Dear Governor Thornburgh:

I am responding to your letter to President Reagan, and the Resolution of the Coalition of Northeastern Governors regarding the Northeast Water Crisis.

The Federal-State partnership called for in the Resolution is very much in line with Interior's concept of how to address water issue problems. We expect this partnership to be based on the Administration's premise that states' have primary rights in water laws and allocations. Implicit in this premise is that states' will have responsibilities as well.

The Fresident has proposed the establishment of an Office of Water Policy to be housed by Interior in the Land and Water Resources Division. Pending appropriation by Congress, this office would begin functioning October 1, 1981, and provide the mechanism for an ongoing, dynamic communication with the states. A Federal-State partnership, such as you suggest, will certainly be feasible as states' policies, problems and plans become known at the federal level.

I would like to visit with you when you are next in Washington, and discuss further your ideas for a State-Federal partnership. I hope to hear from you soon in this regard.

SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A CONCERTED EFFORT BY FEDERAL AND STATE OFFICIALS AND AGENCIES TO ELIMINATE FEDERAL REGULATIONS WHICH ADVERSELY AFFECT INTERSTATE AND INTERNATIONAL MARKETING OF MEAT AND POULTRY PRODUCTS.

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii entered into a contractual agreement with the federal government in 1967 stipulating that state inspection of meat and poultry slaughterhouse and processing facilities in the State of Hawaii would be of a rigorous nature, "equal to" the strict guidelines of federal inspections; and

WHEREAS, the federal government, pursuant to the contract, provides fifty per cent of the budgetary requirement for the operation of the state inspection service; and

WHEREAS, at least four times a year a team of federal inspectors come to Hawaii to review the meat and poultry facilities as well as the work of the state inspection teams; and

WHEREAS, this inspection program has existed for the last fourteen years and reportedly with great success; and

WHEREAS, federal regulations simultaneously prohibit processed meat from state-inspected facilities to be exported out of state to other states or territories of the Union, or out of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the regulations impose a major impediment to the marketing and sales efforts of meat and poultry producers in the State of Hawaii not to mention the belief expressed that these regulations unfairly infringe upon the generally accepted practices in commerce; and

WHEREAS, if the state inspections done have been certified as being "equal to" federal inspections, then the regulation prohibiting state-inspected products from interstate and international trade seems clearly to be an ill-conceived regulation which unnecessarily hampers economic trade and the health of these industries; and

WHEREAS, a rapidly emerging national issue which appears to be gaining growing public support is the conviction that there is an over-abundance of cumbersome and unnecessary federal regulations which adversely impact upon state and local governments; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1981, that the President of the United States, United States Department of Agriculture, the United States Congress, the Governor of the State of Hawaii, and the Hawaii Departments of Agriculture and Planning and Economic Development are respectfully urged to join in a concerted effort to do away with the prohibition on interstate and international commerce concerning meat and poultry products which have been produced by processing facilities which are state-certified, provided that such facilities meet state inspection standards which are at least equal to federal requirements; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the United States Secretary of Agriculture, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, each member of Hawaii's congressional delegation, the Governor of the State of Hawaii, the State Director of Planning and Economic Development and the State Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture.

STATEMENT OF MOTIVES

The President of the United States, Ronald Reagan, has asked the Congress to approve a series of budget cuts in order to balance the National Budget, control inflation which reduces the purchasing power of the dollar in detriment of the citizens, and stimulate the economy to produce more and better-paying jobs, while he proposes another series of tax cuts which will compensate, to a great extent, the negative effect of these reductions on the Nation's economy.

Our Island is going through a period of severe economic straits, of rising cost of living, and an unemployment rate which has soared to over 20% according to the latest figures.

If all the cuts in Federal Programs that have been mentioned to date are extended to Puerto Rico, this would have an extremely adverse impact causing severe social, economic and political disruption which would tend to exacerbate our already difficult situation. The proposed reduction of the child nutrition programs, school lunch programs, and food stamp programs, would affect the neediest classes negatively. The elimination of the welfare programs for the poor, the limitation of the BEOG grants, and other Federal appropriations that have been supplementing the Island's economy to date, will further complicate the situation.

Puerto Rico's economy has been kept afloat during the recent years primarily because its government agencies and instrumentalities have had recourse to certain Federal resources which have made the rendering of services and the development of local capital works possible, and have allowed thousands of Puerto Ricans to avail themselves of job opportunities.

