MEMORIALIZING RESOLUTION URGING THE FEDÉRAL GOVERNMENT TO REVIEW PERMIT PROCEDURES INVOLVING FEDERAL AGENCIES

WHEREAS, there has been substantial delay relative to the issuance of a permit to construct a revetment on the Great South Bay side of an area formerly and still currently referred to as the Moriches Breach; and

WHEREAS, there has been agreement among all the major agencies involved except one that the installation of a revetment would serve to stabilize and prevent further erosion of the breach fill on the Bay side and thereby lessen the clear and present danger to all residents on or near the Great South Bay who would suffer possible bodily harm and property damage from abnormal high tides as a result of a breakthrough of the former breach; and

WHEREAS, the unconditional installation of the proposed revetment is supported by the Brookhaven Town Board and Trustees; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Legislature of the County of Suffolk join with the Town of Brookhaven in encouraging our Federal legislators both in the United States Senate and United States House of Representatives to review the permit procedures currently in use as they relate to the involvement of Federal agencies toward the end of accomplishing the following:

- 1) Place a concrete time table for review and decision on all Federal agencies involved so as to avoid prolonged delay which only increases the cost that must be born by the taxpayer.
- 2) Make sure that no one Federal agency has veto power to stop or delay any project for an excessive period of time.
- 3) Streamline the permit format, making it clear, concise and understandable to the average person; and be it further

Dear President Reagan:

At a Special Town Meeting held in the Town of Amherst on October 19, 1981 Town Meeting Members, by a tallied vote of YES 96, NO 43, passed the following RESOLUTION ON MILITARY SPENDING and directed the Town Clerk to send copies thereof to the President of the United States and representatives in both houses of Congress:

Whereas military spending is inherently inflationary, creating disposable income in return for the production of goods and services not generally available for purchase; and,

Whereas military spending requires a signficantly greater capital investment per job created than any other sector of our economy save large-scale energy production; and,

Whereas military spending, directed primarily toward producers over whom no effective cost or productivity control has been exercised, distorts the allocation of material and human resources within our economy in an inflationary manner; and,

Whereas in recent times the failure of certain administrations either to raise taxes to pay for military spending and/or to impose wage, price, and credit controls (as was done during WW II and the Korean War) has led directly to greatly increased inflation; and,

Whereas the American public appears to favor, and the Congress has voted, significant reductions in federal taxes; and,

Whereas that same public appears unwilling to endure wage, price, and credit controls without the gravest of causes; and,

Whereas the existence of such grave causes is not now generally acknowledged; and,

SAR

Whereas reductions in non-military spending voted thus far by the 97th Congress will cruelly affect non-whites, the poor, women, and the elderly, and have been more than matched by authorized increases in military spending;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Amherst Representative Town Meeting, by a vote of YES 96, NO 43, hereby calls upon the President of the United States and its representatives in both houses of Congress to cease their efforts to reduce the non-military components of the budget and to use every means at their disposal to reduce the military authorizations for the fiscal years 1982-1985 to levels consistent with the monies available from taxation.

Dear Mayor Brimmer:

I am replying to your letter and enclosed proclamation to President Reagan concerning human rights, especially in El Salvador. I regret that this response has been so long delayed.

This Administration is firmly committed to the promotion of human rights. Further, the procedure you recommended, that human rights considerations be a prerequisite to future foreign aid, already exists in the Foreign Assistance Act (Section 502B) which states that "a principal goal of the foreign policy of the United States is to promote the increased observance of internationally recognized human rights by all countries." For El Salvador, the law also requires a certification from the Administration that progess has been made in five areas: human rights, control of the military, economic reforms, elections, and the investigation into the murders of Americans in El Salvador.

As Department of State officials have testified, there is no doubt that the human rights situation is troubled and that the violations - by the left as well as by the right and the military - have been many. However, progress has been made. We cannot be satisfied until the killing has stopped, but we firmly believe the trend is positive. Thus, we have given the Congress the certification of progress in

That the City Council strongly urges the President and the Congress to reject any proposals to cut further or eliminate the CDBG AND UDAG programs and to fund these programs at their fully authorized levels.

# POSITION OF THE DU PAGE COUNTY BOARD ON FEDERAL EXPENDITURES

WHEREAS, it has become manifestly clear that, regardless of the best intentions of its proponents, massive federal spending over a period of five decades has enmeshed this country and its people in the oppression of rampant inflation, intolerably high interest rates, growing unemployment and other economic ills; and

WHEREAS, the DuPage County Board understands that it has itself been the recipient and beneficiary of federally funded programs, and

WHEREAS, the County Board shares the conviction that restoration of the economic health of this nation requires that the federal government drastically reduce its spending to come into accord with what its people can bear to pay in taxes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of DuPage County that we encourage the national administration policy of achieving significant economies through reduction or elimination of categorical grant programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, notwithstanding our preferences for continuation of the present national administration policy, we recognize and accept our responsibility to share in the implementation of the difficult remedies which may be necessary to restore our country to a sound economy; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, if the reduction of block grants and the elimination of categorical grants does not sufficiently reduce expenditures to bring the federal government's budget into balance, the federal revenue sharing programs be reduced for the greater welfare of the nation. The DuPage County Board will resolutely support the decision of Congress and the President and adjust its functions and responsibilities and strive for a higher level of efficiency in the delivery of county services to the people; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we trust Congress and the administration to effect similar economies in the delivery of services it provides to the people of our nation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that to assist local government to function within reduced revenues, Federal mandates be significantly revised or eliminated and any future mandates promulgated be with the concurrence of the local governments affected.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Clerk be instructed to send copies of this resolution to our United States Senators and Representatives, the President of the National Association of Counties and to the County Board.



