To present replica of rifle used 150 years ago.

BACKGROUND

"The Texas Army" (members of this group are also members of the National Rifle Association) will present the President with a handmade, classic flintlock, muzzle loading rifle, a replica of rifles used 150 years ago. The rifle is "Kentucky style", .45 calibre and 42 inches long. The stock was cut from curly maple, carved, stained, and hand-rubbed. Furniture is all German silver. There is silver inlay and engraving. Nameplate: "Ronald Reagan His Gun" Thumbplate: "12/7/81"

"The Texas Army" was originally formed at the time of the Texas Revolution in the mid 1830's. The period after the Civil War saw the Texas Army deactivated. In 1969, General Carroll Lewis, along with the then Governor of Texas, Preston Smith, reactivated the Army under the Governor's commission as a historical and heritage reenactment group. All members are Colonels commissioned by the Governor of the State of Texas under the provisions of the Texas State Constitution. They could in reality be activated under the Governor's command in an official state crisis. The group itself helps to commemorate various historical and commemorative events during the year. It is an volunteer group, no dues, and no meetings. At this time, there are approximately 105 Colonels, plus Commanding General Lewis, under the direct command of the Governor of the State of Texas.
