Discussion

Current law generally prohibits a Federal officer or employee from receiving any salary or other compensation from a source other than the Federal Government for services rendered to the Government. A person who receives such compensation is subject to a prison term of no more than one year or a fine of up to \$5,000, or both.

There are a few minor exceptions to this general rule, however. For example, a person participating in an executive interchange or fellowship program may lawfully receive actual relocation expenses from a source other than the Federal Government. Similarly, certain contributions and awards made under the Government Employees Training Act (P.L.85-507) are not subject to the generally applicable prohibition on receipt of compensation from non-Federal sources.

The enrolled bill creates another limited exception to the general prohibition. It would permit a Federal officer or employee to receive and accept contributions and payments from a non-Federal source if -

- -- the organization making the payment or contribution is exempt from tax under the Internal Revenue Code and qualifies as a charitable organization under the Code; and
- -- the employee is injured during the commission of an assassination, kidnaping or assault on the President, the President-elect, the Vice President, the Vice President-elect, a Member of Congress, or a Member of Congress-elect.

According to the debate in the Senate, the first beneficiary of the enrolled bill will be Press Secretary James Brady, who cannot, it is believed, accept certain donations that may be offered to him as a result of his injury.

In its views letter, the Department of the Treasury advises that an organization established to collect donations to be given to persons covered by the enrolled bill must satisfy the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable regulations in order to qualify as a charitable organization. In this connection, we have been told by the Office of the Counsel to the President that such an organization may qualify as a charitable organization as long as it is established to assist the category of persons covered by the enrolled bill and not just a single beneficiary. The Department of Justice advises that the enrolled bill does not address the possible conflicts a contribution made to a Federal employee might have with the Standards of Ethical Conduct and regulations issued under Executive Order 11222. We understand that appropriate modifications may be made to the Executive Order and regulations, if necessary, to permit the operation of the exemption established by the enrolled bill.

Pursuant to your request, I have examined a facsimile of enrolled bill S. 2333, a bill "[t]o amend section 209 of title 18, United States Code, to permit an officer or employee of the United States Government, injured during an assassination attempt, to receive contributions from charitable organizations.

To the extent that it was previously unclear whether or to what extent Federal employees who are victims of assassination attempts could receive such contributions under §209 of title 18, we believe that this bill resolves that ambiguity and clearly permits such receipt.

We would note that this bill does not purport to address the effect of such contributions on the Standards of Conduct applicable to Government employees, except as those Standards are addressed to the prohibitions of §209. Individual agency regulations should therefore be applied on a case-by-case basis. The Office of Legal Counsel of this Department has previously supplied comments concerning that subject to the Office of the Counsel to the President.

The Department of Justice has no objection to enactment of this legislation.

This replies to your request for the views of the Department of the Treasury on S. 2333, an enrolled bill, "To amend section 209 of title 18, United States Code, to permit an officer or employee of the United States Government, injured during an assassination attempt, to receive contributions from charitable organizations."

Under current law, Federal employees are prohibited from receiving contributions or remuneration for services performed in the course of official business from sources outside of the United States Government.

The enrolled bill would make it possible for any Federal officer or employee injured during the commission of an offense involving assassination, kidnapping, or assault on certain Government officials, such as the President, Vice-President or a Member of Congress, to receive outside remuneration from an organization which is exempt from taxation under the Internal Revenue Code.

The Department wishes to make clear our understanding that this provision does not affect the statutory and regulatory requirements necessary for an organization to qualify for tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3) of the Code and thereby its eligibility as a recipient of deductible contributions.

"(f) This section does not prohibit acceptance or receipt, by any officer or employee injured during the commission of an offense described in section 351 or 1751 of this title, of contributions or payments from an organization which is described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 and which is exempt from taxation under section 501(a) of such Code."
