New Life in Old Town

Alexandria, According to Its Fans, Is What Georgetown Was Like Before It Lost Its Manners

f you took all the red bricks in the world and laid them end to end, you'd have Old Town Alexandria.

They love bricks there. In fact, if scientists ever get around to studying the link between exposure to brick and purchase of BMWs, this would be the perfect place to do the research.

I have nothing against bricks. It's just that in abundance they scream: "Quaint." That's a shame, in a way,

because Old Town's bricks are there for the right historic reasons. But the effect is that the commercial core of Old Town is the ultimate boutique, a cookie-cutter community with all the urban verve of Mayberry.

That image is not completely fair, but in truth, Alexandria has long been a place better suited for celebrating years of history than something so fleeting as a Saturday night.

It's been a tourist town, sculpted by tradition, with nary a cutting edge in sight.

All that is changing. Alexandria is a boom town now; Washington's Council of

Governments projects that during the next five years, it will have the area's greatest percentage gain in workers. All those workers will need to eat somewhere, which is why the Torpedo Factory will be getting its own large restaurant, why the people who own Clyde's and the Old Ebbitt Grill have purchased and will soon start remodeling the Old Club Restaurant on South Washington Street, why a Mr. Henry's is coming to the neighborhood.

There are more after-dinner choices, too. In addition to stalwarts such as the Wharf, Café Lafayette, and the Birchmere, places like Club 715, a rock-androll bar, and Cates, a jazz restaurant, are

doing well. And now Alexandria is home base for jazz songstress Shirley Horn, who performs at Banks Restaurant on Duke Street. It's enough to prompt talk of Alexandria as a smaller, more civilized version of Georgetown.

"People say it's what Georgetown was like ten years ago," says Elliot Epstein, who lives in Georgetown but is coowner of Cates Restaurant in Old Town. "But I don't think the same kind of thing

will happen to us. The people and local officials are too conscious of its appearance to allow it to become honky-tonk."

Of course, the true test of Alexandria's status as a night spot is whether its appeal extends beyond the Virginia line. Fear of crossing the Potomac can be a powerful thing. Yet Epstein says almost a third of the people who come to hear the jazz singers at Cates drive from at least ten miles away. Managers of other restaurants with live entertainment say they've noticed the same thing.

Before you hitch up your leather pants and head there, however, keep in mind that Alexandria, for all its newfound sparkle, is no glitter city. This is "safe date" territory, not the place to experiment with cross-dressing. Stick with khakis; you can't go wrong.

What it lacks in quantity, Alexandria makes up for in variety. If it's live entertainment you want, you can choose from the following:

Banks Restaurant (4531 Duke Street; 751-1244). You may wonder why Shirley Horn, a woman who has played to

standing ovations in Europe, is spending her weekends performing at a strip shopping center in west Alexandria. Some things are not meant to be understood. Just drive to the Foxchase Shopping Center and park somewhere near Empress Travel and La Casa Pizza. Between the two you'll find Banks Restaurant, Horn's new home. She is a true jazz stylist who can get everything there is to get from a song, as much a Washington prize as cherry blossoms and government pensions. Forget the view of the high-rise condo across the highway; just listen. She performs every Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 9 and 11 PM. The cover

charge is \$5.

Basin Street Lounge (219 King Street; 549-1141). It's upstairs from 219, the expense-account haven, but Basin Street is one of the better bargains in the nightlife scene. For \$2, you can see some first-rate local jazz groups, such as the Art Monroe Trio, Hot Jazz, or Marc Cohen. With its heavy drapes and dark floral wallpaper, the room is a little heavy on the bordello look, but after a song or two, it starts to feel cozy. There's jazz every night, plus at a Sunday brunch. Music begins at 8 Sunday through Thursday and 9 on weekends.

The Birchmere (3901 Mount Vernon Avenue; 549-5919). Almost ten years

ago, this club opened as a place determined to spotlight the best bluegrass musicians in the region. The Birchmere did that and more, becoming the Washington home of the country's best bluegrass bands. But it has a new market now: aging baby-boomers nostalgic for the days when Bob Dylan, not Paul Volcker, was a force in their lives. These days you're more likely to hear folk music than bluegrass. This month, for instance, performers include Jesse Winchester, Schooner Fare, and Mike Cross. For the bluegrass die-hards, there's the Seldom Scene, a Thursdaynight Birchmere institution. The cover ranges from \$5 to \$15.

