

1981 OFFICIAL INAUGURAL EVENTS

INAUGURAL OPENING DAY CEREMONY

The official opening of the Presidential Inaugural will be held at the Lincoln Memorial, January 17th, at 6 p.m. The ceremonies are free to the public and feature the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the United States Army Band. They will also include a peeling of the bells throughout the city, a laser light show and a fireworks extravaganza unsurpassed in pyrotechnic history.

GOVERNORS' RECEPTION

This afternoon ceremony honoring incumbent Governors and Governors-elect of the fifty states and territories takes place at the Sheraton Washington Ballroom between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 18. The Hotel is at 2660 Woodley Road, near Connecticut Avenue.

Quests are invited for a one-hour period only (1:30-2:30, 2:30-3:30, or 3:30-4:30 p.m.). The times for which they are invited are indicated by color-coded tickets. Tickets are \$10 per person. Each guest will receive a special Reception favor.

Because of the size of this Reception, there are very limited facilities to check coats. Parking facilities also are very limited. Therefore, it is recommended that quests use shuttle buses from major downtown hotels. 6 By special invitation.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE

Every Inaugural celebration includes a worship service; although President-elect and Mrs. Reagan expect to attend a service at the National Presbyterian Church on Sunday, January 18, the official Inaugural religious observance will be held at the National City Christian Church. The service will begin at 1:30 and conclude at about 3:30 p.m. The Church stands on Thomas Circle, Massachusetts Avenue and 14th Street, N.W.

INAUGURAL CONCERTS

Since George Washington's first Inauguration in New York in 1789, an evening of distinguished music traditionally has been a highlight among Inaugural ceremonies. On Sunday evening, January 18, classical performances will be presented at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. On stage will be internationally renowned artists from the world of opera, ballet and classical music. Quest artists will be performing with symphony orchestras during the programs.

At the DAR Constitution Hall, there will a 3 p.m. farewell performance by Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians. Chamber music in the Eisenhower Theater at 7:30 p.m., opera and ballet in the Opera House at 7:30 p.m., and the National Symphony in the Concert Hall at 9 p.m., all in the Kennedy Center. Mikhail Baryshnikov, Lorin Maazel, and Mstislav Rostropovich are featured artists at the Kennedy Center. By special invitation.

CANDLELIGHT DINNERS

Two Donor Candlelight Dinners are being given on the Roof Terrace of the Kennedy Center for 2500 guests. These dinners will be held in conjunction with the Inaugural Concerts on Sunday, January 18, 1981. The first Candlelight Dinner begins at 6 p.m. and ends shortly before the 9 p.m. Concert Hall performance by the National Symphony. The second dinner is from 10:00 p.m. until 12:30 a.m. It follows the two concerts in the Opera House and in the Eisenhower Theater which start at 7:30 p.m. Dress will be black-tie. By special invitation.

DISTINGUISHED LADIES' RECEPTION

On Monday morning, January 19, at 11 a.m. an elegant reception will be held at the Kennedy Center to honor the First Lady, Mrs. Reagan, and the wife of the Vice President, Mrs. Bush. Arrangements will be made for transportation to and from the Kennedy Center and pre-arranged locations. Champagne and punch will be served at the reception. Tickets are \$10 each. By special invitation.

SENIOR CITIZENS AND HANDICAPPED RECEPTION

A reception to honor Senior Citizens and the Handicapped will be held at the Department of State in the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, a magnificent setting with some of the rarest and most beautiful American furnishings. This is scheduled for Monday, January 19, between 2 and 4 p.m. By special invitation.

RECEPTION FOR THE VICE PRESIDENT-ELECT

On Monday, January 19th, between 2:30 and 6 p.m., there will be a reception to honor Vice President-elect Bush at the National Museum of American History (until recently, called the Museum of History and Technology) at 12th Street and Constitution Avenue, N.W. Refreshments will be served. Admission charge is \$10. Reception tickets are only available at "Will Call" (see page 14), not at Smithsonian. Guests are welcome only during specified hours; because of fire safety regulations it is essential that time commitments be honored. By special invitation.

INAUGURAL GALA

The first gala ever to be held at the Capital Centre, Landover, Maryland, will be a star-studded evening of memorable music and top entertainment. It will be held Monday, January 19, at 7:45 p.m. Frank Sinatra is the Gala's Director of Entertainment. He has planned an extraordinary extravaganza with Johnny Carson as host. The Gala will be televised nationally, but not in the Washington area. Tickets for boxes seating ten cost \$10,000. Regular admission tickets cost \$150 and \$100. By special invitation.

Tickets for orders placed after January 6 must be picked up at "Will Call" (see page 14). Bus tickets for the Gala are available for purchase at "Ticket Will Call" and hotels (see page 16) for \$10, round trip.

INAUGURATION CEREMONY

The historic 35-word oath is the center of this imposing ceremony, to be held for the first time at the West Front of the Capitol. Previous Inaugurations have been held on the East Front. The change has been made so that there will be more room for spectators. Capitol grounds accessible by special invitation only; if you hold tickets you must allow ample time to reach your designated viewing area. The January 20 ceremony begins at 11:30 a.m. It will be telecast.

PARADE

"America — A Great New Beginning" is the theme of the 1981 Presidential Inaugural Parade which will be held on Inauguration Day, Tuesday, January 20. The parade is scheduled to leave the Capitol vicinity one hour and fifteen minutes after the conclusion of the Inaugural Address.

An official escort of elected and appointed government officials, Senators, and Representatives will precede President and Mrs. Reagan and Vice President and Mrs. Bush from the Capitol traveling west on Constitution Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue.

The Parade of military, high school and college bands, equestrian groups, military units and selected floats will form on the Mall and will start at 4th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., continuing west on Pennsylvania Avenue. Since Washington weather in January is unpredictable at best, the warmest layered

accumulation of clothing should be worn by those viewing the parade downtown.

Seats in the reviewing stands are available to those who have purchased tickets according to procedures described on page 14. Standing room is available along the route, free to all.

OUTDOOR CONCERT

TODAY Show's Willard Scott will emcee the Outdoor Concert on Inauguration Day. This open-air tribute to America's New Beginning is slated to begin about 4:00 p.m. on the Mall side of the Capitol, following the parade. Highlights of the Concert include honoring the recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor, the New York City Police Department Bagpipe Band, The Citadel Band of Charleston, South Carolina, and other highly acclaimed marching bands. In addition, well-known entertainers will cap the event. This Concert is offered to the public free-of-charge.

INAUGURAL DAY SKY SALUTE

Spectacular aerial fireworks will illuminate the City's monumental core from the Capitol and Supreme Court down the Mall and over the Potomac beyond the Lincoln Memorial for television and a special audience of 200 Congressional Medal of Honor men and their families. This tradition of fireworks for Inaugural festivities dates far back into the 19th century. The 1981 display begins at sunset on Inauguration Day, after the parade and outdoor musical program. Within a fifteen-minute period, 10,000 shells will be fired.

INAUGURAL BALLS

Some forty thousand guests in Washington will participate in the Inaugural Balls at four hotels, three Smithsonian buildings, the Kennedy Center and at the Pension Building which was a favorite Ball site in the 19th century. Cabinet officers, Supreme Court Justices, Ambassadors and Chiefs of Mission, Governors of the States and Territories, Senators, and Members of the House of Representatives will be among the guests present. The President and Mrs. Reagan plan to make stops at all the festivities, as do Vice President and Mrs. Bush. All other guests, notables included, will attend only one gathering.

Check Hospitality Booths for complimentary bus service from commuter lots and many hotels to the balls. Various locations are designed by color-coded tickets which are valid only for the site specified. Besides the Pension Building and the Kennedy Center, Ball sites include the Museum of Natural History, the Air and Space Museum, and the Museum of American History (until recently called the Museum of History and Technology), as well as the Mayflower, Shoreham Americana, Sheraton Washington, and Washington Hilton Hotels. Special invitations are required for the purchase of tickets, which cost \$100 per person. Boxes seating eight cost \$2,000.

Notables from the world of entertainment will act as masters of ceremonies at the balls. The entertainment will be coordinated by Marty Pasetta, who directs the satellite broadcasting of the Academy Awards. Closed

circuit television of the Washington parties will be shown at 105 satellite balls held all over America in hotel ballrooms, civic centers, and similar facilities under the auspices of a variety of local sponsoring groups. The highlight of the evening will be comments by President Reagan. The television coverage will include backward glances that take the form of film clips of previous Inaugural celebrations. The network of live big-screen satellite closed-circuit telecasts includes more Americans than ever before in the Inaugural activities. Americans abroad will be celebrating the night of January 20th. There will be an Inaugural Ball at the Conciergerie in Paris, the first such party overseas.

Other parties in the Nation's Capital on the night of Inauguration Day include a Young Voters' Gala (for those under thirty) featuring entertainment and music chosen to please the young. At the Mayflower Hotel, by special invitation.

ADMISSION TO CEREMONIES

While the Commemorative Invitation to the Inauguration conveys the hope that you can be present in the City of Washington for this historic occasion, the Invitation itself admits you to none of the Inaugural events that require tickets. Except for the Parade tickets, special invitations for each event are required in order to purchase tickets of admission.

PARADE TICKETS

Tickets for grandstand seating for the Inaugural Parade will be offered for sale on a first-come, first-served basis at "Ticket Will Call" at Union Station (see details below) beginning on Friday, January 16, 1981. Cash, checks and credit cards will be accepted for payment. Tickets prices are \$15, \$25, \$75, and \$100. A map on page 24 explains where grandstand seats have been erected. It also shows the Parade route where ample standing room is available without charge.

INVITATIONS "TICKET WILL CALL"

Persons holding special invitations to official events who have not yet submitted their checks may telephone "Ticket Will Call" to determine whether tickets are still available. The number is 382–8054. Tickets for orders received after January 6, 1981, must be picked up at "Will Call", located in the East Wing of the National Visitors' Center at Union Station, First Street and Massachusetts Avenue, N.E. "Will Call" is open from January 7th through 20th, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Saturday, and from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. on Sundays.

If you cannot appear in person at "Will Call" to pay for and collect your tickets, please be sure that your representative is properly identified and has your letter of authorization, written on your letterhead.

METEOROLOGICAL FOOTNOTE: The highest recorded D.C. temperature for any January 20th is 71°, the lowest is 3°. If average weather conditions prevail for January 20th, the temperature will be 37° with partly-cloudy skies, wind 10 m.p.h. or less and a 20% chance of precipitation. There is a 5% chance of snow.

INCOMPLETE ARRANGEMENTS

Several activities slated to take place during Inaugural Week are in the planning stage as this Guide Book goes to press. Where insufficient information suggests this difficulty, please consult the Hospitality Booths and daily newspapers for up-to-date information.

The Hospitality Booths, staffed by members and volunteers of the Hospitality Committee, can provide information on city highlights, transportation needs, ticket availability, medical emergencies, state society meetings, and more, for Inaugural weekend visitors, as well as the latest developments or changes in the schedule of Inaugural events during the hours of 9 a.m.-9 p.m., January 17 through January 19 and from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on January 20.

To make your Washington visit more enjoyable, please stop by at any of the red, white and blue Hospitality Booths in the greater downtown Washington area, the airports and Union Station (Visitors Center), at many of the special events, and at the following hotels. TRANSPORTATION

Hospitality booths and hotels have special bus schedules and Metro (subway) information available for visitors. Free shuttles, where offered, are the best way to go from many hotels to official Inaugural events. The presence of many visitors as well as the blocking of the Parade route make public transportation easler than private cars. For \$10 round trip there will be buses from many hotels to the Inaugural Gala: tickets for this are sold at hotels (see page 16) and "Ticket Will Call" (see page 14).