This drastic cut of essential economic resources will produce a grave upheaval in the economic stability of the Island. Puerto Rico has already been hit by an increase of over \$2,000 million a year in the cost of oil, that could bring to a halt the economic and social progress of the country, which has been making use of this aid to create new sources of wealth, jobs, care of the ill and the needy, and the education of our youth, which reaffirm the democratic institutions that Puerto Rico has adopted from the United States, and serve as an example of what the free enterprise system can achieve under the institutions of freedom, to insure the welfare and progress of a people.



HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 124

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO CONTINUE FULL FUNDING OF THE TENNESSEE-TOMBIGBEE WATERWAY PROJECT.

WHEREAS, construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway began in December of 1972 with the commitment of federal and state monies to fund the project to completion; and

WHEREAS, this model partnership among governments at all levels and the private sector is estimated to be completed in 1986 at a total cost of \$1.96 Billion, comprised of federal and nonfederal funds; and

WHEREAS, through the federal fiscal year ending September 30, 1981, \$1.099 Billion of federal funds has been allocated to the project and \$1.005 Billion of said funds has been obligated under contract or paid pursuant thereto; and

WHEREAS, construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project is approaching two-thirds completion; and

WHEREAS, the contract for the final major structure on the project, being Lock E in Mississippi, will be let at the end of March of this year; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, which will link fourteen different river systems to the Gulf of Mexico, will be beneficial to the Nation as it will provide an easily accessible, low-cost, energy-efficient and modern system for transporting vital commodities; and

WHEREAS, during 1986, the first year of full operation of the Waterway, it is projected that 28,000,000 tons of commodities will be moved thereon at an annual savings of \$3.28 per ton in transportation costs; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway will provide a direct route for coal which will help the Nation realize its potential for energy self-sufficiency utilizing American coal rather than OPEC oil and will enable the United States to balance trade with other nations, resulting in a strengthened American dollar; and

WHEREAS, it is projected that 21.04 million tons of coal will be moved on the Waterway at an annual savings of \$2.89 per ton in transportation costs; and

WHEREAS, it is projected that the average annual savings in transportation costs for all commodities moved on the Waterway in 1986 will be \$105 Million and such average annual savings over a fifty-year period will be \$121 Million annually; and

WHEREAS, on the completed portion of the Waterway between Aliceville, Alabama, and Mobile, Alabama, 111,420 tons of commodities, including 5,000,000 bushels of wheat and soybeans, were transported last year; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, as a wise public investment of capital in an underdeveloped area of the Nation, has already won the approval of our free enterprise system as reflected by the investment of nearly half a billion dollars in counties bordering on the Waterway; and







We must end Regionalism To save self-government and Our Freedom in America!

Do you know there are radicals in top posts in our government who want to control our lives through a socialist dictatorship? These radicals have attained power over us through **Regional Government.** Our country has been divided into ten regions where the bureaucrats have greater power than our elected officials on the federal, state or local level.

Under **Regional Government** their federal spending now costs us over one billion dollars a day. This is \$50 billion a year more than our taxes can pay. This has created a national debt of over \$1 trillion, on which we must be taxed to pay the interest!

Regional Government is bankrupting our nation and destroying our Republic and our freedom. It is reorganizing our government for Socialism to take us into a world government. International Socialism is Communism. Americans need to know this now.

The following facts (and those in the previous Fact Finder) were brought to us by Colonel Arch Roberts (AUS-Ret.), who is director of the Committee To Restore The Constitution, and a national authority on Regional Government. Here are additional highlights of his recent talk to the Arizona Breakfast Club, along with portions of his printed material:

Consuming inflation and ruinous escalating taxes suffered by Americans during the past decade are our legacy from **Regional Government**. Regionalism is a

- The Department of Education, which is to indoctrinate future citizens for socialism, has now been placed under the control of the National Education Association (NEA), which is one of the strongest and most radical unions in the U.S.
- The Department of Energy, economic control over all means of production.

Regionalism is a new kind of government, a third layer of government that is rapidly eliminating elected officials at the county and state levels and replacing those elected officials with bureaucratic appointees. This means the elimination of the elective process, because you cannot un-elect an administrator who is appointed to a position in government, local, state or federal. So we are rapidly losing our right to defend our liberties by electing people to office who will represent us. Our freedom is fading fast—unless we take action now on the state level to save our Constitutional form of government.

