Thank you for your letter of January 18, 1984 to President Reagan. We are delighted to learn of the success of King Week '84 and that officials of the Administration were able to contribute. 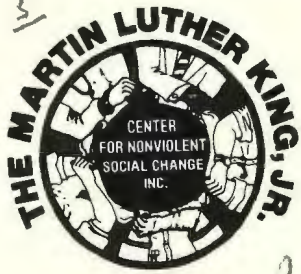

The Chairman's Message

As Chairman of the Board of Directors, I welcome our many guests from across the nation and around the world to the Fifty-fifth Observance of the Birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. I welcome our many friends and supporters from Atlanta and throughout the State of Georgia who have so faithfully supported our efforts to make Dr. King's Dream a living reality.

Plans for The King Center were begun in the summer of 1968 by Dr. King's family, colleagues, and close friends. The Center was conceptualized as the official education, research and living memorial to carry on Dr. King's nonviolent efforts for meaningful social change. The Center has grown from a commitment in the minds of Dr. King's family and supporters into an established institution with local, national and international presence. With developing programs of education and research on critical issues facing our nation and the world, the Center focuses particularly on those problems which bear on the poor and disadvantaged in our society.

During this fifty-fifth Birthday Observance we will have a Debt Liquidation Ceremony to celebrate and offer thanksgiving for our ability to manage and liquidate all the debt on our new Freedom Hall Complex ahead of schedule. This could only have happened because of the faithful payment of pledges and perseverance by our officers and board. There would be no King Center or Freedom Hall Complex without the faith and dogged determination of our president, Mrs. Coretta Scott King who travels constantly seeking on Dr. King's work and legacy. The King Center has no endowment. It has not sustained source of financial income and yet it must receive and accommodate 500,000 visitors annually. With the establishment of Dr. King's birthday as an official legal national holiday, the demands on The King Center for services and leadership are dramatically increasing and we must find a way to keep faith with those who have kept faith with us.

The King Center belongs to each of us and we can take justifiable pride in the beauty of the physical facility; in our King Library and Archives, which contains the world's largest collection of primary resource materials on the civil rights movement and Dr. King; in the quality of our exhibits and in our programs which provide education, training, research and leadership directed at the pressing social ills of poverty, violence, racism and war. The programmatic foundation of The Center is fully underway but the great challenge in this area remains before us. We will need your support for a major capitol/endowment campaign in 1984 to help us complete our facilities; support and improve upon our programs, maintenance and staffing requirements. We will need your support in establishing King Center Support Groups in towns and cities across the nation. We will need your support in assuring that Dr. King's birthday becomes a day for sober reflection on the needs of our society and an occasion for recommitment and affirmation.

Presidents Message

I want to welcome all of you to the 16th Annual Birthday Observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. We want each of you to become an active member of The King Center family. The theme for our 1984 Observance is **"Mandate For The Beloved Community: Forging A Covenant For Jobs, Peace & Freedom."** Nineteen eighty-three was a year in which The King Center reached a new plateau of institutional maturity and leadership. The establishment of the new Coalition of Conscience and the successful August 27th March on Washington in which 500,000 persons from across the United States came to reaffirm their commitment to Martin's Dream was indeed a glorious day in which we can all take pride and satisfaction.

Millions of peace and freedom loving people around the world through the mass media witnessed the signing of the King Holiday Bill on November 2nd at The White House. No other holiday serves as a focal point for encouraging improved race relations and Martin's Day must be a means of unifying America in his spirit and nonviolent tradition. The holiday must have special meaning for our young people. I believe they will be inspired by the courageous example of a man who began to lead a historic reform movement at the age of 26 and who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize at age 35. Our young people must be convinced that you don't have to carry a gun to change history, and Martin's life and work provided the preeminent example that demonstrated this profound truth.

Nineteen eighty-three demonstrated that voter education, registration and the use of the vote remain our most powerful nonviolent weapons in the struggle for constructive social change. The King Center continues to monitor and challenge regressive public policy and has now become an active non-governmental organization member of the United Nations in order to impact upon international affairs and strengthen human rights.