Allow ample time to reach your destination. Dress warmly enough to remain comfortable during possible delays. When the subway route coincides with your destination, the most efficient method of transport will be underground. The Parade route and the Mall area are notably well-served by the Metro (subway) system.

Taxis charge by a zone system and there is a rushhour increase. Drivers will not change large bills.

Exact change required for bus fares which vary with time of day, with rush hour increase like cabs and subways.

STATE SOCIETIES

Gatherings sponsored by various State Societies during the Inaugural week are listed at the Information Center of the Inaugural Committee. Consult them by phoning 382-8439 or 751-2000, ext. 247. Inquire also at Hospitality booths.

VETERANS ACTIVITIES

The Presidential Inaugural Committee-1981 is honored to host an estimated 200 recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and their wives. This is nearly double the number of Medal of Honor winners ever to have attended a Presidential Inaugurai. The Honor Quard of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be at area airports on Saturday, January 17, to welcome them. The VFW will honor the medalists at a reception at the Sheraton Washington on Sunday evening. On Monday, AMVETS will host a breakfast for the Medal of Honor Society and the Joint Chiefs of Staff will honor this group at lunch. The Disabled American Veterans will host a buffet at their Maine Avenue Headquarters Monday evening.

Tuesday morning, the Reserve Officers Association will host a brunch at their headquarters at One Constitution Ave., N.E. The medalists and the national leadership of the various veterans groups will assemble on the Capitol grounds for the swearing-in and later watch the parade and fireworks display.

That evening the American Legion will give a "Salute to Heroes" Banquet. Later, the medalists and other members of the veterans community will attend the Veterans Inaugural Ball at the Capital Hilton. By agreement with veteran organization leadership, President Reagan will not appear at the Veterans Inaugural Ball but will greet those present by telephone.

CULTURAL EVENTS COMMITTEE

Along with the museums of the Smithsonian Institution the Cultural Events Committee welcomes the public to a series of free musical programs, including jazz, chamber music, mariachi, Japanese Koto, Country and Western, Blue Grass, Big Band sounds and military music, all celebrating America's cultural diversity. Singers range from the Airmen of Note and the Singing Sergeants to barber shop quartets, gospel choirs, classical soloists, and Irish, Cajun, and Appalachian folk singers and dancers. Throughout the city, museums are offering special Inaugural exhibits. These cultural events are listed in free brochures available at Hospitality Booths, Visitors Center, the Smithsonian Museums and at hotels.

The co-chairmen of the Presidential Inaugural Committee-1981 wish to express their gratitude to the Jimmy Carter Memorial Trust for its generous contribution to the cultural events program.

MEDICAL COMMITTEE

The Medical Committee has set up a Command Post near Ft. McNair in Room 2-914, Building A, 2nd and T Street, S.W. Washington, D.C. to serve people who need emergency medical and health assistance. This Committee sponsors medical aid rooms, warming tents, first-aid stations and comfort stations which are conveniently located for special events and all along the Parade route.

ETHNIC FESTIVITIES

The rich mix of America's racial and national composition is celebrated in many ways during the Inaugural Week. In addition to the on-going ethnic entertainment and culinary offerings at Union Station (Visitors Center), our ethnic heritage will be the theme for several parties and cultural exhibitions during this inauguration. Please consult daily newspapers for exact time and location. Representatives of various nationalities, in native dress, will be present at all Inaugural events adding to the color and festive air of the occasion.

HISPANIC RECEPTION

For the first time, Hispanic Americans have an official event during Inaugural festivities which highlights their rich cultural heritage. The event, featuring entertainment and dance music with a Latin flavor, is scheduled for Sunday evening, January 18, at the Capital Hilton, 16th and K Streets, N.W., in the Presidential Ballroom. Quest appearances by many Hispanic celebrities will add to the festivities. By special invitation.