Federal Regionalism was launched on the 27th of March, 1969, by Richard M. Nixon, then President of the United States, by Executive Order. An Executive Order is a circumvention of the authority of the Congress of the United States. Executive Orders, for those who may not be familiar with this technique, have largely replaced the legislative process of the Congress and even of your own State Legislature.

An Executive Order, when it is placed in *The Federal Register*, becomes the law of the land unless it is challenged within 30 days by the Congress of the United States. *The Federal Register* has become a repository for administrative law. Now, administrative law is a contradiction in terms. There can be no such thing as administrative law because no administrator can make law. And yet we find that those without legislative authority are indeed making laws. Mr. Nixon introduced into *The Federal Register* Executive Order

11640, which set up and established a new kind of government in the United States. This Executive Order did a number of things. Now, you know the President has no law-making authority, yet he made the law by appointing a new kind of government in the United States—that's the first subversion.

The second subversion obviously is that as the Executive Order calls for the merging of the 50 Sovereign States into ten Federal Regions, this is a violation of Article IV, Section 3 of the Constitution, which prohibits the merger of two or more states into larger political units.

Who originated and engineered Executive Order 11640 to change our government? Who is behind this effort?

All of these programs are funded and financed directly and motivated by the international banking groups, among these, the Rockefeller Foundation. For example, we find that there was an organization called The Brookings Institution, which was primarily responsible for promoting the acceptance or to create a public climate for this new constitution out of the universities. The Brookings Institution raised some questions in our mind, so we researched all of the major foundations in the United States. There were over 500 of them. We found that The Brookings Institution was but one of seven major policy organizations controlled and directed by the Rockefeller Foundation. This does not mean that the Rockefeller Foundation is alone, but it is a central directorship for this program. The reason they are able to do this with the vast funding is the fact that they created so-called tax-exempt foundations. All the rest of us pay taxes and lose our sovereignty in the process, but the foundations have vast reservoirs of financial power and, therefore, political authority.

Mr. Nixon was a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, sometimes called "the secret government of the United States." The Council on Foreign Relations is one of the seven major policy agencies under the control of the Rockefeller family. It should also be pointed out that Jimmy Carter himself is a charter member of the Trilateral Commission. The Trilateral Commission is another agency controlled and funded by the Rockefellers, in fact, David Rockefeller of the Chase Manhattan Bank is the chairman of the Trilateral Commission. So they have already established their infrastructure in the federal level of government to be sure that their agent and their objectives will accomplish those objectives through the control of those who are elected to high positions in government.

Nine grant-making agencies are the coordinators.

Using revolutionary funds, they coerce local and state government to go along under threat of losing federal funds. Our tax dollars are used to blackmail local officials at county and state levels to go along with the revolution under threat of losing federal funds.

Those nine grant-making agencies have proliferated into 500 sub-agencies that are involved in spending our money for welfare projects in order to bring controls over our elected officials. On July 20 of last year, our leader—Mr. Carter—entered into a new regional pact which increased these grant-making agencies to 17. So there are now vastly more grant-making agencies than there were even a year ago.

Keep in mind that no funds are dispersed through any of these 17 grant-making agencies without first having the application for those funds from the local and state government or any other intervening agency approved by what is called a A-95 review system. The A-95 review system is controlled by the Bureau of the Budget. The system is the criteria by which the local unit of government will get federal funds. How many local government units do you believe will get federal funds if they refuse to go along with the guidelines?

Answer—absolute zero. Why? Because this is the procedure to coerce local state officials into believing there's a free lunch. This clout causes local and state officials to sell out their constituency. They now take their orders from the non-elected officials of the Federal Regions. It is the region that makes political decisions and enforces those decision by threat of taking away or refusing to give out federal funds.

