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Dear Mr Abrams,

We look forward to the forthcoming U.S.-Romanian discussions on emigration and other human rights problems in Romania, in the spirit of President Reagan's statement of June2,1982. We noted that his vigorous language included calls both for the simplification of Remanian emigration procedures and for a significant increase in emigration for Israel. We appreciate the fast that both Senate and House have followed with the public articulation of emigration guidelines to which the Romanians would be expected to adhere in the seming year.

In regard to the general nature and objectives of the discussions, we believe that

- the talks should be engoing and intensive, over a period of as many months as it will take to develop adequate arrangements
- 2. effective, cântinuous monitoring should be established on a year round basis, to include emigration to Israel
- 3. <u>credible</u> assurances must be received on performance, both in terms of A) procedures B) rate of outflow.
- In view of the experience of the past decade, some forms of believable guarantees are important, whether in writing or, at least, by means of high level official Romanian-U.S. announcements, publicly made.
- 4. Regarding the simplification and shortening of procedures, we particularly hope for results in the fellowing areas:
 - a) removal of the pre-application procedures spread throgh Romania <u>after MFN</u> was obtained and the Helsinki Final Act was promulgated
 - shortening the process
 from initial application to approval 6 months
 from approval to exit 2 months
- 5. More intensive reduction of emigration backlogs to U.S. and Israel, particularly long waiting 'refuseniks' (a category similar to that of prisoners of conscience).

 6. 'Significant increas' in the rate of Jowish emigration

as called for by the President on June 2. His statement was preceded and followed by congressional petitions (1981 and 1982) requesting that the number of Romanian approvals for Israel should be 'more than doubled' (see Armstrong-Moynihan letter, signed by 51 of 100 signatures senators and the Selara-Derman letter signed by 121 Representatives, both of June/July 1982).

In view of the gross underestimates of the Romanian Jewish emigration potential still current in some quarters in Washington, I should like to add to my previous extensive discussion on this matter. An analysisof the number of this years emigration registrations for Israel makes it clear that the pool of applicants will remain considerable for the rest of the decade, provided that there is a genuine diminuition of Romanian harassment and the above cited obstacles. Though we know some Rymanian Jews who are not planning to leave, our experience, frequently renewed, is that the vast majority would like to do so - unlike the Jews of Hungary.

Here are some figures resulting from recent syndies of Rabbi Resen's lists. The total number of waiting applicants, including approvals, at the end of August was between 1,300 and 1,400, a similar number to that of May 28, 1982

The number of approvals granted during June/July 1982 showed that almost half of these (279 of 590) had not registered for emigration for Israel at the Jewish Community offices. This has been a consistent trend since such registrations began.

These figures suggest that

- at the total number of Jews registered with the Romanian authorities is far more substantial than has been so far conceded. We do not speak here of the much larger number who have failed to have their application efforts heeded and of the many who fear to apply.
- b) the number of Jews still remaing in Remania is considerably in excess of Rabbi Rosen's census of 32,000. It is known that many unregistered Jews are scattered throughou East Europe. We prefer to accept the Remanian figures of 60,000 Jews appearing in an official U.M. document of 1979 and repeated by a Romanian diplomat to the Jewish Week of New York (May 9, 1979).

TAKING INTO ACCOUNT, THE SENTIMENTS EXPRESSED BY THE PRESIDENT AND CONGRESS AND THE EVIDENCE OF A LARGE POOL OF APPLICANTS FOR EMIGRATION TO ISRAEL AND A MUCH LARGER POOL OF POTENTIAL APPLICANTS, WE SHOULD BE MAKING IT CLEAR TO THE ROMANIAN AUTHORITIES THAT THE CURRENT RATE OF JEWISH APPROVALS (CIRCA CARRIX 200 to 300 A MONTH) MUST BE REGARDED AS THE MINIMUM RATE ACCEPTABLE FOR THE NEXT FEW YEARS.

