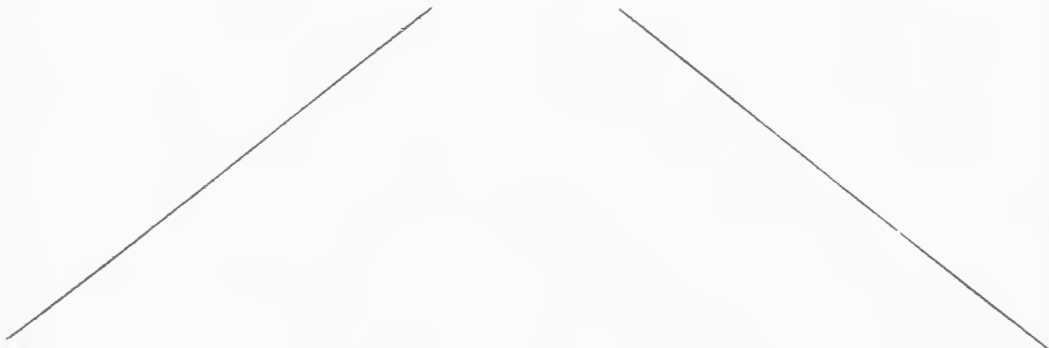

The 1982 President's Awards are co-sponsored by VOLUNTEER: The National Center for Citizen Involvement, a private, nonprofit organization, and ACTION, the federal agency for volunteer service, with program management responsibility resting with VOLUNTEER. In keeping with the President's call for greater private sector initiatives, funding for the program has come from private foundations and corporations.

Members of the National Voluntary Service Advisory Council, private citizens appointed by the President to advise ACTION on policy and program, are serving as the final judges for the President's Volunteer Action Awards.

The President's Volunteer Action Awards is not a one-year program. Rather, it is a continuing annual effort to celebrate the American spirit of volunteering and citizen involvement.