To understand the background of Regionalism, you have to go back to the passage of the Federal Reserve Act in 1913. At that time those who controlled the central government took over control of the economy of the United States. By controlling the flow of so-called money, now Federal Reserve Notes, the central bankers actually control the economy of the United States. And this is the procedure they used to communize such major industries as the Chrysler Corporation. By controlling the money, they control the economy of the United States. The three major acts of 1913, the Federal Reserve Act, the 16th Amendment, and the 17th Amendment, all prepared the way for the revolution that we are in now. The 17th Amendment destroyed the authority of the States to supervise legislation in the Congress. Before the 17th Amendment, the States appointed their Senators. With the 17th Amendment, Senators merely became another representative. In other words, they are now subject to the controllers in Washington. So the States lost supervisory control over federal legislation.

These three actions of 1913 created the program of the revolution that we now experience. They transferred real power from elected officials and the controlling of the funding of the American society—the economy of America—from the legislators in Washington into the hands of international bankers. By impoverishing agriculture, they created the free lunch syndrome wherein local officials started looking to Washington for a handout.

Those who control the land control the people who live on the land. And it is as simple as that. If you place government in control of all resources, land, water and air, you've recast the character of our government.

When we talk about some regional planner rezoning your farm land, we are talking about a real revolution which is part of the world revolution.

Europe has been regionalized. Russia has been regionalized. The idea is to ultimately merge all these regionalized nations, including the United States, into a world government.

The Preamble to the U.S. Constitution says, "We, the People of the United States." In other words, the people are the government. We have lost sight of this reality. We have come to believe that we must obey the dictates of any elected official or of any administrator regardless of our own knowledge of the Constitutional illegality. The second thing we must understand is that this program within the States in which we are now involved (to abolish Regional Government) is authorized by the structure of the Constitution itself.

The Constitution of the United States created a new political power in the world—the sovereign individual! By virtue of the vote, we gained the right to elect individuals to office who would represent our interests; and if they did not, we could un-elect them at the next elective process. But today, under Federal Regionalism, the American people are permitting that sacred right, that responsibility, to slip away—to be replaced by a serf society in which you and I will commit our descendants to the same serf system that our ancestors suffered under in Europe or elsewhere. So we are fighting a reality of what is happening in America, not political theory, because it is happening to us right now.

A CONCURRENT MEMORIAL

URGING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES TO ABANDON FEDERAL REGIONALISM AND NEGATE AN EXECUTIVE ORDER.

To the President of the United States of America:

Your memorialist respectfully represents:

Whereas, this state is dutybound to enforce the Constitution of the United States within its borders; and

Whereas, no authority is granted under the Constitution of the United States for any of the agencies established under the terms of the Constitution either to group several sovereign states into one "region" or to coerce the division of any state into sub-state "regions"; and

Whereas, such ultra vires acts by any federal agency abridge rights and liberties of this state and its people without lawful authority; and

Whereas, by means of a purported act falsely claiming to have lawful authority, a former President of the United States claimed under Executive Order no. 11647 to combine the states into ten regions; and

Whereas, being legislative in nature, the purported act was void under Article I of the Constitution of the United States which vests "all legislative power herein granted" in the Congress; and

Whereas, no authority was granted by the states or by Congress to exercise any such "regional" control over any one or any group of the parties to the constitutional compact; and

Whereas, combining the states in any manner not provided by the Constitution of the United States violates Article IV, Section 3, as well as Amendments IX and X of the Constitution of the United States; and

Whereas, state, county and city governments may lose or have lost their traditional control over their proper state and local governmental functions due to the usurpation of their powers by federal agencies; and

Whereas, existing governmental arrangements which are desirable and efficient need not be discontinued nor appropriate distributions of federal monies interfered with if federal regionalism is abandoned; and

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Whereas, federal "regions" merely establish an additional layer of governmental bureaucracy which tends to establish and perpetuate its own requirements, interests, policies and purposes.

Wherefore your memorialist, the House of Representatives of the State of

Arizona, the Senate concurring, prays:

1. That the President of the United States abandon the concept of federal regionalism, negate Executive Order no. 11647 and allow state and local governments to make whatever contacts they require directly to the federal governmental offices in Washington, D.C.

2. That the Secretary of State of the State of Arizona transmit copies of this Memorial to the President of the United States and to each

Member of the Arizona Congressional Delegation.

NOTE: This HCM passed the House of Representatives on 4-15-81 40 ayes - 7 nayes - 13 absent

This HCM failed in the Senate on 4-23-81 12 ayes - 14 nayes - 4 not voting

(Apparently it was felt in the Senate this HCM might jeopardize federal funds for the indigent poor and other federal programs.)