We are well aware of the reluctance to set up a numbers goal but unless we, at least, satablish a ball park range of what is acceptable, we are not going to achieve our objective. During 1979, the Remanians suddenly doubled the flew of emigrants to the U.S. - approx. 200 a month- and have kept it that way since. The Remanians have an unofficial arrangement with the West Germans (Schmidt-Ceausescu meeting, Jan. 1978 -mee Frankfurter Allgemeine, Jan. 10 and Washington West German Embassy Press Service, Jan. 8, 1978).

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I would like to take the opportunity to take up a matter which has concurred us for a long time. Over the years we have admired the conscientious efforts of U.S. officials in Bucharest to assist would-be emigrants to the U.S. Unfortunately, they do not have a similar mandate in regard to applicants desiring to reach Israel, despite \$ 502 of the 1974 Trade Act. Several years ago, I discussed this matter with (former) Assistant Secretary of State George Vest and suggested that the U.S. should intervene on behalf of persons, particularly difficult humanitarian cases, whose names were supplied by U.S. relatives and friends. His response was positive but, for a number of reasons, nothing further happened.

Whenever a U.S. legislator requests our Embassy in Bucharest for help in regard to an individual desiring to reach Israel, the following standard wording is used. 'In cases other those involving emigration to the U.S., we believe it is not appropriate for us to intervene with the Remanian authorities. In eases involving emigration to Israel, only the Israeli authorities are able to judge whether and under what eircumstances, Romanians should be admitted and if intervention with the Romanian authorities is warranted'. This last sentence is unfortunate. The competence of the Israeli authorities to 'judge' of the admissability of individuals to Israeli is not relevant here. The real question is the effectiveness of Israeli interventions. Despite the fact that Remnian-Israeli diplomatic relations exist, Israelix cannot be considered a true 'third country' in the Romanian context. The embattled Israeli embassy is in Bucharest on suffrance, with minimal influence on the Romanian authorities.

May we therefore suggest that in accordance with the spirit of #402 of the 1974 Trade Act andour humanitarian concerns embodied in the Helsinki Final Act, Embassy personnel be empowered to intervene on behalfof difficult cases and that the Embassy or Administration in Washington present to the Romanian authorities on a regular basis a humanitarian list derived from requests submitted by Americans to their CongressionalrRepresentatives. Our experience indicates that it would be a mistake to delegate this task to the Helsinki Commission alone, as the Commission carries insufficient weight with the Romanians on its own.

One further point: We have found that some people desperate to leave have changed their emigration objective from Israel to the U.S. because, despite all the obstacles, they sometimes find it less difficult to reach the U.S. If Embassy personnel were empowered to be more directly helpful to these people, the pressure on U.S. Immigration services would be that much lessened.

During the summer, Washington was engulfed in R effusive Remanian assurances. Unfortunately, information continues to reach us of the same kind of troubles we've been so concerned about in the past and attached is a short list of persons harassed and penalised.

I shall be happy to make myself available for further discussion or clarification of issues and facts.

Letter to Romanian President Ceausescu

Issue: Letter to Romanian President Ceausescu urging the suspension of Romania's proposed education repayment decree.

Facts: Last month, Romania enacted an education repayment decree which would require all emigrants to reimburse the state in convertible currency for the cost of their educations. This decree violates section 402 (Jackson-Vanik Amendment) of the 1974 Trade Act which states that Most Favored Nation status should not be extended or should be withdrawn from any non-market economy country which "imposes more than a nominal tax, levy, fine, fee or other charge on any citizen as a consequence of the desire of such citizen to emigrate to the country of his choice."

Discussion: The attached draft letter (Tab A) from you to President Ceausescu urges the suspension of the education repayment decree, and states unequivocally that its implementation will unavoidably result in the loss of Romania's MFN status. The imposition of an education tax would violate U.S. law and leave you with no choice but to suspend MFN treatment to Romania.

State has forwarded you a proposed letter from President Reagan to Romanian President Ceausescu (Tab II). The draft letter requests that Ceausescu postpone implementation of an education repayment tax which would require all emigrants to reimburse the state in convertible currency for the cost of their educations. This decree violates section 402 of the Trade Act of 1974 which states that Most Favored Nation status should not be extended or should be withdrawn from any nonmarket economy country which "imposes more than a nominal tax, levy, fine, fee or other charge on any citizen as a consequence of the desire of such citizen to emigrate to the country of his choice."

