Dear Mr. President,

The book I am sending you may look a little shopworn, but that is only because it is my last copy save one of an out-of-print volume which I translated fifteen years ago for the author, who was a good friend of mine.

The book was not a success in the U.S., which was perhaps not surprising because it is the account of the fight against Hitler by one of the strongly conservative and deeply religious opponents of Hitler and his regime. To the American liberal opinionmakers, such an account was naturally anathema; it was not reviewed by the major newspapers.

It is precisely for that reason, however, that I believe you should read it; it may add invaluable dimensions to your concept of the totalitarian scourge, which has so many similarities in both its "brown" and its "red" forms. I know, because as an American child in Europe, I witnessed them both. I thought that you might perhaps have a little more time than usual during your period of recuperation from your injury, and this book may just be something you might like to read.

Unfortunately, Fabian von Schlabrendorff died just two months before your election from a heart attack, and so was not able to rejoice in your victory. That he would have rejoiced I know, for the drift in the U.S. had long been worrying him; he had a great affection for this country!

May I take this opportunity to tell you how deeply grateful we all are that the hand of God was with you on that fateful March 30, and with the others, too! I take it as an omen that you have been chosen to help this country back on the right track!

May you continue to make a good and complete recovery; our prayers are with you.

Dear Senator Helms,

I wish to thank you for your support of my efforts to secure a position with this Administration in the Department of Defense. Although I received the formal endorsement of six Senators and three Representatives, I recently learned that I was not chosen to fill the specific positions that I sought, or any other position (perhaps I was reaching too high from a GS-13 positionion, although I'd have considered virtually anything to get me into a more appropriate situation). But life goes on, and now I seek your support in another area.

Last Fall, I sculpted a statue that the head of the V.A. transition team (of which I was a member), Bill Ayres, eventually presented to Max Cleland (the triple-amputee Vietnam veteran who was the outgoing Head of V.A.) and So to the formal V.A. structure, as a gesture of inclusion directed to all Vietnam veterans. The presentation took place on 26 January 1981, the day the hostages returned to the U.S. from hospitals in Germany, and so it got no press coverage. However, I enclose a copy of V.A.'s press release, a photo of Bill Ayres, Max Cleland and myself, and a copy of the speech I delivered on that occasion, which explains the genesis and the meaning of the statue. I also enclose several photos of the statue. As you can see, the base is the Purple Heart (I was awarded two Purple Hearts in Vietnam myself). What more appropriate gift could be presented to President Reagan than that statue? When Max left V.A. in February, I was called by the holdover staff at V.A. and told that they would place my statue in storage unless I recovered it. The statue is now in my possession, but formally belongs to V.A. I understand that the Military Order of the Purple Heart will soon present a certificate to President Reagan, but I believe that the statue would be much more important - an acknowledgement of offering and sacrifice, presented by we young men who have bled for our country to our Commander in Chief who has also bled for our country and who is indissolubly our brother now that our blood has mixed on the sword of our nation's enemy. He stood up for us during the campaign with his "noble cause" comment (see my enclosed N.Y. Times letter), now we want to stand up for him, and welcome him formally into the brotherhood of those who have bled for America. I think the President and the whole nation will be touched.

If you agree with me about this, Morton Blackwell of the Public Relations staff at the White House has more detailed pictures of the statue, and is considering proposing this presentation to whoever makes this sort of decision. A phone call of endorsement from you to the White House would be most helpful, I am sure. The appropriate date for presentation would seem to be next Sunday, 26 April, since it has been designated as a national day of recognition for Vietnam veterans. If a new V.A. Administrator has been named by then, he would be the ideal person to present the statue to President Reagan. If not, then it would seem that someone from the V.A. transition team would seem appropriate. I am not trying to advance my own cause here, but in that eventuality, I would be most proud to present the statue to President Reagan for V.A.

#### FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

A sculpture depicting the sacrifice made by American servicemen in Vietnam was presented to the Veterans Administration yesterday by the Reagan transition team, whose members dedicated it to outgoing VA chief Max Cleland.

The sculpture, by West Point graduate and two-time
Purple Heart recipient Thomas Merritt Carhart III, of
McLean, Va., was presented by transition team chairman
William H. Ayres.

The work, entitled "The Offering," depicts an infantry officer holding the lifeless body of a comrade in his arms.

Their figures are emerging from the center of a Purple

Heart, which serves as the base of the sculpture.

Ayres, a former Congressman from Ohio, noted that

Carhart had presented the sculpture to the transition

committee, which had given it to VA in honor of Cleland as

well as all Vietnam veterans.

Carhart told Cleland, a triple amputee veteran of the Vietnam war, that "the sculpting of this statue was truly a labor of love, of love for those among us who never came back, but also of love for all the other American men and women who served in Vietnam.

"I present this statue to you, Max, both as the Administrator of VA and also in recognition of all you symbolize, to remain here as a permanent memorial to the Vietnam veteran and his contributions to America."

The statue is Carhart's first, an inspiration he said he received during a visit last year to Arlington National Cemetery. He said that "although I have no artistic skill or experience, I felt driven to make this vision real in the form of a statue." He borrowed four books on sculpting, read them last summer, then went to work.

He told Cleland that he wanted to remind Americans that "not all Vietnam veterans are half-crazed drug addicts or alcoholics or criminals or self-pitying losers. Most of us have made it in life not in spite of our Vietnam experience, but rather because of it."

An Office of Personnel Management compensation program specialist, Carhart said Cleland "is a classic example of strength and power forged by punishment."