I have been asked to respond to your January 15, 1982, letter to the President enclosing a certified copy of your city's resolution opposing immediate decontrol of natural gas prices.

The Administration is committed to a policy of getting the Government out of the business of regulating the wellhead price of natural gas. We believe it is essential for the Nation to return to the use of the free market to set prices and allocate supplies of our domestic energy resources.

As you know, the Department of Energy has recently released a report ("A Study of Alternatives to the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978") assessing the adequacy of the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978 (NGPA). The study found that the NGPA is unlikely to fulfill the congressional intent underlying its enactment in three ways. First, the NGPA is unlikely to yield a smooth transition to partial decontrol in 1985. Second, the NGPA is likely to disrupt the U.S. gas market. And third, the NGPA is unlikely to capture the benefits of old regulated gas for consumers. The completed study presents a range of proposals to correct the deficiencies of the NGPA, and the President has taken the issue under advisement.

I would note that the major options under consideration do not include immediate deregulation, but rather take a phased approach to decontrol to avoid the abrupt price increases to consumers anticipated under current law. Many of the impacts cited in your resolution are substantially mitigated by a phased approach to decontrol.

Finally, our study concluded that failure to address the deficiencies of the NGPA before 1985 could lead to an extension of price controls. Such an extension could cause a return to the shortage of natural gas seen in the 1970's when the Midwest was particularly hard hit. Industrial gas users in the Midwest are likely to consider relocation if gas is unavailable. The fact that the major industrial user groups favor phased decontrol suggests that they may be willing to pay a higher price for gas if they are assured of an adequate supply.

Thank you for your views on this issue.

A RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO IMMEDIATE DEREGULATION OF NATURAL GAS

WHEREAS, it is widely reported that the Administration of President Ronald Reagan is proposing the immediate and total deregulation of interstate sales of natural gas to the Congress of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978 (NGPA) provides for the gradual deregulation of natural gas in a manner intended to ease the burden on residential customers of such a transition; and

WHEREAS, the American Gas Association has calculated that residential natural gas bills would double in the next year if the wellhead price of natural gas were deregulated in the fall of 1981; and

WHEREAS, experts have predicted that the oil and gas industry would receive a \$10 billion windfall during 1981 alone under immediate deregulation; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Action Foundation has identified the cost to industrial users of natural gas nationwide as an additional \$237 billion during the next five years under immediate deregulation; and

WHEREAS, a U.S. Department of Energy analysis has estimated that the overall inflation rate would increase 2.4% and the unemployment rate would increase .7% during the first full year of complete deregulation; and

WHEREAS, most natural gas used in Ohio by both residential and industrial consumers is supplied by interstate pipelines from wells in other states so that the increase in purchased gas costs flows primarily to pipelines and producers outside of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, even under the NGPA phased deregulation approximately \$15 billion will be paid by Ohioans for gas costs to out-of-state suppliers during the next five years; and

WHEREAS, costs to agriculture for fertilizer and grain drying are directly related to the cost of natural gas; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Commerce has stated that the cost of natural gas for ammonia feedstock has risen 250% in the past six years; and

WHEREAS, increases in natural gas prices will lead to fuel switching by industries with a resulting increased dependence on imported oil; and

WHEREAS, increased costs for natural gas will result in less investment capital available to Ohio industries and thus a continued or increased loss of employment in Ohio; and

WHEREAS, the automobile, steel, glass and clay industries, which are major Cuyahoga County and Ohio industrial employers, are among the industries most dependent on natural gas, and thus the most likely to be forced to relocate to Sunbelt states; and

WHEREAS, gas production will not be improved more by immediate deregulation, because of the declines in use that would result; and

WHEREAS, the proposed immediate and total deregulation would thus increase the burden, including the inflationary burden presently borne by the residents, businesses, industries, governmental bodies, and all others who use natural gas in the City of Independence and other communities throughout Northeastern Ohio and would be a particular hardship on senior citizens and other individuals on fixed incomes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Independence, State of Ohio; that:

- Section 1. The Council of the City of Independence, Ohio is absolutely and unequivocably opposed to the proposed immediate and total deregulation of interstate sales of natural gas.
- Section 2. Council urges other affected municipalities to adopt Resolutions opposing the proposed immediate and total deregulation of natural gas.
- Section 3. The Clerk of Council be and hereby is authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to the President of the United States, Governor James A. Rhodes, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, and other municipalities within Cuyahoga County.
- Section 4. This Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the protection of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Independence by reason of the immediate necessity of opposing the proposed deregulation of natural gas before action is taken by the Federal government regarding same. A RESOLUTION EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO CONSIDERATION OF AREAS IN NORTHEASTERN OHIO AS STORAGE FACILITIES FOR RADIO-ACTIVE NUCLEAR WASTES DUE TO POTENTIAL AND EXTREME ENVIRONMENTAL AND ECOLOGICAL HAZARDS.

