On April 4, 1985 I was sworn in as Municipal Court Judge of Elizabeth. The appointment was made by the Assignment Judge of Union County, the Honorable Edward W. Beglin, Jr. pursuant to NJSA 2A:8-10 and in accordance with rule 1:12-3 (a), rule 7:4-3 (b)(1). I served as an acting judge on a part-time basis. I also on occasion served as an acting judge for the City of Union.

The Municipal Court has jurisdiction over petty misdemeanors and misdemeanors which can result in imprisonment for up to a year. Typical cases, include assault, disorderly conduct, theft, criminal mischief, possession of marijuana, etc. All traffic offenses including drunk driving as well as violation of all city ordinances are heard in municipal court.

None of my decisions were ever appealed. Cases I heard prompted me to write a number of articles for publication in the New Jersey Law Journal. I was a columnist for the Law Journal with a monthly column entitled "View From the Municipal Bench". I attended a regular cycle of educational programs for municipal court judges sponsored by the Superior Court.

GOVERNMENTAL EXPERIENCE

On August 6, 1979, I was appointed Assistant Counsel to the Honorable Governor Brendan T. Byrne. My duties included advising on pending and proposed legislation, coordinating access between the various State departments and the Governor's office, counselling on policy issues and interdepartmental differences raised by the aforementioned departments, providing guidance to diverse State councils and commissions, and acting on behalf of the Governor and the Counsel on an assigned basis.

In April of 1979 I was appointed the Chairman of the Human Rights Commission of Elizabeth by the Honorable Mayor Thomas G. Dunn. The Commission was created by City Council pursuant to state-wide legislation to ensure that individual rights and freedoms are promoted. The objective of the Commission is to improve the quality of life for the residents of the City. Specifically, to protect against the deprivation or denial of any rights by any governmental agency, authority, their officials or employees.

In March of 1986, I was nominated by the Honorable Governor Thomas Kean and confirmed by the Senate Judiciary Committee and the Senate as a whole to be a Commissioner of the Public Broadcasting Authority. This autonomous agency operates New Jersey's statewide public television system consisting of four stations. Known as New Jersey Network, it is the largest producer of local programming of any public television organization in the United States.

In my present position, created in a departmental reorganization in 1983, I direct the financial management functions of a locally administered human services department. I manage a staff of 25 who are responsible for the following functions: budget preparation; program cost benefit analysis; accounting; grants management; program billing; Federal, state and county financial reporting; and public assistance and purchase of service payments. The department has an annual operating budget of over \$20,000,000 and provides services in over 60 programs to citizens of Arlington County. The department is responsible for health, mental health, public assistance, employment, job training, aging and social services. A variety of Federal, state, and local sources are utilized to fund the department's programs.

Since the reorganization, I have modified a number of the department's financial management functions. I have implemented a consolidated department budgeting process that has resulted in an increased level of program integration. I have also integrated the accounting, statistical reporting, grants, contract management, and billing functions that were previously dispersed throughout the department. Finally, I have modernized the organization's overall information processing function by introducing a network of 30 microcomputers and 10 word processors to the department.

I served on the transition team that implemented both the functional and physical aspects of the reorganization. I negotiated new reimbursement arrangements between the county and state agencies to accomodate changes resulting from the reorganization. In addition, I served on a county task force to design an integrated, on-line, human services information system. As part of this process, I worked with state agency staff to coordinate this local effort with existing state information system requirements. The county is now implementing the system, and I serve on the task force overseeing this project.

I developed, implemented, and administered public welfare policies and programs. I also interpreted and executed Federal, state, and local laws and regulations governing these programs. In this position, I directed a staff of 50. I was responsible for developing long and short range plans, preparing division budgets, and monitoring expenditures.

I also directed the function of eligibility determination for public assistance and service programs. This function determined client eligibility for the following programs: Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Food Stamps, Medicaid, General Assistance, Refugee Assistance, State-Local Hospitalization, Social Service Block Grant (Title XX) Services, and Housing Expense Relief. I coordinated a staff to develop techniques for budgeting and allocating funds for health and social services. I initiated an annual survey of local program allocations, management and fund raising expenses and budgeting procedures. With the survey data I created an allocations information base used widely by local United Ways as well as by the national office. I also provided technical assistance in the areas of planning and budgeting to local United Ways. This technical assistance focused on improving methods of determining community needs, assessing service effectiveness, and improving financial accountability.

I assisted in revising and implementing the "generally accepted accounting principles" for not-for-profit human service organizations and the <u>Standards</u> of Accounting and Financial Reporting for Voluntary Health and Welfare <u>Organizations</u>.