RECEPTION HONORING BLACK VOTERS

A formal reception will be held from 8 to 11 p.m. on Saturday, January 17, 1981, at the Sheraton Carlton Hotel to honor the National Black Voters for Reagan/Bush and the Honorable Samuel R. Pierce, Secretary-designate of Housing and Urban Develop-

ment. Live entertainment, open bar, buffet supper, and a raw seafood bar will be offered. Tickets are \$75.

SALUTE TO AMERICA'S HERITAGE

Held first in 1973, the Salute to America's Heritage honors the diverse contributions of America's ethnic and national groups, including American Indians, to our pluralistic society. There will be a multi-ethnic exhibit and demonstration of native arts and crafts, a broad sampling of specialty foods and ethnic music and dancing performances for your entertainment. One ticket covering all activities is for sale at Union Station; this Salute is open to all who wish to enjoy these cultural activities of our nation. It takes place Monday afternoon and evening, January 19.

YOUNG VOTERS ACTIVITIES

Celebrating the participation of the young in the electoral process are these events in Washington during Inaugural Week especially for politically active Americans under 30.

CONCERT: Monday, January 19, 8 to 11:30 p.m., Constitution Hall. Casual dress. A program of music chosen to please this young audience.

YOUNG VOTERS GALA: Tuesday, January 20, 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., the Mayflower Hotel. Black tie optional.

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
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INAUGURAL PARADE ROUTE MAP

Music Programs at the Smithsonian

Each year the Smithsonian Institution regularly presents performances which explore and document America's cultural heritage. The celebration of the inaugural of the 40th President provides us the occasion to share a sampling of these performances with those who gather to commemorate this historic event.

The programs being held at 10 Smithsonian museums will present many varieties of music, ranging from the waltzes and two-steps of the Cajun people of Louisiana and the traditional string bands of Appalachia to performances featuring the work of contemporary composers and jazz and gospel artists. Bluegrass, country and other forms of American popular music are represented, as is some music of ethnic minorities. 



A Message of Welcome

One hundred and thirty-five years ago, the Smithsonian Institution was ushered into being, under a new President, James K. Polk, called the "Napoleon of the Stump" because of his skill as an orator. President Polk from Tennessee was one of our distinguished Chief Executives. His sense of moral duty was esteemed by the Congress of his time, and his influence was enhanced by his charming and prominent wife. In his administration Texas and California came into the Union. The vexatious boundary problems between Canada and the Oregon Territory were resolved. He oversaw the removal of tariff restrictions, the establishment of the U.S. Naval Academy and the Department of the Interior.

The Smithsonian owes a debt to President Polk for signing the statute creating our Institution, founded by a British subject, James Smithson. It was to be a landmark triumph for science and culture in a small, humble, and still rather squalid town. With the quadrennial tradition of inaugurals our history has since been intertwined. Major exhibitions and a new custom of music and dance performances with all the cultural centers of this splendid capital help now to enrich each occasion. Thus, we can savor in these ceremonial moments the rich history of our achievements, and reflect for a moment on the need to lay aside contentiousness and to celebrate, all together, the survival of the Republic.

COVERAGE GUIDE

This guide is intended as a brief on coverage rules for inaugural events. Coverage varies from event to event, as do some of the groundrules. If you have questions about specific events, representatives of the PIC Communications Department will be on hand at every credentialed event to assist you where possible and to answer your questions.