Café Lafayette (105 North Alfred Street; 548-0076). Joan Cushing recently celebrated her tenth anniversary here as Mrs. Foggybottom, a proper and properly jaundiced Washington matron. For a city that tends to take itself too seriously, political satirists like Cushing are a good tonic. She jabs away during two shows at 9:30 and 11:30 Friday and

Saturday. The cover is \$6.

Cates Restaurant (600 Franklin Street; 549-4460). New owners took over three and a half years ago, and in June 1984 they began featuring local jazz singers in the upstairs restaurant. That seemed to work, so they began booking West Coast and New York singers, and today Cates is one of the best places in the area to see rising young jazz vocalists. There's music Tuesday through Saturday, and on Sundays local singers such as Lisa Rich and Mary Blankenmeier are showcased. The cover is \$5 on weeknights, \$9 on weekends, and \$4 on Sunday. Local acoustic musicians perform six nights a week in the Cellar Pub downstairs, with a \$2 cover.

Club 715 (715 King Street; 836-5366). A dark reggae bar named Montego Bay used to be here; now it's a dark rock-and-roll club. But some things never change: George Chu's Chinese Cuisine is still downstairs. Local rock-androll and new-wave bands play Thursday through Saturday. The cover is usually \$2 or \$3.

Henry Africa's (607 King Street; 549-4010). It's better known for the stylish restaurant in the rear, but every Sunday, Tuesday, and Wednesday the Lewis Powers and Dempsey Combs jazz duo plays in the large front lounge. Thursday through Saturday the Greg Harrison Trio plays. This is the place for a decidedly upscale nightcap. There's no cover.

Ireland's Own (132 North Royal Street; 549-4535). Not the place to wear your hair like Princess Di. Boisterous crowds fill the long tables, where they drink and sing the glories of the Emerald Isle with equal enthusiasm. Irish musicians perform every night; Harp and Guinness are on tap. The latter, the management likes to point out, is served properly at room temperature. Brendan Behan would be proud. No cover.

Murphy's (713 King Street; 548-1717). Alexandria's other shrine to Irish culture, Murphy's is a comfortable saloon, more an Irish pub than Ireland's Own is. Still, Irish music is featured on the tiny stage every night. It's a warm place, but not exactly romantic unless the back of your date's neck tingles at the sound of "Galway Bay." On a typical week, the bar goes through seventeen or eighteen kegs of Guinness. Brendan Behan would be proud. No cover.

Il Porto Ristorante (121 King Street: 836-8833). Pianist Johnny Maddox appears Tuesday through Saturday in the

upstairs lounge. The cover is \$3.

Tiffany Tavern (1116 King Street; 836-8844). Acoustic bands perform every Friday and Saturday from 9 to 1. No cover.

The Wharf (119 King Street; 836-2834). If you're strolling through Old Town and you hear music, chances are it's coming from the Wharf, the small bar above the Quarterdeck Lounge. It's a fairly nondescript bar with-haven't we seen enough?-exposed brick, but it regularly features some lively jazz, from groups such as Mary Blankenmeier, Larry Seals, Tom Principato, and Hot Jazz. If your yen is for oldies, check out the Peptonz on Tuesdays. The music starts at 9 every night. The cover is \$2 on weeknights, \$3 on weekends; no cover if you eat in the dining room.

The Artist's Room at the Bread Oven, 1201 Pennsylvania Ave., NW (737-7772). A French restaurant with nightly entertainment. The Capitol Steps, the political satire group, perform April 12, 18, and 26 at 8:45. Pianist/satirist Dan Ruskin plays most Mon.-Wed. On Thurs, Fri., and Sat. when Capitol Steps aren't performing, the show "Cabaret Americain: Our Hit Parade" is presented. Cover: \$7 for Capitol Steps shows only.

Bayou, 3135 K St., NW (333-2897). Showcase for national and local blues and rock groups. Open Sun.-Thurs. until 2; Fri. and Sat. until 3. Cover: \$1-\$10. Tickets available at TicketCenter at Hecht's and at Bayou box office after 8. Call for taped listing of concerts.