Our 1984 King Week observance in Atlanta, across the nation and around the world promises to be the largest and most exciting yet held. Our Atlanta Observance will not only involve many of our traditional events but it will feature two important national conferences. The first is "Implementing the People's Platform - Voter Registration/Education/Participation," which grew out of concern for the many issues affecting minorities, women, youth and the poor in general. The second is "World Peace and Global Justice Through Nonviolence," which continues The Center's leadership in the study, analysis and pursuit of world peace and global justice through nonviolent means. The King Center will soon put forth a major "peace agenda."

Finally, we gather during this observance on Saturday evening, January 14, to honor one of our own who has been a true disciple of Martin and who pursued his Dream not only as Mayor of Atlanta, but as a former Ambassador to the United Nations and citizen of the world, Mayor Andrew Young.

We hope you will leave Atlanta and the 55th Birthday Observance renewed with the firm conviction that each of us can control our own destiny and that what each of us does individually and collectively can indeed impact positively upon the times in which we now live.


An Act


To amend title 5, United States Code, to make the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., a legal public holiday.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 6103(a) of title 5, United States Code, is amended by inserting immediately below the item relating to New Year's Day the following:

"Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., the third Monday in January."

SEC. 2. The amendment made by the first section of this Act shall take effect on the first January 1 that occurs after the two-year period following the date of the enactment of this Act.