Although specific coverage varies from event to event, some groundrules warrant special attention:

- -- As a rule, little if any coverage is permitted of live entertainment events. Where there is coverage, use is limited to 90 seconds. Appearances by Gov. Reagan and Amb. Bush are excluded from the 90-second limitation.
- -- No supplemental lighting whatsoever will be permitted in rooms or arenas which are lit for telecast (Gala, eight of the nine balls).
- -- All members of the press covering inaugural events are expected to conform to the dress specified for guests. Appropriate dress for credentialed events follows:
 - Black Tie (tuxedo for men, evening dress for women)
 Inaugural Balls; Kennedy Center Concerts and Dinners.
 - Black Tie Optional (tuxedo or business suit for men,
 cocktail dress for women)
 Inaugural Gala.
 - Informal (business suit for men, business dress or
 suit for women)
 Distinguished Ladies' Reception; Governors' Reception;
 Co-Chairmen's Reception; Vice President's Reception.
- -- Most major inaugural events require press credentials. However, some events are open for coverage (eg., the January 20 Band Concert and Inaugural Day Sky Salute). Neither the Youth Concert nor the Fred Waring Concert is open for coverage inside the hall.
- -- Space limitations, configuration of the rooms in which some events will be held, and fire marshall regulations have necessitated limiting coverage of nearly all credentialed events.

The information contained on the attached pages is current as of the beginning of the credentialing process on January 15. For updated or additional information, call the PIC Communications Department at 382-8019.

SPECIAL NOTE: If you have been assigned to one ball, it is the one to which most of your state's attendees have been ticketed.

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SPECIAL NOTE: Media covering the swearing-in ceremony and holding "Parade--Lafayette Park" credentials may wish to ride special buses from the Capitol to Lafayette Park. They will be escorted by Lee Troxler to buses waiting at Constitution and Delaware. Buses arrive at 1:05 p.m. and depart en route Lafayette Park promptly at 1:15 p.m.

INAUGURAL FACT SHEET

The inaugural fact sheet answers many of the questions frequently asked about inaugural preparations and the events which are on the official schedule for the inauguration of Governor Ronald Reagan as the 40th President of the United States.

Inaugural Firsts

The inaugural celebration of 1981 differs from past inaugurals in several respects:

- The oath-of-office ceremony is to take place at the West Front of the Capitol rather than the East Front.
- New event, Inaugural Opening Ceremony. This 45-minute program of live music, a laser light display, and a massive fireworks show, marks the first time there has been a formal beginning for inaugural activity. President Reagan and Vice President Bush will attend. Lincoln Memorial, Saturday evening; free.
- New event, Capitol Concert. First-rank band entertainment, West Front of the Capitol following the parade: Tuesday: free.
- New event, Inaugural Day Sky Salute. Music, fireworks, along the mall; immediately follows concerts; free.
- The community satellite ball project. The use of satellite technology to project the entertainment from the Washington Inaugural Balls to wide screens in communities across the nation.
- The most ambitious live entertainment project ever attempted with nationally popular orchestras, head-line entertainers and star masters of ceremonies at every inaugural ball in addition to the spectacular lineup of entertainment for the Inaugural Gala, the Youth Concert, and the Inaugural Concerts at Kennedy Center.
- A shorter, snappier parade...With an ending, a finale featuring the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, from the choir float, singing presidential favorites as the signature for the inaugural parade.

Organization

There are four different groups involved in the Inauguration of the president:

- The 1981 Presidential Inaugural Committee plans the inaugural parade, the opening ceremonies, gala, inaugural balls, concerts, fireworks and most receptions. Robert K. Gray and Charles Z. Wick are the cochairmen of the committee.
- The Joint Congressional Inaugural Committee is responsible for the swearing in of the president and vice president and all inaugural activities on the grounds of the Capitol. Sen. Mark Hatfield, Republican of Oregon, is chairman.
- The Armed Forces Inaugural Committee supports the congressional and presidential inaugural committees.
- The District of Columbia Inaugural Committee provides security, medical and sanitation support for the public ceremonies and events.

Schedule

The Inaugural celebration begins on January 16, 1981, and lasts for four days. Celebrations commence with the opening ceremony and culminate with a full schedule of activity on January 20, Tuesday, which includes the oath of office, parade, Capitol concert, fireworks and the inaugural balls.