Blues Alley, 1073 Wisconsin Ave., NW (337-4141). The best spot in the area for jazz by bigname artists. April 1-6: Sarah Vaughan; April 7: cabaret with Dale Stein; April 8-13: Nancy Wilson; April 14: Liz Story; April 15-20: Herbie Mann; April 21-22: Sonny Rollins; April 23-27: Joe Williams; April 28: Buddy Rich big band. Shows nightly at 8 and 10, plus midnight show Fri. and Sat. Cover: \$8-\$25.

Comedy à la Carte, L'Enfant Plaza East, SW (432-0200). The Park Place Players, a repertory comedy company, perform on weekends. Fri. dinner at 6:30, shows at 7:30 and 9:30; Sat. dinner at 7:30, shows at 8:30 and 10:30. Dinner and show costs \$24.95; show only is \$6. Underground parking available for \$2.

Comedy Café, 1520 K St., NW (638-JOKE). Features national and local comedy acts. April 4-5: Kevin Sullivan, Dan Rosen, Al Carpenter; April 11-12: Darrow Igus, Sam Greenfield, John Marks; April 18-19: Bill Thomas, Hal Spear, Bill McCuddy; April 25-26: Chance Langton, Mike Sacconi, Bret Leake. 





New White House Jewish liaison, Max Green, makes first public appearance

A New Reagan 'Conservative'

PHILADELPHIA—The White House's new liaison to the Jewish community told a group of Jewish leaders here this week he cannot understand why American Jews are not more supportive of Reagan administration policies.

Max Green, who was appointed two months ago to succeed Marshall Breger as associate director of the White House Public Lisison Office, said he "can't think of a good reason why an American Jew should not be enthusiastic" about the president's foreign- and domestic-policy agendas.

Green, who left the staff of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission to assume the

White House post, spoke Monday afternoon at a board meeting of the
Philadelphia Chapter of American
Jewish Committee (AJC). Later in the
day, he addressed a group of communal
leaders invited by Richard Fox, who is active in Republican politica.
In his speech to AJC members, Groen
focused on the "stumbling blocks" that
prevent the majority of American Jews
from openity embracing the political conservatism that the current administration esponses.

On sof those plocks Green said he believes, is the president spolicy toward the Soviet Union. The central com-ponents of that notice he said, are a re-

think Jews should be supportive of any efforts aimed at weakening the Soviet Union."

Likewise, Green said American Jews should endorse an arms buildup to prevent the Soviets from "trying to gain a first-strike capability." One day, he warned, Israel "could go down to defeat" if the United States feels "strategically inferior" and therefore unable to counter a Soviet attack on the Jewish state.

The White House official went on to suggest that Jews should strongly support President Reagan's "Star Wars" research program, known formally as the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI). because it is the "only way to counter the Soviet arms buildup."

He pointed out that SDI research, which Israel has been invited to join, rould also benefit Israel directly because "the technology could be used to defend against Arab missile attacks" on Israel.

"Jews who are pro-Israel cannot but be for this SDI proposal," said Green. "I can't as a Jew think of a reason to be against it."

The White House official also defended the administration's civil-rights policies and social agenda, which he sees

as other stumbling blocks to Jewish support for Reagan's brand of conservatism.
Discussing welfare policy, Green blamed economic distress in the black community on black family values rather
than on discrimination.

"Discrimination simply does not account for differences between all groups,"
he argued. Pointing to the economic success story of Jews and, more recently,
some sectors of the Asian inmigrant
community, he said. "All kinds of groups
that have suffered discrimination don't
reflect that in their incomes,"

"One of the reasons blacks lag behind
whites is the black family structure,"
Green said, adding the black community's rejection of "middle-class values"
had contributed to black poverty.

"Jews, of course, should continue to be concerned about other people in society," said Green. He also acknowledged the government has a certain amount of responsibility to provide for the truly

responsibility to provide for the truny-needy.

But, he added, "ultimately, people do have to be responsible for themselves. You cannot do it for them. This has been the experience of Jews."

Green's hard-line positions and vehe-ment advocacy of administration policies took some of his AJC listeners by sur-prise. Many seemed struck that Green appeared to be more interested in selling administration positions than in soliciting Jewish opinion on the various-issues.

oblicting sewish opinions.

One AJC board member attacked Green's argument that Jews should support anything that weakens the Soviet Union as nothing more than "the orwellian notion that the enemy of my enemy is my friend."

Another listener asked Green how he could support the administration's proposed arms sale to Jordan. Green responded by arguing that the sale is "a way of encouraging Jordan to participate in the peace process."

Others questioned whether the Reagan administration's ties to the evangelical

Others questioned whether the Reagan administration's ties to the evangelical Christian community were in the best interests of American Jewry-a topic Green mentioned only in passing.

"The fundamentalists are allies of the Jewish community, at least as far as Israel is concerned," said Green. "What we're dealing with," he said in a separate interview, "are philo-Semites and lovers of Zion who are not enemies of the Jewish people."



Green also told the AJC audience that he doesn't find the positions that the findamentalist community takes on domestic issues to be "threatening to the Jewish community."

Asked whether Jews could be expected to support the Reagan administration position on abortion, Green retorted, "When did this become a Jewish issue?" He noted that both Orthodox and Conservative rabbinic groups have taken positions against abortion on demand.

As for proposals to introduce prayer in the public schools, Green said such initiatives are "not really going anywhere now." But he went on to question why Jews feel so strongly about that issue. "As I was growing up, we said the Lord's Prayer in school," he recalled. "I don't think a moment of silence is harmful to a Jewish child."

The White House official concluded by saying "I do hope to be able to convince yews and Jewish organizations that this administration—which is a conservative administration—is working in the interests of Jews."



Israeli military rehabilitation director speaks at Israel Bond Rally

'Giving Peace a Chance'

PALM BEACH—The Director of Israel's Department of Military Rehabilitation declared last week that Israel's National Unity government has made significant strides toward accomplishing a number of military and economic objectives despite a number of strategic disadvantages which have confronted Israel since 1948.

Arieh Fink spoke last Thursday at an Israel Bonds rally sponsored by Temple Beth Sholom of Lake Worth and Lt. Col. Netanyahu Lodge of B'nai B'rith, Palm Beach. The rally took place at the home of B. Archie Levine, the president of Beth Sholom.

Sydelle Goldenberg is chairperson of Israel Bonds for Temple Beth Sholom.

"The first aim our government had was to get out of Lebanon," said Fink, "and this is now achieved. Today there is not a single Israeli soldier on Lebanese soil. At the same time we have our northern frontiers secure. There have been no casualties on the northern frontiers."

Fink said the government has realized some success over the last five months in accomplishing its second objective—putting Israel's economy in order.

"The situation called for taking drastic measures," said Fink. "Last year Israel cut its budget by \$600 million and this year the budget will be cut by the same amount. There is no little sacrifice in tightening our betl, because-we cannot afford unemployment. But our program seems to be working. An outrageous annual inflation rate of 500 percent has been cut to three percent a month."

Referring to recent efforts to begin talks with Jordan, Fink said Israel's national unity government is "giving peace a chance" as it seeks progress on the political front.



Fink said Israel continues to be stymied by three main factors which have confronted the Jewish state ever since its birth almost 40 years ago.
"A permanent military threat havers over Israel," said Fink. "It is a unique threat because losing our first war would endanger our political and physical existence. We are really still in the midst of the War of Liberation of 1942."
Fink identified Israel's narrow geographic which the country and the overwhelming demographic odds it faces as the third. "We have a population of 3½ million, and the Arab countries have a combined population which is 30 to 40 times bigger," he said. "Our army always has to be ready." has to be ready."

Fink called the greatest strength of the

Israeli army "not its missile boats or tanks but its moral quality and the motivation of its men and women.
"What we do for the veterans and their families, including the \$140 million we spend on them annually, has a direct influence on the soldiers' motivation," he said.

In addition to his activity in the Department of Rehabilitation, whose director he has been since 1968. Fink has also been deeply involved with the American Joint Distribution Committee for the past 38 years.

Since his arrival in Israel in 1947, Fink, a survivor of Auschwitz and Buchenwald, has represented Israel in various international organizations and congresses.

Severe Sentence For Rabbis

BOCA RATON-"I thought the

BOCA RATON—"I thought the sentence was little bit severe, considering the nature of the crime," said Rabbi Ted Feldman of Congregation B'nai Torah in Boca Raton.
Feldman and 20 other rabbis were sentenced on Dec. 5 in the Superior Court of the District of Columbia for demonstrating outside the Soviet Embassy in October. They received 15 days' imprisonment, which was suspended; six months of unsupervised probation; and a \$50 fine each.

