Dear VnameV:

On behalf of President Reagan, I want to thank you and your students for your letter about your school.

Since receiving the recommendations of the National Commission on Excellence in Education in April, the President has heard from hundreds of teachers and students, many of whom invite the President to visit their schools. While the President would like to meet with everyone who has written, his schedule has allowed him to visit schools only on a select basis. These visits have confirmed the President's belief that our nation has thousands of outstanding schools. We can also be proud of our many excellent students, teachers and school administrators. We cannot look at ourselves as a nation, however, without seeing room for improvement.

Unfortunately, the facts presented to the President show that improvement is needed, and the President is confident that those same dedicated teachers and administrators recognize this. For example, since 1963 scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test have shown a virtually unbroken decline. Thirty-five of our States now require only one year of math to graduate; 36 States require only one year of science. We have begun to recognize that many of our students place badly compared to students in other industrialized countries. Sadly, an estimated half of our country's gifted young people do not fulfill their potential.

Some people believe that these problems are due to a lack of money for education. In spite of the stories you may have heard, total spending for education is increasing. According to the National Education Association, total expenditures for the nation's public schools this year are expected to reach \$116.9 billion. That is up seven percent from last year and more than double what was spent just 10 years ago. If money were the answer we should be further ahead than we were 10 years ago -- but that is not the case.
