Dear Judge Clark:

I have seen a variety of news articles in the last week, most recently a <u>Washington Post</u> article this morning, reporting that the State Department has sent to the President recommendations to limit U.S. arms sales to Taiwan.

As you know, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee wishes to be closely consulted on the issue of arms sales to Taiwan. We have not been consulted about the nature of any possible agreement as outlined in press stories with the People's Republic of China to limit or end arms sales. A number of Committee members will be outraged if major decisions on the future of U.S. arms sales are now once again being made before Committee members have the opportunity to weigh in on the formulation of U.S. pledges to the People's Republic of China. Senators on and off the Committee have expressed the view that a pledge to limit or end arms sales to Taiwan contravenes the Taiwan Relations Act.

In light of Assistant Secretary John Holdridge's scheduled appearance before the Committee on this issue on July 23, I would hope that any decisions will be delayed until the Committee can be consulted. A decision during the Congressional recess, repeating the events of last January when the advanced fighter decision was made when Congress was not in Washington, would be a serious error and would cause major problems on the Hill for our China policy.

Response to Senator Percy re Taiwan Arms Sales

Attached at Tab I is a proposed response to Senator Percy which refers to the President's telephone call and other efforts to keep Congress abreast of developments on the Taiwan arms sales issue. Gaston and I agree that the tactics now being using by some Senators and some of their staffers is to push for rapid notification to Congress of F5E coproduction in the Mope that publicity attendant to that notification will jeopardize any possible agreement with the PRC.

We will come at you with specific recommendations as to tactics we should follow or Monday, but want to share this insight with you now. We also feel that in some cases it is the staffers on the Hill who are more virulent than their Senators. A specific case is Emerson, who works for Senator Goldwater. Gaston found the Senator quite calm and rational yesterday afternoon, while it was Emerson who constantly tried to inflame the issue.

The reciprocal of this tactic is to make certain that the PRC knows that they are not going to get any more compromises from us. As of now, State is going to request that the Vice President call in the Chinese ambassador and tell him that our bottom line has been reached. We think this is a sound tactic.

Dear Judge Clark:

I have seen a variety of news articles in the last week, most recently a <u>Washington Post</u> article this morning, reporting that the State Department has sent to the President recommendations to limit U.S. arms sales to Taiwan.

As you know, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee wishes to be closely consulted on the issue of arms sales to Taiwan. We have not been consulted about the nature of any possible agreement as outlined in press stories with the People's Republic of China to limit or end arms sales. A number of Committee members will be outraged if major decisions on the future of U.S. arms sales are now once again being made before Committee members have the opportunity to weigh in on the formulation of U.S. pledges to the People's Republic of China. Senators on and off the Committee have expressed the view that a pledge to limit or end arms sales to Taiwan contravenes the Taiwan Relations Act.

In light of Assistant Secretary John Holdridge's scheduled appearance before the Committee on this issue on July 23, I would hope that any decisions will be delayed until the Committee can be consulted. A decision during the Congressional recess, repeating the events of last January when the advanced fighter decision was made when Congress was not in Washington, would be a serious error and would cause major problems on the Hill for our China policy.