The rabbis demonstrated to call attention to the harrassment of Soviet Jewry.
Feldman, president of the South-east
Region of the Rabbinical Assembly of
Conservative Rabbis, said he also

thought it was severe since other demonstrators—at the South African embassy—are not prosecuted.

However, he added, "Judge Colleen Kollar-Ketelly was fair. She allotted us almost two hours to explain why we needed to take the action we did. It gave us a chance to put the Soviet Jewry cause on record."

Feldman said, "We all knew that we had violated the law. But we hoped the expression of our outrage would lead to some positive action. That's still our hope."

Five of the rabbis chose not to accept the unsupervised probation and reported to the federal prison in Petersburg, VA for the 15-day prison term.



גרוס נוטש סוכנות עידונית חשובה לעניינים סוציאליים, שלה תקציב של 4.1 מיליארד דולר לשנה ומשכורת שנתית כסך 90 אלף דולר.

מגילת ה"מאגנה כארטה" תוצג בתערוכת מסמכי חגיגות פסל החרות

המיסמך ההיסטורי הידוע בשם "המאגנה כארטה ליברטטיס" או בעכרית "מגילת החרות הגדולה", שעליה חתם המלך ג׳רן בשנת 1215, הגיעה לניו־יורק ותוצג כתעדוכת מסמכי החדות שבמסגרת חגיגות המאה של פסל החרות.

המלך ג׳ון חתם כזמנו על העת־ קים רכים של מגילת זכויות האדם, אך רק 4 מהם נותרו כיום. "המאגנה כארטה", שהגיעה כמוצג לניו־יורק, נמצאת באורח קבע בקתדדלת לינ־ קולן, השוכנת 125 מיל צפונית ללונדון.

ראש הקתדרלה, הרברנד אוליבר ויליאם טוויסלנטון־וויקהם, שטס

עם המגילה לארה"ב, הסכיר שהיא הגיעה לקתררלה כ־1215 ומאז דאגו לכך שלא תאבד. ״המאגנה כארטה", המיסמך באמצעותו העניק המלך ג׳ון סמכריות שלטון וכוח לאציליו, נחשבת לבסיס הדמו־ קרטיה הבריטית.

ה"מאגנה כארטה" הגיעה לארה"ב בפעם הראשונה ב־1939 והוצגה כיריד העולמי שנערך אז בניו־יורק. עם פרוץ מלחמת העולם השנייה החליטו שלא לטלטלה בחזרה לבריטניה והיא הופקדה למשמרת בפורט נוכס. עם תום המלחמה הוטסה המגילה חזרה למשכנה הקבוע כקתדרלה.

מכל רחבי העולם. בין המוצגים: מכתב מ-1948 של הנשיא דאז, הארי טרומן, המכיד בישראל; עצומה למען הענקת זכות כחירה לנשים בניו־זילנד, מ־1892 (הארץ הראשונה שהעניקה זכות כחירה לנשים) והעתק של מגילת העצמ־ אות האמריקנית מה־4 ביולי, 1776. ההעתק יונח גם על סיפון אוניית משמר־החופים, ״הנשר״, שתוכיל

תעדוכה מסמכי החרות, הנערכת ב״פדרל היל״, תהיה פתוחה לקהל הרחב עד ה־9 ליולי.

בתערוכה יוצגו מסמכים הקשו־ בתו של המנהיג הידוע וחתן פרס רים בחרות. הם מגיעים לניו־יורק נוכל לשלום, הכישוף טוטו, מפו טוטו, הזהירה את קהל המפגינים: "אנו נמצאים כמרחק קטנטן כיותר ממלחמת אזרחים. אנו עדיין מצפים שהעולם יעשה את אשר עליו לעשות ביחס לאפרטהייד. זו ההז־ דמנות האחרונה". את הקהל הלהיב בדברים הדבדנד את "מצעד האוניות" של ה־4 ביולי.

ג'סי ג'קסון, שהתייחס לסכנה של הפאשיזם בעולם: "הצו המוסרי שחייב אותנו להילחם בהיטלר והנאצים מחייב אותנו עתה להילחם עד חורמה כבותה וכאפרטהייד של דרום־אפריקה", אמר.

Please drop me a note at your convenience to let me know what you are up to. I would enjoy resuming our friendship.


