

However, the question of the site would be secondary if you accept this award, as we would be very pleased to yield to your preference on this matter. The date for this major event would be within the time frame of September 26 and December 31, 1985.

Mr. Vice President, as you know, Justice Brandeis represented the essence of Jewish patriotism and he eloquently expressed his view that this was compatible with true Americanism. In the difficult days prior to the establishment of the State of Israel, Brandeis projected his deep concern for the Jewish people by assuming an indispensable leadership role. The prestige of his highly respected name bolstered support and understanding for the Zionist objective which resulted in the creation of the Jewish State.

The ZOA Brandeis Award is a bronze bust of the late Justice Louis D. Brandeis and it is presented to those Americans who epitomize the essence of commitment in the spirit of the eminent jurist.



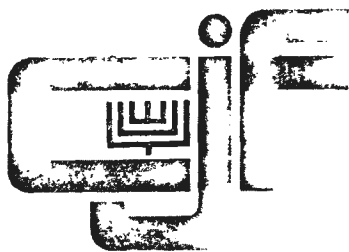


Dear Dick:
