

Legislative resolution condemning the unlawful and cruel detention of Vladimir Kislik and urging his immediate release for the purpose of emigrating from the Soviet Union to the State of Israel

Whereas, Vladimir Kislik, a distinguished scientist, determined to depart from the Soviet Union in nineteen hundred seventy-three in order to freely practice the traditions of the Jewish heritage as well as on numerous occasions since that year has been denied the basic human right to free emigration; and

Whereas, Vladimir Kislik's aspiration to emigrate has resulted in his employment being limited to menial labor by Soviet authorities, the confiscation of his personal belongings, and other indignities, including the Soviet police repeatedly questioning him for the purpose of "trumping up" foreign agent charges against other Soviet Jews; and

Whereas, Vladimir Kislik, a distinguished scientist, has had his name deleted from the important scientific papers he wrote while engaged in research at the Kiev Institute of Nuclear Research, and has been beaten by Soviet Authorities as a warning to him to stop holding scientific seminars; and

Whereas, Vladimir Kislik remains within the Soviet Union, despite the emigration of his son, Maxim Kislik, to Israel, thereby placing Vladimir Kislik in the ranks of many Soviet parents who are unfortunately separted from their children by the design of Soviet Union officials; and Whereas, Vladimir Kislik has endured persecution, harassment, imprisonment and family separation simply because of his desire to

Whereas, Vladimir Kislik has recently been charged by Soviet Authorities with "malicious Hooliganism," unjustly convicted, and subsequently sentenced to a three year term; and

practice his own religion in a country of his choice; and

Whereas, The Legislature of the State of New York, which holds justice, freedom and liberty as the highest ideals, urges the Soviet Union to immediately free Vladimir Kislik and permit him to join his family in Israel in the name of human rights and human justice; and

Whereas, The Soviet Union's continuing persecution of its Jewish citizens and denial of those rights and privileges accorded other recognized religions in the Soviet Union will not succeed in isolating Soviet Jews from their friends in the world so long as those who hold liberty and freedom as the highest ideal continue to speak out on behalf of all beleagured and oppressed people; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Legislative Body pauses in its deliberations to condemn Vladimir Kislik's continued oppression by Soviet Authorities and urges the Soviet officials to give Jews in the Soviet Union the same rights afforded its other citizens, rights affirmed by the Soviet Union's Constitution, the Declaration of Human Rights adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations and Principle VIII of the Final Act of the Helsinki Accord; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this Resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to The Honorable Ronald W. Reagan, President of the United States; Honorable Hugh L. Carey, Governor of the State of New York; Honorable Alexander Haig, Secretary of State of the United States; and to each member of Congress of the United States from the State of New York; Lynn Singer, Executive Director of the Long Island Committee for Soviet Jewry, 91 North Franklin Street, Hempstead, New York 11550; Leonid Brezhnev, Secretary General of the Communist Party, the Kremlin, RSPR, USSR; and Oleg Troyanovsky, Ambassador, Soviet Mission to the United Nations, 136 East 67th Street, New York, New York 10021.



SENIOR LEGISLATURE JOINT RULES COMMITTEE RESOLUTION NO. 1

RELATIVE TO THE OLDER AMERICANS ACT

WHEREAS, the Older Americans Act as amended expires this year; and

WHEREAS, millions of senior citizens have benefited from the programs provided under the Older Americans Act; and

WHEREAS, the House and Senate Conference Committee presently has under consideration the reenactment of the Older Americans Act and the extension of the programs thereunder; and

WHEREAS, there have been proposals to curtail funds for the programs and make drastic cuts in services; and

WHEREAS, such proposals will seriously affect the lives and well-being of every one of the millions of senior citizens in the State of California and the nation to their physical, psychological and economic detriment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Joint Rules Committee of the Senior Legislature of the State of California, that the Congress of the United States be and they are hereby requested by the California Senior Legislature in session assembled to reenact the Older Americans Act as presently constituted and extend the funds and programs thereunder for a period of three years;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the California Senior Legislature by this concurrent resolution expresses its serious concern regarding any proposals to curtail or make drastic cuts in services or funding;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and to Members of the California Congressional Delegation.

SENIOR LEGISLATURE JOINT RULES COMMITTEE RESOLUTION NO. 3

RELATIVE TO MINIMUM SOCIAL SECURITY ELIMINATION

WHEREAS, the Reagan administration budget eliminates social security beneficiaries who receive the lowest benefit, a minimum of \$122 a month; and

WHEREAS, while the administration claims that only 300,000 of the 3 million will be "hurt", over 30,000 of the lowest income elderly in California will be among these; and

WHEREAS, the assumption that the other 2,700,000 will not be hurt has no factual basis and the majority of these are single older women; and

WHEREAS, the administration's excuse for this action is to get rid of so-called "double-dippers", our information is that only 10 percent fall into this category and even some of these may have incomes amounting to less than that needed to sustain a decent standard of living; and

WHEREAS, President Reagan promised on October 4, 1980, in a debate with President Carter that, "No one presently dependent on social security is going to have the rug pulled out from under them and not get their checks", and in an interview with the AARP-NRTA News he promised that, "Those now receiving benefits, or looking forward to receiving social security benefits, must be protected and payments keep pace with the cost-of-living"; and

WHEREAS, only \$1.4 billion will be saved annually, and much of that will be lost since many of these beneficiaries will become eligible for SSI benefits:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Joint Rules Committee of the California Senior Legislature congratulate Senator Cranston and those California Congressmen who voted to restore this benefit, and further urge the United States Senate and President Reagan to reconsider their positions and to initiate a year long study to determine how many of the poorest elderly will be hurt by elimination of this benefit and how those who are not legitimately entitled to this benefit may be eliminated. \$1.4 billion dollars is a small price to pay to protect those most in need;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and to Members of the California Congressional Delegation.



