### THE PRESIDENT'S VOLUNTEER ACTION AWARDS

The President's Volunteer Action Awards Program has been created to call public attention to the contributions of our nation's volunteers and to demonstrate what can be accomplished through voluntary action.

The 1982 President's Awards are co-sponsored by VOLUN-TEER: The National Center for Citizen Involvement, a private, nonprofit organization, and ACTION, the federal agency for volunteer service, with program management responsibility resting with VOLUNTEER. In keeping with the President's call for greater private sector initiatives, funding for the program has come from private foundations and corporations.

Awards are made in the following categories: jobs, health, material resources, education, recreation and the environment, public safety, arts and humanities, with additional awards for special corporate volunteer efforts.

Over 2,000 nominations were received from local, regional and national voluntary organizations, corporations and labor unions, civic and neighborhood groups, fraternal organizations and from ACTION's regional and state offices and its programs and grantees. Additional requests for nominations were generated by announcement of the program in news stories, by syndicated columnists and public service announcements on major radio networks.

Members of the National Voluntary Service Advisory Council, private citizens appointed by the President to advise ACTION on policy and program, are serving as the final judges for the President's Volunteer Action Awards.

The President's Volunteer Action Awards is not a oneyear program. Rather, it is a continuing annual effort to celebrate the American spirit of volunteering and citizen involvement.