The attached NSC re-draft of the letter from President Reagan to President Ceausescu (Tab A) urges the suspension of the education repayment decree, but clearly states that its implementation will result in the loss of Romania's MFN status. State and Commerce concur. Speechwriters have cleared the text. At Tab I is a forwarding memorandum to the President.

Guhin, Lord, McMinn and Robinson concur.

SUBJECT:

Proposed letter from the President to President Ceausescu of Romania

Romania enacted an education repayment decree late last month (TAB 1) which, when implemented, will place that country in clear violation of Section 402 of the 1974 Trade Act (Jackson-Vanik Amendment). The decree requires, inter alia, that emigrants reimburse the state in convertible currency for the cost of their free public education at the secondary and higher levels. It also provides for the confiscation without compensation of emigrants' homes and land and requires additional hard-currency payments once they receive their passports. The Romanian Government has justified these harsh measures as necessary to help stem the "brain drain."

Section 402 of the Trade Act of 1974 says, in part, that Most-Favored-Nation tariff treatment (MFN) shall not be extended to any non-market economy country which imposes more than a nominal tax, levy, fine, fee or other charge on any citizen as a consequence of the desire of such citizen to emigrate to the country of his choice.

The attached draft letter (TAB 2) from the President to President Ceausescu calls on Ceausescu to suspend implementation of the decree, explicitly states that full implementation will result in the loss of MFN treatment for Romanian exports to the U.S., and offers a Presidential emissary to discuss the issue privately with the Romanians. It leaves President Ceausescu under no illusion that Romania can retain MFN and other trade and investment benefits if the decree is implemented. It is believed that a prompt Administration response in the form of a private letter from the President offers a better chance than further public statements of persuading President Ceausescu to back down and permits him to do so with a minimum loss of face.

FOR THE COMPENSATION OF THESE EXPENDITURES, IN CONFORMITY WITH ETHICAL AND EQUITABLE SOCIALIST PRINCIPLES, IT PS NECESSARY THAT PERSONS WHO LEAVE THE COUNTRY PERMANENTLY INDEMNIFY SOCIETY FOR THE MATERIAL EFFORTS DEVOTED TO THEIR SCHOOLING AND SPECIALIZATION. AS WELL

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AS FOR THE OTHER SERVICES FROM WHICH THEY BENEFIT UNTIL ABANDONING THE FERRITORY OF THE STATE.

IN THIS SCOPE, THE COUNCIL OF STATE OF THE SOCIALIST REPOBLIC OF ROMANIA DECREES:

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



NOTES FOR THE JANUARY 1983 CONGRESSIONAL VISIT TO BUCHAREST

1 - Education Tax, "Ransom Money", Hard Currency

Latest information suggests that the tax will now be imposed early in the new year.

Even if we manage to avoid its implementation, many potential emigrants will be pressured to request substantial sums from relatives abroad as unofficial ransom money.

2 - Other Taxes

In the furor about the education tax, there is a tendency to forget the hardship of a) the increased luggage and other smaller taxes b) the fact that all taxes must be paid in hard Western currency.

3 - Emigration Procedures

We should seek their radical simplification:

- a) Immediate availability of the major application forms.
- b) Not more than six months from application to "approval".
- c) Not more than two months from approval to exit.
- d) Cessation of harassment of emigration applicants.

4 - Emigration Rates

- a) Accelerated rates of approvals and exits for those waiting more than six months for US and Israel visas.
- b) Maintenance of the rate of approvals to Israel and the recent monthly rate of over 200.

