Dear Mr. Alexander:

This request is for a video message from President Ronald Reagan for use at the Annual Conference of the American Friends of Turkey, scheduled for February 5-7, 1987 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Crystal City, Virginia. A draft copy of a proposed text is enclosed for use by the staff in preparing the President's remarks.

The 1987 meeting will be the 12th annual gathering of the American Friends of Turkey, originated by former US Military and State Department personnel who served in Turkey and recognized the strategic importance of Turkey to US interests in the Middle East. Motivated by the fact that US relations with Turkey were poorly represented in our country, the group undertook the challenge of conducting programs designed to widen US citizen knowledge about Turkey and its role in stabilizing the Middle East and anchoring the Southeastern flank of NATO.

Subsequently, the group grew to its present form with representatives in nearly every state of the Union. Today we possess the capacity to conduct programs that habitually draw audiences into the thousands. Major US industrial firms have now joined the organization and numerous members of Congress, all the former living US Ambassadors to Turkey, several of the former NATO Commanders, a number of former Chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, many Senior US and Turkish Commanders, diplomats and US foreign diplomats attend regularly. The US Ambassador to Turkey, Ambassador Robert Strauss-Hupe and the Turkish Ambassador to the United States, Ambassador Sukru Elekdag attend our meeting annually. Speakers and participants have included several members of the Congress; numerous members of the Turkish Parliament; Admiral William Crowe, present Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Secretary of Commerce, William Baldridge; former Secretary of State Alexander Haig; Assistant Secretary of Defense for Security Affairs, The Honorable Richard Perle; the former Secretary of the Air Force, The Honorable Verne Orr; the Chief of Staff of the Air Force; a number of former Chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Admiral Thomas Moorer; General Lyman L. Lemnitzer; General David Jones; and General John Vessey.

Our industry representatives are from both the US and Turkish communities. Major US firms include, but are not limited to: United Technologies, General Electric, General Dynamics, Westinghouse, Litton Industries, Olin, Singer, OEA,

LTV, Martin Marietta, General Defense, etc. Turkish Companies include construction and travel firms; manufacturing companies; consumer goods manufacturers; Defense firms; etc.

The American Friends of Turkey is a non-profit educational organization with no paid staff. All work is done by volunteers and by dedicated citizens who believe in the obligations we have made through the NATO alliance to our allies; specifically Turkey - thus the name: The American Friends of Turkey.

It is our perception that Turkey, and Turks, are misunderstood in our country. America and Americans are often misunderstood in Turkey. The American Friends of Turkey has as its objective the establishment of a better understanding and a greater appreciation of the other.

President Reagan's video message will be played at our Saturday evening black-tie formal awards banquet at which we traditionally have 1,000 people in attendance, including many of the dignitaries mentioned above. Both the US and Turkish Ambassadors as well as representatives of both US and Turkish governments will also be present.



# **International Red Cross bars** Magen David Adom as member

GENEVA (JTA) — The International Red Cross appears to have erected a permanent barrier against recognition of Israel's Magen David Adom (Red Star of David) as a humanitarian agency by its decision to change its official title to the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. Israel and Jewish organizations have objected vigorously.

The Red Crescent is the relief organization's symbol in Moslem countries, just as the Magen David Adom is in Israel. The formal decision to incorporate the Red Crescent was endorsed without a vote by delegates from more than 120 governments and 137 national societies attending the international conference of the Red Cross here, a quadrennial event.

Pinchas Eliav, Israel's delegate, said restriction of recognition to Christian and Moslem emblems means that Israel is excluded fromthe various international societies which coordinate aid for victims of natural disasters and armed conflict all over the world. He maintained that the Magen David Adom, which sent non-voting observers to the conference, fulfills all criteria for full membership except for its emblem.

Israel has been seeking full membership since the International Red Cross was reorganized in 1948-49 in the aftermath of World

War II. Eliav, lodging a strong dissent from the conference consensus, noted that the six-pointed Star of David was symbolic of Jewish history, creativity and Jewish suffering, as well as being a religious symbol, as are the cross and crescent.

"To our regret, we encountered a lack of readiness and misunderstanding and even the same political hostility which was and still is manifested against the emanicipation of the Jewish people as a nation," Eliav said.

Non-recognition of the Israeli symbol violates the principles of the international humanitarian movement, he said.

"The revised statutes will further aggravate the situation by crystallizing even more the imposition of two religious and civilizational emblems on our global hu-manitarian movement," he warned.

Another strong dissent was voiced by Daniel Lack, representative of the World Jewish Congress, which also has observer status at the conference.

Lack called the renaming "a form of open and blatant discrimination." He said the move negated the principles of neutrality, impartiality, universality and unity.

The conference has received a report containing a long list of violations of humanitarian law in a rising number of armed conflicts worldwide. The report was delivered by Alexandre Hay, president of the all-Swiss International Committee of the Red Cross, which monitors observance of the Geneva conventions and acts as neutral intermediary between warring par-


Hay said disregard of the conventions has become more common in recent years.

"Certain governments or other parties to the conflicts have regularly or even systematically violated not only the provisions of the Geneva conventions but even elementary rules of humanity," he

Specific comments in Hay's report on humanitarian problems in about half of the 23 international and civil conflicts included one on Israel. The west bank settlements, it said, violate the Geneva convention protecting civilian populations.

Israel's refusal to recognize the applicability of international humanitarian law in the occupied territories and during its intervention in Lebanon "has substantially diminished the protection" of persons covered by the conventions, it said.

The conference also changed its title to the International Conference of the Red Cross and Red Crescent.