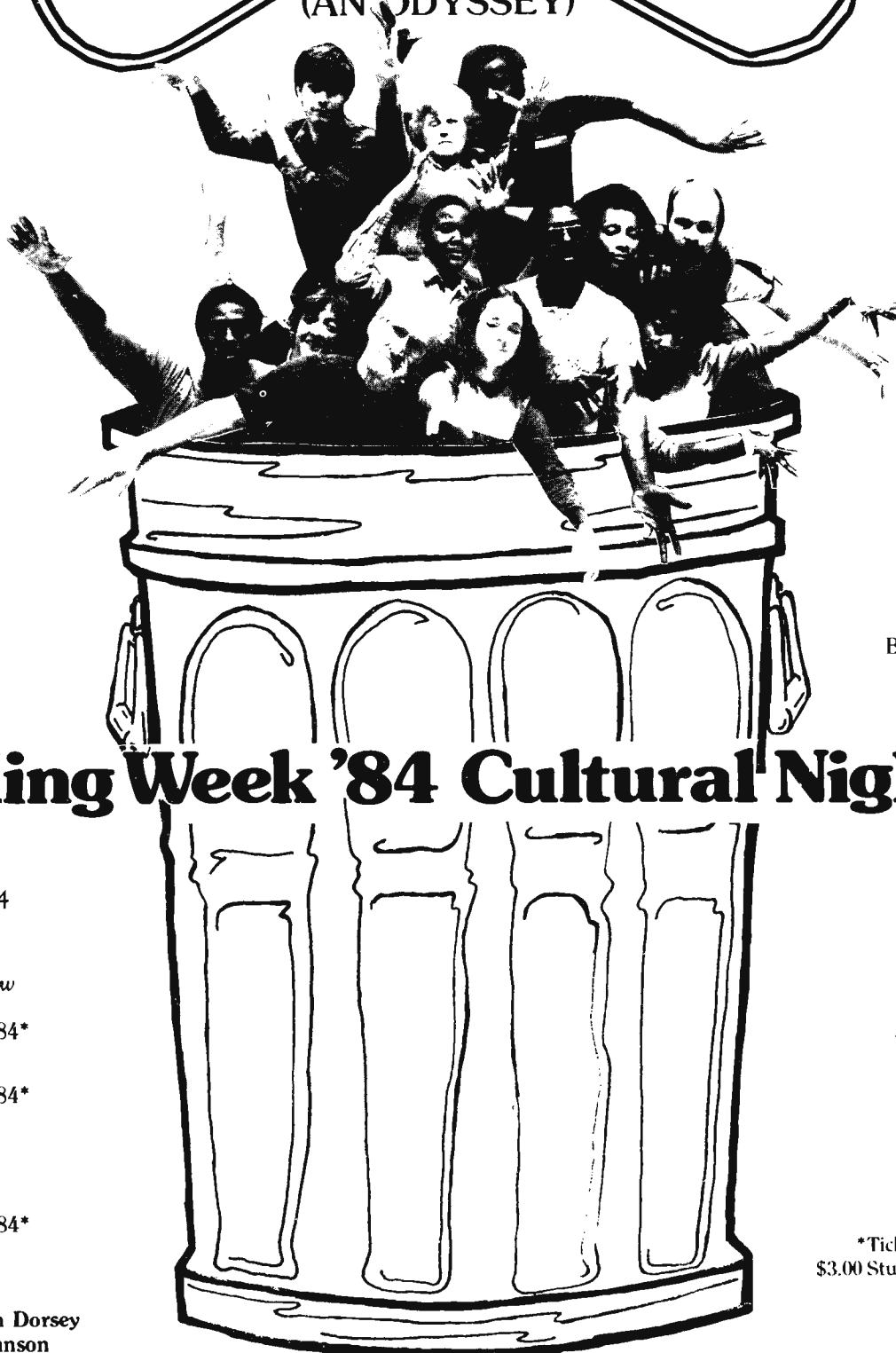

"LET MY PEOPLE GO"

A Litany of Commemoration of
THE REVEREND MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

January 15, 1929-April 4, 1968

LEADER: In the grand order of the universe, our Lord God wisely has chosen men and women to serve Him in each era. Such a servant of our Lord God was Martin Luther King, Jr., whose birth we now commemorate. We are thankful for the life of this 20th Century prophet of freedom, who joined the prophets of history in the cry:

CONGREGATION: In the name of freedom, let my people go.

LEADER: Martin Luther King, Jr. envisioned the ultimate freedom: the freedom achieved in struggle; the freedom reached in brotherhood; the freedom fired by the dream of a man; the freedom inspired by the lot of a people; the freedom *free* of hate; the freedom full of love.

CONGREGATION: In the name of this freedom of love, let my people go.

LEADER: He came into our lives when the yearning of people to be free had turned their attention to justice. For justice, and only justice, we shall follow, that we may live and inherit the land which the Lord our God gives us.

CONGREGATION: In the name of justice, let my people go.

LEADER: He reminded us that the spirit of man soars from depths of despair with the strength and belief in the promise of the Creator of the universe. We know and we testify: The Lord loves justice; He will not forsake his saints.

CONGREGATION: In the name of the Lord, let my people go.

LEADER: And so he set off with us on a journey for justice. It was a journey proclaiming the words of the ancient prophet, Amos: "Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream." It was a journey calling forth the modern Christian ministry—to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to set at liberty those who are oppressed.

CONGREGATION: In the name of the prophet, Amos, and in the name of suffering people, let my people go.

LEADER: The journey went to Montgomery, to affirm human dignity and courage; to Birmingham, to defeat the sickness of separating human life; to Selma, to ensure the equality of people in human affairs; to a hundred nameless communities, to remove painful shackles of oppression and light joyous torches of liberty.

CONGREGATION: In the name of this journey toward freedom, let my people go.

LEADER: When war was encountered, the leader of this journey sang with the people: "Ain't gonna study war no more." When violence was met, he spurned it and said: "Hate is too great a burden to bear."

CONGREGATION: In the name of peace and love, let my people go.

LEADER: And even when death was confronted, as the journey reached Memphis, he could say in final triumph, that in life he had found something worth dying for, something worth life itself—the Promised Land, a land of freedom with justice.

CONGREGATION: In the name of the Promised Land, let my people go.

LEADER: So we are thankful that the Spirit of the Lord anointed a man who preached good news to the poor, who rejected segregation and embraced liberation, who prophesied the greatness of his people in struggle for the deliverance of all people.

CONGREGATION: In the name of the Spirit of the Lord, let my people go.

LEADER: We praise the Lord God for sending us a man of peace who resisted tyranny, a man of nonviolence who fought for liberty, a man of God who worked for people. Thank you, Lord, for Martin Luther King, Jr., who inspired us with his dream, who walked into our lives and our hearts with his marches for justice, who demanded freedom with great courage in the face of grave danger, and who has now passed on into your Promised Land. Thank you for his noble legacy to continue the journey to that land here on earth, in life for all people. Thank you, God; You have sent us one who now causes us to say:

ALL: In the name of Martin Luther King, Jr., let my people go.