5 - <u>Israel Emigration</u>

- a) Rates: 1982 has seen an increase from cl000 to cl500. This increase should, however, be viewed in the light of Romanian Jewish emigration needs; the current flow could easily be doubled. The daily calls for help we receive from relatives of Romanian Jews (we receive none from the much larger Jewish community in neighboring Hungary) gives a lie to Romanian claims that the need declines progressively every year. It is no accident that annual Jewish emigration dropped suddenly from c4000 in 1973 and 1974 to 2000 in 1975 and 1976, immediately after Romania received MFN, and then dropped sharply agai to cl000 thereafter. Despite the assertions of the Romanian authorities, we are confident that Romanian Jewish emigration could comfortably reach 2500 4000 a year for the rest of decade.
- b) List of Registrations for Emigration to Israel In 1979, Romanian officials committed themselves to the regular dispatch of the list of registrations for Israel to the US ambassador in Bucharest and to the US Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations. The implementation of this committment has been quite irregular. For example, in the summer of 1982, Administration and Congress had to base their

considerations of Most-Favored-Nation trading status renewal on lists not reaching beyond October 12, 1981 -- a gap of almost nine months! -- though Romanian lists of "approvals" were plentiful.

If you request MONTHLY LISTS of Israel emigration registrants, approvals and exit to the US embassy in Bucharest and to Rabbi J. Berman, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, c/o Kaye, Scholer, etc., 425 Park Avenue, New York, NY 10022, we may, at least, get them quarterly.

6 - Rumanian Amnesty for Vatra-Dornei Four

These men were accused of a minor offense in the SovRom (Soviet-Romanian) Wood Factory 30 years ago, and are still being penalized with enormous fines for "causing damage to the state". Though now released from prison, they still have to pay 1/3 of meager incomes as punishment, despite the fact that the original sums, involving only hundreds of dollars per individual and some thousands for the whole group, have been long paid.

These men and their wives, almost all over 70, are desperate to join their children and grandchildren abroad. They need an amnesty decree to emigrate.

The Romanian authorities' claim that they are "criminals" should be refuted with the fact that in 1980 the same authorities granted an amnesty to 18 Jewish "criminals" accused of much more serious offenses 20 years previously under Decree 199. During the 1980 Congressional MFN hearings, however, the Romanians no longer referred to them as "criminals".

During the 1982 hearings, a number of Christian prisoners were amnestied by Decree 200.

After three decades, it is time that these elderly people be permitted to join their families. They are: Isaac Bleichman, Str. Dornelor 16, Vatra-Dornei; Samuil Feiden, Str. Vioenti 37, Vatra-Dornei; Natan Fleischer, Str. Castanilor 6, Bacau; and Herman Rubinger, Str. N. Beloianis 9, Bucharest.

At Tab A is a memorandum from Secretary Shultz to the President which provides the results of Under Secretary Eagleburger's recent trip to Romania and Yugoslavia, with emphasis on the issue of Romania's emigration tax. It reports that in Eagleburger's January 11 discussions with President Ceausescu, the Romanian President gave no indication that the government's decision on the emigration tax would be changed or reversed. The memorandum also proposes that an interagency group be organized to examine this issue, to develop an interim policy strategy and to make recommendations on how to manage the political/economic consequences of non-renewal of Romania's MFN status.

At Tab I is a memorandum for your signature to the President summarizing and forwarding Secretary Shultz's memorandum of January 14.

ESSENTIAL FACTORS

Under Secretary Eagleburger's January 10-11 trip to Romania helped ensure that President Ceausescu is under no illusions that Romania can retain MFN and associated benefits if it implements the education repayment decree of November 6, 1982. At the same time, the Romanians did not show flexibility in their position on the decree during the Eagleburger visit, and on January 24 our Embassy in Bucharest learned for the first time of a case in which an emigrant apparently is being asked to repay the state for the cost of her education. It is not clear yet whether this is an isolated case or means that full implementation is under way. Deputy Assistant Secretary Mark Palmer called in the Romanian Chargé on January 24 to request urgent clarification and to reiterate that MFN will be removed if implementation of the decree proceeds.

SUGGESTED GAMEPLAN

If the Romanians do proceed with implementation of the decree, the only questions will be when and precisely how to take away MFN. We could act to suspend MFN as soon as full implementation became clear or we could wait and terminate it on June 2nd when the President's annual recommendation to the Congress on the future of MFN is due. The questions of timing and manner can be decided later and should be designed to encourage the Romanians to revert to the status quo ante.