INVITATIONS

Who gets an invitation to inaugural balls, receptions, concerts and the Gala? The best answer is a cross section of the American public.

The number of people which could best be accommodated, given space limitations and fire marshal regulations for the various sites, was calculated and then alloted among the 50 states, territories, and traditionally invited groups.

The majority of invitations were sent to the states and state co-ordinators who then decided who to invite. The balance was alloted among various special groups, including Members of Congress of both parties, campaign staff and supporters of the president-elect and vice president-elect, the 50 governors, members of the diplomatic corps, leaders of government and private industry; and representatives of veterans groups, labor, ethnic American organizations, religious leaders, senior citizens, youth, and the handicapped, to name a few.

The number of tickets alloted to special groups was based on need and probability of attendance. Once allocations were made, each group drew up its own invitation list.

ATTENDANCE

About 43,000 invitations were issued for the Inaugural Balls, the single largest ticketed event.

Most of the evening social functions which require an invitation allow the recipient to purchase more than one ticket. In some cases, boxes are available for purchase for up to ten persons. It is the personal choice of the individual invitation recipient, not the inaugural committee, who receives these additional tickets.

The inaugural committee expects well over 100,000 people to be coming to Washington to take part in the inaugural celebration.

HOW VISITORS WILL BE WELCOMED

Visitors arriving in Washington to take part in the inauguration celebration will be greeted, at airports, by musical entertainment.

At Union Station, there will be a "Taste of America" spread for those who come to pick up their tickets in person at the inaugural Will Call Booth. This event will provide samples of the cuisine of America's best restaurants, free of charge, to ticket buyers.

The cost of this event is underwritten by participating restaurants who are donating their services to the inaugural committee.

DRESS FOR EVENTS

Prepare to dress as warmly as possible for outdoor events, since Washington can be extremely cold in January.

This is the recommended dress for inaugural invitation events:

- White tie; black tie optional; Inaugural Balls.
- Black tie; Inaugural Concerts at Kennedy Center, and the Candlelight Suppers.
- Black tie optional; Inaugural Gala.
- Informal; Distinguished Ladies Reception, Governor's Reception, Cochairmen's Reception, Vice President's Reception.

- Candlelight Suppers and Concert, \$500 per person.

- Vice President's Reception, \$10 per ticket.

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- Distinguished Ladies' Reception, \$10 per ticket.
- Governor's Reception, \$10 per person.
- Gala, \$50-\$100-\$150 per person, \$10,000 per box for ten.
- Youth Ball, \$25 per person; Youth Concert, \$15 per person.
- Cochairmen's reception by invitation only, no charge.

SUPPLIES FOR THE INAUGURAL

Most of the supplies purchased by the inaugural committee for its daily operations, as well as supplies for all events are purchased from Washington region merchants and businesses.

Many individuals and companies throughout the country have donated food, wine, decorating accessories, and the services of artists, designers, craftsmen for Inaugural events, in addition to those provided by local business.

Wines served at inaugural functions are exclusively American vintages.

Twenty-five airlines are providing complimentary air fare for Medal of Honor recipients invited to the inaugural. Medal of Honor recipients will be staying at the Tysons Corner Marriott Hotel free of charge, and the recipients are the guests of the inaugural committee at all events.

INAUGURAL STAFF

As of January 11, there were approximately 350 paid staff members at the 1981 Presidential Inaugural Committee housed at Temporary Buildings A and B at 2nd and T streets, S.W. Additionally, some 3,000 volunteers worked on the inaugural.

FINANCES

The 1981 Presidential Inaugural Committee is financed solely by private capital, in accordance with the wishes of Congress. The sources of the revenue to pay the bills of the committee -- estimated at \$8 million -- are those from the sale of tickets, commemorative merchandise, the television packaging of the Gala, and \$156,000 left over from the 1977 inaugural committee.

