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met a woman riding on horseback in the wood. As I stopped to let her pass, she also stopped and looked at me intently, and said, 'I do believe you are the ugliest man I ever saw.' Said I, 'Madam, you are probably right, but I can't help it.' 'No,' said she, 'you can't help it, but you might stay at home.' "25 Lincoln also enjoyed telling about the grouchy old Democrat who walked up to him and said, "They say you're a self-made man," and when Lincoln nodded, snapped, "Well, all I've got to say is that it was a damned bad job."28

Lincoln combined a sense of fun with high seriousness. As President, he showed himself to be shrewd, thoughtful, selfless, dedicated, strong-willed, resourceful, compassionate, and extraordinarily magnanimous. The burdens he bore during the Civil War were far heavier than those of most American Presidents, yet he carried out his responsibilities with remarkable patience and determination. Though his critics could not always see it, he remained steadfastly true throughout the war to his basic objectives: restoration of the Union (which he regarded as a magnificent experiment in government of, by, and for the people) and the abolition of slavery (which he regarded as utterly incompatible with democracy). Anxious to get the very best men, civilian and military, he could find to help him in realizing these objectives, he did not mind if they personally held him in contempt. When someone told him that his Secretary of War, Edwin Stanton, had called him a damned fool, he said lightly, "If Stanton said I was a damned fool, then I must be one, for he is nearly always right and generally says what he means."27 Stanton came to hold Lincoln in high esteem; but some of the Radical Republicans never did. They found it hard to understand that in pursuing his objectives—preserving the Union and emancipating the slaves—Lincoln had to proceed cautiously to avoid alienating the border slave states (thus driving them to secession) and offending northern public opinion (which was by no means sympathetic to abolitionism at first). He also thought it important to synchronize his policies with progress on the battlefield (which came slowly at first) if he was to avoid making futile and perhaps even counterproductive gestures.

No President has been vilified the way Lincoln was during the Civil War. He was attacked on all sides: by abolitionists, Negrophobes, states'-righters, strict constructionists, radicals, conservatives, armchair strategists, and by people who just did not like his looks or resented his storytelling. From the day of his inauguration

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to the day of his assassination the invective was unrelenting. Among other things, Lincoln was called an ape, a baboon, a buffoon, a clown, a usurper, a traitor, a tyrant, a monster, an idiot, a eunuch, a bigot, a demagogue, a lunatic, a despot, a blunderer, a charlatan, and a bully. One New York newspaper regularly referred to him as "that hideous baboon at the other end of the avenue" and said that "Barnum should buy and exhibit him as a zoological curiosity." The Illinois State Register called him "the craftiest and most dishonest politician that ever disgraced an office in America." "Honest Abe, forsooth!" sneered one editor. "Honest Iago! Benignant Nero! Faithful Iscariot!" Even his hometown paper joined the chorus: "How the greatest butchers of antiquity sink into insignificance when their crimes are contrasted with those of Abraham Lincoln!"28 And all but three or four words failed an angry Louisiana letter-writer named Pete Muggins when he contemplated Lincoln: "God damn your god damned old hellfired god damned soul to hell god damn you and god damn your god damned family's god damned hellfired god damn soul to hell and good damnation god damn them and god damn your goddamn friends to hell."29 No wonder Lincoln said, when asked how it felt to be President, "You have heard about the man tarred and feathered and ridden out of town on a rail? A man in the crowd asked how he liked it, and his reply was that if it wasn't for the honor of the thing, he would much rather walk."20 In saying this, however, Lincoln was thinking not of the abuse heaped on him but of the terrible loss of life on the battlefield and the heartbreakingly slow progress being made toward the achievement of his objectives. He had enjoyed politics immensely before he became President and had been eager, too, to hold the highest office in the land. But in the White House, he said, instead of glory he found only "ashes and blood."81

The theater, like humorous stories, lightened the cares of office for Lincoln. He had a special fondness for Shakespeare and experienced exquisite pleasure one evening at seeing the veteran actor James Hackett play Falstaff in a Washington theater. He was so delighted with the performance that he wrote a letter of congratulation afterward. Hackett, flattered by such attention from the President of the United States, turned the letter over to the New York Herald, which reprinted it, accompanied by savage comments. Greatly embarrassed, Hackett wrote Lincoln to apologize. "Give yourself no uneasiness on the subject . . .," Lincoln responded. "I certainly did not

Attached is a proposed draft summary schedule.

Event Concept

On Wednesday, May 4, 1988, the President will travel to Chicago, Illinois to address the National Strategy Forum at the Palmer House Hotel, and to participate in an Illinois State GOP Fundraiser. Upon arrival at the Palmer House, the President will participate in a photo reception with approximately 40 of the Illinois Forum major donors and their spouses. Following the photo reception, the President will make remarks to about 200 gathered for a State GOP Fundraising Luncheon.

At the conclusion of his remarks to the Illinois GOP, the President will proceed to the Grand/State Ballroom of the hotel where he will lunch with, and address, the National Strategy Forum. Following his remarks, the President will participate in a question and answer session for approximately 20 minutes.

Organized in 1983, the NSF is a nonpartisan group of Chicago area civic leaders who believe it critical that community leaders be accurately informed about the rapidly changing issues affecting our national security. The NSF provides an opportunity for individuals interested in these important matters to learn from experts who analyze and formulate American national security strategy in a balanced exchange of ideas. Former speakers include Admiral Carlisle Trost, Chief of Naval Operations, and Amb. Max Kampelman, Chief U.S. Arms Negotiator.

Introduction