WHEREAS, unless the Social Security system is shored up by additional funding or increased taxes, the American working public will soon be unable to receive payment for retirement benefits; and

WHEREAS, currently some thirty-five million American citizens receive benefits from the old age and disability funds; and

WHEREAS, the Treasury Department announced the order to American banks to turn over once-frozen Iranian assets of over two billion three hundred million dollars to the Federal Reserve Bank in New York City; and

WHEREAS, instead of returning these assets to this hostile Mideastern nation, our country should use these assets to assist the floundering old age and retirement fund; and

WHEREAS, the Congress should consider this alternative for funding in its study and review of the report by the board of trustees of the Social Security system.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana, the Senate thereof concurring that the Congress of the United States is hereby memorialized to authorize the transfer of Iranian assets from the Federal Reserve Bank to the Social Security Trust Account.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION

Respectfully requesting that the United States Attorney General and the Commissioner of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service order a stop to violations of United States Public Law 94-241 (48 U.S.C. 1681) and harassment of United States citizens who are residents of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands by officials of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service on Guam and other cities throughout the United States and to take all necessary measures to discipline Immigration and Naturalization Service Officials who violate the law respective entry of citizens of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands into the United States.

- 1 WHEREAS, The Covenant to Establish a Commonwealth of the Northern
- 2 Mariana Islands in Political Union with the United States of America
- 3 (U.S. P.L. 94-241, 48 U.S.C. 1681), hereinafter referred to as
- 4 "Covenant", bestows United States Citizenship and all its rights,
- 5 privileges and responsibilities including the right to travel, work
- 6 and live freely throughout the United States, on the inhabitants of
- 7 the former Marianas District of the U.S. Trust Territory of the
- 8 Pacific Islands; and
- 9 WHEREAS, President Carter, in Presidential Proclamation No. 4534
- 10 issued on October 24, 1977, approved the Constitution of the Northern
- 11 Mariana Islands, specifically Section 8 of the Schedule on Transitional
- 12 Matters which provides for Interim United States citizenship to Northern
- 13 Marianas citizens; and

Dear Mr. President:

We the peoples of the Pacific Islands appeal to you as Chief Executive for help in a matter that is of crucial concern to all of us and our children. Since the birth of the Atomic Age in 1940, the Pacific Islands have served as a testing ground for the development of atomic technologies. Beginning with U.S. nuclear testing in the Marshall Islands, our people have suffered the consequences of atomic energy without reaping any of the putative benefits.

And now we are struggling against a monstrous new threat, a threat that promises to destroy our most important natural resource, for now and the indefinite future; a threat that could cut short our aspirations to enter the 21st century as a modern, developed society; a threat that could shatter our embryonic economy before it has a chance to get on its feet; and a threat that looms large in our minds and hearts. This new threat takes the form of nuclear poisoning of the ocean waters that bathe our shores and give us our daily bread.

The Japanese government has announced its intention to dispose of low-level radioactive wastes into the waters of the Pacific Ocean north of Micronesia. We are an oceanic people, Mr. President. We recognize the intimate connection between the natural cycles of the sea and the natural cycles of our own lives. We believe, on the basis of sound scientific evidence, that the ocean is the worst possible place for nuclear wastes. The ocean is a formidable environment; its pressures and corrosive forces make mockery of human structures like radioactive waste containers. The ocean is an unknown environment, with powerful new forces and currents discovered on a nearly annual basis. The ocean is a vast, interconnected and living environment, full of life forms that can readily incorporate radioactive wastes deposited there. We ask now, Mr. President, that you reciprocate by helping to end this monstrous new threat to our health, happiness and livelihoods.

WHEREAS, the root of illegal migration from Mexico into the United States is the lack of reasonable alternatives for economic well-being in Mexico relative to those in the United States; and

WHEREAS, attempts to seal the vast border between the United States and Mexico to the flow of migrants are doomed to failure and only increase the exploitation of such workers by smugglers and unscrupulous employers; and

WHEREAS, in order to eliminate the present large and uncontrolled influx of undocumented workers in Idaho a system of temporary legal admissions should be established; and

WHEREAS, the vast majority of jobs that will be taken by Mexicans in Idaho are in the agricultural and service industries where jobs are not now greatly in demand by American workers; and

WHEREAS, many of the short-term economic needs of Mexicans and the short-term labor needs of Idaho agriculture and service industries can be met by a temporary worker visa program for Mexicans seeking temporary employment in the United States; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to establish a legal framework for Mexican labor in the United States and Idaho in order to harmonize the use of such workers and to better protect Idaho workers from unfair competition.

NOW, THERFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Extraordinary Session of the Forty-sixth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that members of the Legislature strongly support and urge the passage of amendments to the Immigration and Nationality Act presently before the First Session of the 97th Congress, to establish a temporary worker's visa program between the United States and Mexico.
