Dear Mrs. Dole:

Estimates of the number of veterans in civilian life on September 30, 1982 are enclosed for your information. These estimates show nearly 1.5 million fewer veterans than the estimates published six months ago.

The new estimate of 28,522,000 veterans will appear in the semi-annual report titled <u>Veteran Population September 30, 1982</u> which should be printed in about one month and will be sent to you at that time.

The veteran population estimates presented in the enclosure may be distinguished from those displayed in prior reports in two major respects. First, these data reflect final 1980 Decennial Census counts of veterans in each state, plus the preliminary count of veterans in Puerto Rico. While the state veteran population estimates are based on distributions from the 1980 Census, the figures by age and period of service do not reflect 1980 Census data. Final breakdowns by these and all other variables (including 1975-1980 veteran interstate migration data) will not be available from the Bureau of the Census for approximately four to six months.

Second, the veteran population estimates in this report are presented for only those ex-service personnel living in the U.S. and Puerto Rico. Due to a lack of sufficiently reliable data on veterans residing in other areas outside the U.S., estimates of the veteran population in these areas will no longer be computed. Beginning with the 1980 Decennial Census, the Bureau of the Census stopped collecting information on U.S. citizens living abroad. Therefore, no benchmark statistics are available on the count of veterans in these locations. However, the number of veterans in these geographic areas who are receiving compensation or pension payments are available. This group totalled about 23,800 on September 30, 1982.

The 1980 Decennial Census data on the number of veterans in civilian life represent the first set of veteran statistics

from the Bureau of the Census that the VA has deemed reliable and has adopted as new benchmark figures. Unlike previous Decennial Census questionnaires, the 1980 Census form contained a question on veteran status that more accurately corresponded to the VA's definition of a veteran. What specifically differentiates the 1980 data from prior Census information is that female veterans are now properly included in the overall count, while persons whose only service was in the National Guard for training only as well as those who were in a reservist capacity are now appropriately excluded. A small number of these trainees sustained service-connected disabilities and should be included in the overall veteran total. However, no data exist upon which to estimate the number of persons involved.

Projections of the veteran population which were prepared earlier this year are inconsistent with these most recent data, because the projections were finalized prior to the release of any 1980 Census data on veterans. No new veteran population projections that are consistent with 1980 Census data can be prepared until the remaining information on veterans is received from the Bureau of the Census.