Accepting the sculpture, the departing VA Administrator said, "This is a very moving occasion for me. It is very difficult to try to wrap up Vietnam experiences in one way, but I think this is probably the most dramatic visualization of that experience I've ever seen.

"It embodies the act of faith that any soldier has to

exercise, an act of faith that is an offering to his country."

After his discharge from the Army, Carhart earned a law degree from the University of Michigan. He has edited the publication "European Taxation" in the Netherlands, and practiced law in Brussels and Massachusetts before joining OPM last year.

January 29, 1981

I am here today to honor Max Cleland, whose term as Administrator of Veterans Administration is drawing to a close, and in so doing to honor all Vietnam veterans. When we went over there, we all knew what we were facing. Many of us died. Many of us, like Max, suffered permanently disabling injuries. Most of us returned in a relatively sound state of physical health, but we were all psychologically wounded by the confusion and disdain that awaited us in our homeland. Over time, those psychological wounds have healed. America has wanted to turn the page and move on, and so we have moved with her. And yet, recollections remain, some as fresh and vibrant as they were ten years ago - leaves and branches move, shadows shift, and the bright blood of our brothers still shines softly in the jungle-filtered sunlight of memory.

In June of 1980, some eight months ago now, as I walked among the headstones of Arlington National Cemetery, I had a very powerful and moving vision that spoke to me the meaning and the essence of our Vietnam experiences. Although I have no artistic skill or experience, I felt driven to realize this vision in the form of a statue, and so I went to the local public library, where I checked out four "how to" books on sculpture. I studied them over the summer, then sculpted my vision in the Fall.

This is the result. I call it "The Offering". The base of the statue is the Purple Heart, which is presently awarded to those military personnel who have been wounded or killed as a result of enemy action. Until World War II, the Purple Heart was also awarded for valor or for meritorious performance of duty. On the back of the actual Purple Heart medal is found the inscription "FOR MILITARY MERIT"; this accolade is fitting for those Americans who served their country's cause in Vietnam. The Purple Heart serves as an important historically connective symbol here : the lives lost, the wounds suffered express the same profoundly patriotic statement of self-sacrifice that they have always expressed in all other wars; we were that same cohort of young Americans out of every generation who have always been willing, when called upon, to literally offer our lives for our country. In the center of the actual Purple Heart medal is a profile, in gold, of George Washington. His place is taken in this statue by two American soldiers. The color and location are appropriate, for they have been tested in the furnace of that war and found to be madeof gold, and the survivors will truly become the new Fathers of our country. The soldier standing knee-deep in a rice paddy roiled by the rotor wash from the medical evacuation helicopter hovering just above him in our mind's eye wears the collar insignia of a Captain; he is a Company Commander, the "Old Man" in common Army parlance. The soldier he holds in his arms is about two-thirds his size, smooth-cheeked, young and innocent; the average age of an infantryman in Vietnam was nineteen, as opposed to twentysix in World War II. The "Old Man" is, on one psychic level, lifting the body of a young soldier up into a medical evacuation helicopter; on a second level, he is offering fallen American youth back to America as evidence of the price that was exacted; on a third level, this is the modern version of Abraham offering the life of his son up to God, save only that in this instance, the sacrifice of America's most beloved son has already been consummated The sculpting of this statue was truly a labor of love, of love for those of us who

never came back, but also of love for all the other American men and women who served in Vietnam. Not all Vietnam veterans are half-crazed drug addicts or alcoholics or criminals or self-pitying losers; most of us have made it in life not in spite of our Vietnam experience, but rather because of it. Max is a classic example of strength and courage forged by punishment; there's not much more that could have been done to him physically, but he thrives! I present this statue to you, Max, both as the Administrator of V.A. and also in recognition of all that you symbolize, to remain here as a permanent memorial to the Vietnam veteran and his contributions to America. This does not mark the end of our presence in roles of leadership in this nation, but rather just the beginning. For we are strong now, and secure, and self-confident; and self-aware, and self-disciplined; we know the ways of the world, we have learned the meaning and the unes of power, and we are

ready, once again, to serve our country.

To the Editor:


Recently, Ronald Reagan said that our Vietnam experience was a "noble cause." Since then, this comment has been cynically attacked in the press and on radio and television as naïve and simpleminded, and I understand that Mr. Reagan's candidacy has suffered from it.

As a former soldier awarded two Purple Hearts in Vietnam (January and June 1968), I believe I speak for the millions of other American men and women who are Vietnam veterans when I thank Mr. Reagan for his recognition of the price we paid. I was a young man. I didn't know much. I believed we were fighting to defend the freedom of South Vietnam's people and I still believe that today. I don't know whether the American military presence in Vietnam was right or wrong in some absolute sense, but I disagree with those who feel that the present Communist governments in Indochina are bands of angels, given the millions of their own countrymen who have been slaughtered, sent off to "reeducation camps" never to be heard of again, or ruthlessly thrown into the sea.

Indeed, I believe that our Vietnam experience was a "noble cause." I am proud that I served my country in its hour of distress, and if needed, I would serve again without the slightest hesitation. Perhaps it's just that freedom has a special sweetness for those who have laid their lives on the line for it; or perhaps I, too, am naïve and simpleminded.

I am saddened that some Americans can criticize Mr. Reagan because he honors those who offered their lives for America. But his voice is too lonely on the present political stage. Those who served that "noble cause," the survivors and the dead, are grateful to have a spokesman in Mr. Reagan.
