.

Honorable Edwin Meese, III Counselor to the President The White House Washington, D.C. 20500

Dear Mr. Meese:

Following is a joint statement by the National Commanders of The American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Disabled American Veterans.

These are points the organizations would like you to consider in projecting funding for veterans programs. OMB actions contradict the following statements.

- # At the VFW National Convention in August 1980, Candidate Reagan said: "---to me it is unconscionable that veterans in need are denied hospital and medical care because of inadequate funding which has closed hospital beds and cut health-care personnel within the VA."
- # The 1980 Republican Party Platform states: "In particular we feel it is of vital importance to continue and expand the health-programs provided to veterans through the Veterans Administration hospitals. Here we see the need for increased access to care especially for older veterans.

In the face of these public statements of policy by the President and his Party, these are the things that have happened since he took office.

- # In a document presented to the staffs of the Committees on Veterans Affairs, the OMB Director wrote: "In addition, the existence of excess medical care capacity in many areas of the United States makes questionable the need for a separate VA medical system. This Administration will conduct a complete review of alternative methods for providing readily available, quality medical care for eligible veterans."
- # In an appearance before the Senate Budget Committee, the OMB Director said that the Reagan Administration is preparing --- proposals to effect a more efficient system of veterans health services.
- # The Administration proposes \$1.3 billion in reductions in VA programs for FY 1981 and 1982. The major areas of impact of these reductions will be the medical care program and the regional offices, both of which are the main points of contact between veterans and VA.

- # OMB defends the reductions as being less than 3.2% of the total VA budget. However that includes entitlement programs which comprise 64% of the VA Budget and are fixed costs. The reductions comprise about 10% of the adjustable funds some 36% of the total VA Budget.
 - # Medical care reductions will, by VA projections

Cause reduction of 933 nurses, 297 doctors and more than 4,000 medical support personnel

Cause closing 1,800 beds in 60 hospital wards, equivalent to four hospitals

Result in a decrease of 1,583,000 outpatient visits and 3,628 nursing care patients

Terminate the Readjustment Counseling Program for Vietnam veterans Reduce VA doctors' incentive pay (provided by Congress to alleviate a severe recruitment and retention problem)

Decrease rehabilitative and medical research

Reduce vocational rehabilitation counseling for service-connected disabled veterans

- # Regionalization proposed for VA Regional Offices will eliminate direct service to veterans who are attempting to develop claims for benefits. Regional Offices will be reduced to information and counseling contacts.
- # In FY 1976 the VA Budget was 5% of the total Federal Budget. In FY 1981 the VA Budget was 3.2% of the total Federal Budget proving that veterans programs are not expanding.
- # During the past ten years the size of the VA hospital system has been reduced by 20,000 beds, 15,000 of those in the last 4 years at a time when the veteran population has been increased by 9.6 million Vietnam Era veterans and the 12.5 million WW II veteran population has reached an average age of 61 becoming more subject to catastrophic illnesses.
- # Elimination of the Readjustment Counseling Program will terminate the single program established to deal with the special problems of non-readjusted Vietnam veterans.
- # The overwhelming majority of veterans in VA hospitals, and who use the clinics, are elderly and poor. They would be public charges in any case.
- # The military has indicated it is no longer able to handle any appreciable number of casualties in event of overseas hostilities. It will have to have help from VA. And VA facilities will inevitably deteriorate, both physically and in staff capabilities, under the Administration's planned reductions.

- # The veterans organizations are strongly in favor of the most efficient and cost-effective management of veterans programs, and will work positively with the Administration to that effect if they are invited to do so. In point of fact comprehensive care in VA hospitals costs 10% less than comparable care in private sector hospitals.
- # The three major organizations, with their Auxiliaries, represent more than 7 million active citizens and they speak as much as anyone can for the veteran constituency.
- # History shows that veterans will in fact fight to save their hospitals and, if necessary, will take their case to the people as they have done before.
- # The veterans organizations are convinced the planned funding reductions will severely hurt both medical care and delivery of service to veterans and dependents. The veterans organizations believe economies can be effected, but not in the way they are now projected by OMB.
- # The veterans organizations ask that the funding be replaced for medical care, for medical and prosthetic research, for rehabilitation counselling (including the Vietnam Veteran Outreach Centers), and for operation of the Regional Offices.
- # The veterans organizations are willing and desirous of meeting with VA and OMB officials to work out plans for economies in management and operation of veterans assistance programs.
- # If current OMB policies vis-a-vis veterans health care and regionalization of Regional Offices are pursued into future fiscal years, the VA will be unable to render effective and efficient service to the nation's 30 million veterans, their dependents and survivors.