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the Mayor and Council of the City of University Heights, Ohio, through the Cuyahoga County Mayors and City Managers Association, the Board of the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency, and numerous other organizations and boards currently monitoring potential environmental dangers, and

WHEREAS, the uncertainty of the exact properties of nuclear wastes and its long-term impact upon the environment and the ecology indicate the gravest possible detrimental effects upon human life, as well as the environment, are possible, and

WHEREAS, the potential danger of nuclear waste to human and environmental life decreases in accordance with a scientific principle known as the "half-life" of the elements, which in regard to nuclear wastes may exceed two hundred thousand years, and

WHEREAS, there is minimal experience with the disposal of nuclear wastes in the United States although experience indicates that atomic waste storage has been banned in the State of Minnesota, prohibited from storage in Louisiana salt domes, placed under legislative control in the State of Vermont and are subject to a one-year moratorium on storage in New Mexico, and

WHEREAS, such experience indicates that it would be extremely dangerous to store nuclear wastes in the northeast region of Ohio which constitutes the most heavily populated area of the state as well as one of the more highly populated sections of the United States, and

WHEREAS, studies made by various agencies do not adequately consider the potential danger of locating such a depository near a highly urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, existing scientific research indicates that many serious problems are associated with the handling and disposal of nuclear wastes; and

WHEREAS, the storage of nuclear wastes in Northeast Ohio is considered to be highly dangerous to the health and welfare of the residents in densely populated Northeast Ohio; and

WHEREAS, State Senator John Timothy McCormack has introduced a Resolution in the 112th General Assembly of Ohio calling upon Governor Rhodes and members of his administration to immediately cease all consideration of storage facilities for radioactive nuclear wastes in Ohio, and



WHEREAS, in 1974, the U.S. Congress passed the Housing and Community Development Act, an innovative program administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and

WHEREAS, Jefferson County, Alabama has been an active participant in the Community Development Block Grant program since its inception; and

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County program includes service to 29 local municipalities and to all unincorporated areas of the County for a total population of 332,000; and

WHEREAS, over the past seven years, this consortium of Jefferson County and its participating municipalities has received \$29,838,000 in Community Development funds aimed at improving the quality of life, with particular emphasis on those families with low or moderate incomes, expanding economic opportunities, removing unsafe or blighting influences and upgrading the communities and neighborhoods of Jefferson County; and

WHEREAS, in conjunction with the federal general revenue sharing program, participation in the Community Development Block Grant program in Jefferson County has made possible the extension of over 600 miles of water lines serving more than 20,000 people; the extension of over 60 miles of sanitary sewer lines benefitting some 17,500 people; the rehabilitation of existing sanitary sewer lines in seven municipalities; the construction or improvement of seven neighborhood recreational and community buildings; the rehabilitation of more than 2,000 owner-occupied housing units providing homes for some 7,000 people; the revitalization of 22 separate neighborhoods in the County, as well as various other improvements, such as replacement of hazardous bridges, renovation and preservation of historical structures, improvements to storm drainage and flooding problems and improvements to facilities involved in health care; and

WHEREAS, Jefferson County has used all these funds in a sensible and businesslike manner and during the first six years of the program, every dollar of Community Development money spent on a project generated one additional dollar of private or other public money, thus injecting an additional \$15,000,000 into the local economy; and

WHEREAS, the Community Development Block Grant program is an "action-oriented" program which enjoys an outstanding record of achievement nationwide and places highest priority on the implementation of needed projects in cities and counties all across the country; and

WHEREAS, eligible activities under this program have recently been expanded to compensate for the loss of other federal programs, thus increasing the importance and credibility of the Community Development program; and

WHEREAS, this block grant program provides a necessary means of returning tax funds to local communities, a major component of the Reagan administration's economic revitalization plan and, further, this program represents a model of federal grant efficiency for the administration to use in its attempts to streamline the federal bureaucracy and reduce unnecessary and wasteful spending; and

WHEREAS, recent proposals by members of the Reagan administration to eliminate funding for the Community Development program would have a drastic and harmful impact on the citizens of our county; and

WHEREAS, such proposals by the Reagan administration contradict the very intergovernmental and economic philosophy of that administration, that being that the most efficient and effective method of providing local government assistance is in the block grant approach.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Jefferson County Commission that the said Commission does hereby express its support for the Community Development Block Grant program for counties and cities all across America, and that the said Commission urges the President of the United States, members of his administration and members of the U. S. Congress to closely examine the Community Development program for its intent, its performance and its achievements, and to remember their own philosophy on federal grant assistance with which this program conforms and to resist and reject any and all further reductions and any attempts to eliminate the Community Development program.