However, if implementation does not now proceed, we need to determine how best to use the next few months. It is in our interest to preserve and maintain our relations with Romania at their present level if this can be done without a "deal" to pay for emigrants. We must continue to be absolutely explicit with the Romanians -- the U.S. cannot and will not make any Israeli or German-type arrangement. And we should recognize the need

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

to begin thinking how to manage a post-MFN relationship. At the same time, we must look for ways to convince the Romanians / that it will be more to their advantage not to implement the decree than to do so. MFN is central to our present relationship -- economically, politically, and psychologically -- and its loss would be a serious blow. It also would lead to reduced emigration. Therefore, if there is no immediate implementation, we suggest the following gameplan:

- 1. January 25: An interagency meeting took place to examine where we stand in our relations with Romania and to explore ways to encourage the Romanians to improve their emigration/human rights performance and persuade them not to implement the education tax decree. We are developing a set of positive and negative inducements, i.e., a trade promotion program, LANDSTAT ground station, linking EXIM credits for their nuclear power plant to non-implementation of the decree, annual bilateral talks on global issues, etc. Much of this would be simply showing movement on prior commitments but doing so in the next few months.
- 2. Early February: Deputy Foreign Minister Groza should be invited by Larry Eagleburger to visit Washington for a general review of relations with him and for the second stage of discussions to reach agreement on improved emigration procedures with Elliott Abrams and Rick Burt, as suggested in the President's letter to Ceausescu of December 1. Improvement in emigration procedures is one of two preconditions to a Presidential recommendation to extend MFN and to overcoming Congressional opposition to continuing MFN. (N.B.: One major Congressional concern, i.e., speeding up the processing of emigration cases, is particularly tricky and potentially embarrassing, since we currently are unable to take in all the people the Romanians have approved for departure to the U.S. of limitations on our refugee numbers, there are now over 1,000 people with exit passports in hand whom we cannot assist to depart Romania. We are helping about 100 refugees to leave each month, while the Romanians are approving about 200 passports for travel to the U.S. per month. Thus the backlog grows.)



- 3. Early February: A Canadian/Italian/U.S. technical mission is tentatively scheduled to visit Romania for an on-site inspection and evaluation of the proposed Cernavoda nuclear power plant. EXIM has committed but not disbursed \$120 million to General Electric for its share of the project. U.S. participation in this tripartite visit, which EXIM currently is resisting, would demonstrate our continuing interest in the project without obligating us to any specific course of action. We need to make clear to the Romanians that this deal will only go through if they do not implement the decree and continue to meet their economic obligations, i.e., debt rescheduling.
- 4. Late March/Early April: During Larry Eagleburger's visit to Bucharest the Romanians proposed that Foreign Minister Andrei visit Washington to continue the discussions. Assuming that they do not implement the decree before then, we should go ahead with this visit and use it to expose Andrei further to Administration and Congressional thinking on the decree and related issues. We should try to obtain a firm commitment from Andrei that the decree will not be implemented.
- 5. April and May: If the decree has not been implemented and we have reached agreement on improvements in emigration procedures, the Administration will need to lobby with Congress to ensure the continuation of MFN. It is possible the Romanians will be unwilling to give us an explicit commitment not to implement the decree. In this case we would need to tell them and the Congress that we would take away MFN if they do proceed to implement the decree after MFN is extended for one more year. With MFN extended and if our economy improves and Romanian exports to us expand, we will retain a powerful lever for influencing Romanian policy. However, without MFN we would lose much of our capacity to influence Romania and ease considerably the Soviet problem of bringing a recalcitrant Ceausescu back into line with other, more orthodox Warsaw Pact leaders. We also would see a downturn in emigration.
- 6. Early Summer: There is a possibility that the Vice President might include Romania in a more general visit to Eastern Europe. We need to think how such a visit could be fit into our strategy of penalties and rewards.

Additional steps to be taken will emerge from the interagency consultation process and as events unfold. While we may succeed in avoiding implementation of the decree, in the end we may fail and have to take away MFN. There inevitably would be much fingerpointing if this occurred, and both emigration and U.S.-Romanian relations would take a sharp drop. But we will be better positioned vis-a-vis the Romanians, Congress and those interested in emigration if we have made a maximum effort over the next few months.