An interest-free, \$8 million line of credit has been advanced to the committee by corporations and individuals. Committee revenue is used to repay loans and satisfy guarantees, as the revenue accumulates.

HOW THE SATELLITE BALL PROGRAM WORKS

WASHINGTON -- On the evening of Inauguration Day, satellite technology will be used in an unprecedented and ambitious project to bring inaugural balls to communities across the nation.

Never before have there been inaugural balls from coast to coast, and never before with the same orchestras and entertainment as the inaugural balls in Washington.

This year, the Presidential Inaugural Committee, as part of the largest live entertainment project ever attempted, will be broadcasting the sights and sounds of Inauguration night at the balls via satellite to scores of cities and small towns as far away as Hawaii.

The \$1.5 million program is being arranged through the technical assistance of TNT Communications, Inc., of New York, and AT&T. TNT estimates that more than 3,500 personnel will be required to carry out the technical arrangements necessary for closed-circuit TV broadcasts to the ball sites.

Each community inaugural ball will have a closed-circuit TV screen as large as 40 by 60 feet -- 2,400 square feet -- on which the sights and sounds of the Washington balls will be projected. Larger community celebrations may have more than one screen, each provided and installed by TNT.

The entire cost of producing and transmitting the entertainment program is borne by the Presidential Inaugural Committee.

Marty Pasetta, director of televising the Academy Awards, has been working at committee headquarters on production of this unique live satellite broadcast.

2/Satellite Balls

On Inauguration Eve, live feeds from the Washington inaugural balls will be mixed at Pasetta's Kennedy Center production headquarters and transmitted to a communications satellite.

Pasetta will have much to choose from when combining the Washington ball feeds in his broadcast. Headline entertainers at the Washington balls include Tony Bennett, Pat Boone, Ray Charles, Glen Campbell, Tanya Tucker, the Commodores, Johnny Scat Davis, Lionel Hampton, the Houston Pops, Anthony Newley, Wayne Newton, The Osmonds -- featuring Donny and Marie -- Lou Rawls, and Doc Severinsen with the Air Force Band.

Pasetta's program will include dance music for local inaugural guests. The orchestras of Tommy Dorsey, Woody Herman,
Lester Lanin, Peter Duchin, Harry James, Les Brown, Count
Basie, Glenn Miller and Sammy Kaye will perform at the Washington balls. Their entertainment will be broadcast to the community balls.

An impressive array of talent has been provided to emcee the Washington balls. Mike Connors, Robert Conrad, Chad Everret, Charlton Heston, Hugh O'Brian, Ed McMahon, Robert Stack, Efrem Zimbalist, Jr., and Elizabeth Taylor will appear in the satellite broadcast.

ABC has arranged to provide Pasetta with coverage of a special inaugural ball being held in Paris, France, adding an international dimension to the program. Not since Ben Franklin was ambassador to Paris has this celebration of the American constitutional process been so intimately shared across the waters, but then it literally took sea-borne letters to provide communications. On January 20 the connection will only be delayed by the 5-hour time difference between Europe and America.

The highlight of the evening will be an address given by President Reagan, also transmitted by satellite.

Proceeds from the sale of tickets to the community inaugural balls will be donated to charities designated by their sponsors.

"The enthusiastic response shows this is an idea whose time has come," said Charles Hagel, who is in charge of the satellite ball program for the Presidential Inaugural Committee-1981.

Demand for participation in the inaugural balls has increased tremendously since the first ball was held in 1789 for George Washington. At least one official ball has been a presidential inaugural tradition, but recent presidents have had as many as six. This year, there are nine in Washington, and a host of community balls linked to those in the nation's capitol by satellite.

"We hope," Hagel adds, "that by establishing this precedent we make the inauguration of our presidents a truly national event.

"The program is in keeping with the President-elect's wish to share the inaugural festivities as widely as possible -- something which, thanks to satellite technology, is possible now on a scale never dreamed of before."

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
