I am honored to have received from you, Mr. Ambassador, the traditional shamrock, which symbolizes the friendship between us, and I thank you as well for the other kind gifts, particularly the beautiful scroll of the Reagan Irish family tree.

Yet, most of all, I appreciate, Mr. Ambassador, the bit of Irish hospitality you are personally extending to me on this day when I know your presence is in demand -- not just in Washington, but also throughout the United States, where St. Patrick's Day is observed with a fervor equal to that in Ireland.

When law can stop the blades of grass, from growing as they grow,

And when the leaves in Summertime their colors dare not show,

Then will I change the colour too, I wear in my caubeen,

But till that day, plaze God, I'll stick to wearin' o' the green.

The joy for life and happiness in the hearts of the sons and daughters of Ireland is a blessing shared by the entire world every St. Patrick's Day. But as we observe this day of celebration, we cannot forget the conflict and violence that continues in Northern Ireland. We pray for the safety of the innocent, and for the conversion of those engaged in this useless terrorism.

We have no deeper wish than that by next St. Patrick's Day, reasonable men and women on both sides in Northern Ireland will bridge long-standing divisions through good will and compromise. Such efforts continue to have the full backing of the American people, and the utmost support of their President.

And now, Mr. Ambassador, Mrs. Donlon, honored guests,
I ask you to join me in a toast to the enduring friendship
between the Irish and American peoples.





HAUGHEY COMMENTED THAT, ON REFLECTION. HE THOUGHT IT WOULD NOT BE A PARTICULARLY GOOD TIME TO GO SINCE THERE WOULD BE A LONG LINE OF GOVERNMENT HEADS WAITING TO SEE PRESIDENT REAGAN. AS A RESULT. THERE WOULD NOT LIKELY BE SUFFICIENT TIME FOR GOOD SUBSTANTIVE DISCUSSIONS WITH THE PRESIDENT AND OTHER U.S. LEADERS.

- 3. TALKING SHOPTLY AFTERWARD WITH AMBASSADOR SHANNON, SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT DERMOT NALLY SAID NO FINAL DECISION HAD BEEN TAKEN BUT ADDED THAT IT'S ABOUT 80 PERCENT CERTAIN" THAT THE PRIME MINISTER WOULD NOT TRAVEL TO THE U.S. IN MARCH.
- 4. HOWEVER, AT FOREIGN MINISTER LENIHAN'S FEBRUARY 15 IUNCHEON FOR SENATOR DODD, LENIHAN TOLD AMBASSADOR SHANNON THAT HE HAS BEEN URGING THE PRIME MINISTER TO UNDERTAKE THE TRIP AND STILL HOPES HE WILL DO SO.
- 5. COMMENT. THE PRIME MINISTER'S STATED REASONS FOR RELUCTANCE TO VISIT WASHINGTON IN MARCH MAY NOT BE THE IT IS ALSO POSSIBLE THAT HE WANTS TO STICK ONLY ONES. CLOSE TO HOME IN THE RUN-UP TO AN IRISH GENERAL ELECTION

A.M. Briefing Item For The President (Tuesday, March 17)

You may want to alert the President to the fact that Dutch Ambassador Lubbers will be among Sean Donlon's guests at the Irish Embassy lunch tomorrow (he will be attending in his capacity as the current representative of the European Council Presidency - it is a six-month "tour" and the Netherlands is now in the chair); Lubbers may well attempt to beard the President on two items:

- -- Visit of Dutch Prime Minister van Agt. He may push for the President to agree to an official visit toward the end of this month (a schedule proposal, with Haig's strong endorsement, has already gone forward); I gallar this visit is approved.
- -- Visit of Queen Beatrix in April, 1982. The Netherlands will celebrate the bicentennial of its official relationship with the U.S. next year (200 years of unbroken ties, the longest on record, beating even the French) and wants to commemorate the occasion with a number of high-level cultural and political events, including a royal visit in mid-April, 1982.
