Medallion Award

The Leonardo da Vinci Society's Medallion, executed by John Calabro from the self-portrait of da Vinci, features the bust of the great Italian artist, scientist and philosopher. The medallion is produced by the Medallion Arts Company of New York.

We believe that the United States of America is a repository for all cultures; the Leonardo da Vi Society dedicates itself to bringing to light and use the Italian facet of world culture.

Among the Society's accomplishments

- Sponsoring an annual symposium (the theme of which varies with anticipated need) to stimulate interest in the Italian language and improve the methods of teaching it. The symposium is held at a nearby university. Educators, teachers, guidance counsellors and administrators are invited to attend, as are students. Upward of 200 attend, including participants from other states and the District of Columbia. Educators recognize this symposium as one of the most effective in the State of New Jersey.
- Awarding an annual \$1000 scholarship to a needy graduating Bergen County high school student who has excelled in the study of Italian and who has been accepted by a college where he will continue study of the language.
- Presenting a bronze medallion to one graduating student from each Bergen County high school, who has excelled in the combined studies of Italian and Science or Italian and Arts.
- Being a direct influence in having the Italian language introduced on a parity with other languages where it did not formerly appear on the curriculum of four Bergen County high schools.
- Being instrumental in helping the Italian language receive accredited standing at Montclair State College.

- Conducting classes in Italian. The Society supports a staff of qualified professional teachers to conduct classes for members and non-members, including children's classes on Saturday mornings.
- Encouraging participaton in Italian folk dancing; performing at various Society functions.
- Sponsoring an annual art show open to interested professionals, amateurs, and children.
 Prizes are awarded in each of these categories.
- Making a substantial contribution toward publication of Social Background of the Italo-American School Child (Brill Publishing Company) by Dr. Leonard Covello.
- Contributing to the Italian Flood Relief to assist the victims and for restoration of priceless art damaged in the flood in Florence.
- Contributing to the Villaggio del Superdotato in Sicily. This school offers an opportunity to gifted disadvantaged children who upon being tested surpass a minimum of 130 IQ and who otherwise would not have access to a high school education.
- Dedicating the Christopher Columbus Memorial Plaza on October 11, 1971, on a parcel of land at the juncture of Palisade Avenue, Route 5 and Columbia Avenue, Fort Lee, New Jersey.
