PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: DEATH OF SPACE SHUTTLE CHALLENGER CREW TUESDAY, JANUARY 28, 1986

Ladies and gentlemen, I had planned to speak to you tonight to report on the State of the Union, but the events of earlier today have led me to change those plans. Today is a day for mourning, and remembering.

Nancy, and I are pained to the core by the tragedy of the Shuttle Challenger. We know we share this pain with all of the

Deople of our country. This is truly a national loss.

Minuteen years aso, almost to the day of lost
In more than a quarter century of the United States space

program we have never lost an astronaut in flight. We have

never had a tragedy like this. And perhaps we have forgotten the courage it took for the crew of the shuttle. But they, the shape had magnificent Seven, were aware of the dangers -- And overcame them and did their jobs brilliantly.

Judith Resnick, Ronald McNair, Ellison Onizuka, Gregory Jarvis and Christa McAuliffe. We mourn their loss as a Nation, and we mourn them

To the families of the Seven: We cannot bear, as you do, the full impact of this tragedy -- but we feel the loss, and we are thinking about you so very much. Your relatives were daring and brave and they had that special grace, that special spirit that said: Give me a challenge and I'll meet it with joy. They had a hunger to explore the universe and discover its truths. They wished to serve and they did -- they served all of us.

LINECUTATION - SERVES SERVED

We have grown used to wonders in this century -- it's hard to dazzle us. But for 25 years the United States space program has been doing just that. We have grown used to the idea of space, and perhaps we forget that we've only just begun, we're still pioneers -- they the members of the Challenger crew, were pioneers.

And I want to say something to the children of America who were watching the live coverage of the shuttle's takeoff. I know it's hard to understand but sometimes painful things like this happen -- it's part of the process of exploration and discovery -- it's part of taking a chance and expanding man's horizons. The future doesn't belong to the faint-hearted -- it belongs to the brave. The Challenger crew was pulling us into the future -- and we'll continue to follow them.

I've always had great faith in and respect for our space program -- and what happened today does nothing to diminish it.

We don't hide our space program, we don't keep secrets and cover things up, we do it all up front, and in public. That's the way freedom is, and we wouldn't change it for a minute.

we'll continue our quest in space. There will be more voluntees shuttle and more shuttle crews and, yes, more civilian, more teachers, in space. Nothing ends here -- our hopes and our journeys continue.

I want to add that I wish I could talk to every man and woman who works for NASA or who worked on this mission, and tell them: your dedication and professionalism have moved and

impressed us for decades, and we know of your anguish, but we're

IThere's a coincidence today. On this day 390 years ago the great explorer Sir Francis Drake died aboard ship off the coast of Panama. In his lifetime the great fronteirs were the oceans. And a historian later said, "He lived by the sea, died on it, and was buried in it." Today we can say of the Challenger Crew; they lived by space, died in it, and were buried in their dedication was, like Drake's, complete.

The crew of the space shuttle Challenger honored us by the manner in which they lived their lives. We will never forget them, nor the last time we saw them -- this morning, as they prepared for their jorney, and waved goodbye, and "slipped the surly bonds of earth" to "touch the face of God."
