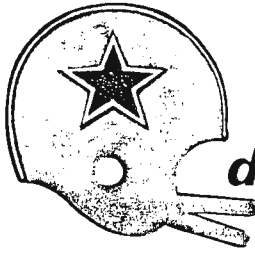
SUBJECT: Attached Letter and Football Jersey



Dear Mr. President:

I have read the letter from Mrs. Robert Haskett, which you sent to me, concerning the unfortunate situation that prevails in Miami in the wake of the Mariel boatlift last year. Her letter dramatically sets forth the concerns of a number of citizens in Florida, and particularly people in the South Florida area which has been impacted so directly by the influx of individuals from Cuba as well as from Haiti.

During our tenure thus far, I have visited Florida on two occasions, and I am convinced from my own observations, as well as from meetings with public officials from that State, that a genuine crisis exists there on account of the refugee and illegal alien upsurge in 1980.

I have two observations. The first is that our policy of interdiction of illegal aliens at sea and detention of those who arrive has begun to show results. The number of Haitians who came to our shores illegally in the last two months has dropped dramatically from levels of just one year ago. In November, for example, only 47 Haitians arrived in this country through illegal means, in contrast to 1,021 who came in the same month in 1980.

Second, we have recently scored major successes in breaking up large narcotics rings in Florida and elsewhere in the Southeastern United States, through such operations and efforts as Operation Grouper by the Drug Enforcement Administration and Operation Bancoshares, a combined effort of the FBI and DEA. We have also brought a total of 76 fugitives to justice through a recent operation (called Operation F.I.S.T.) of the U.S. Marshals Service.

We obviously need to do more, both in Florida and elsewhere, to control illegal immigration and to control crime. That is why our commitment in this Administration to effective law enforcement is so critically important to the entire country. It is a commitment that we must carry out as the highest priority of this Department.

SUBJECT: Soviet Emigration Policy and Helsinki Accords

In answer to your query whether the Soviet refusal to grant an exit visa to Miss Alekseeva to join her husband in the United States violates the Helsinki Accords (Tab A), the answer is that it certainly violates their intent. Basket III, Section I, Sub-paragraph B of the Helsinki Final Act states:

"Participating states will deal in a positive and humanitarian spirit with the applications of persons who wish to be reunited with members of their family."

The Soviet Government could argue that Miss Alekseeva, having married Mr. Semionov by proxy in the United States, is by Soviet law not really a member of his family: but the only reason that a marriage-by-proxy had to be organized last summer is that Miss Alekseeva had been unable for over three years to secure an exit visa which would have enabled her to go through a regular marriage ceremony. SUBJECT: Sakharov Hunger Strike

Andrei Sakharov, the leading Soviet human rights activist and Nobel Prize Laureate, began a hunger strike on Saturday, November 21, on behalf of his daughter-in-law, Elizaveta Alekseeva. Soviet authorities have repeatedly refused to grant her an exit visa to join her husband, Sakharov's stepson, who presently is studying at Brandeis University. Sakharov believes that his daughter-in-law is being punished for his activities and has adopted the hunger strike as a last desperate measure to influence the Soviet Government.

Over that weekend a telegram was sent to you and other heads of state by 28 prominent scientists and scholars, twenty of them Nobel Prize Laureates, urging you and them to intercede on behalf of Sakharov (Tab B). Given the outstanding achievements of Sakharov in the field of human rights causes and his great friendship for the United States, it would be most appropriate for you to release, as soon as possible, a Presidential statement on Sakharov's behalf. A suggested text is included at Tab A. Speechwriters have cleared the text. The State Department concurs in this recommendation.

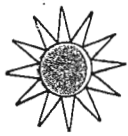

Why is it the Irish always stand up to be counted? We're either all courageous or fools or both. God bless us all.



Thank you for your letter of 11/30/81, it arrived here 12/7/81...what can I say?

Naturally by the time my letters to the President got to you you hadn't received my final correspondence. Let me quickly give you some background to the run. It takes over six months to set up the logistics regarding this national run. Then we had it re-routed to provide proper political exposure. We decided to include the U.S. Service Runners. Next we had to hold up the run pending the arrival of the Service teams. The logistics and coordination with police departments across the country takes six to eight months of work and preparation so that we can know within five minutes where each team will be, plus the food, gas, timers, A.A.U. officials, closing and opening of streets, mapping, etc., etc. (Thank God the work is done by those more capable than I.)

My Company owns the run, and I want my country involved, at no cost to them. So with no word, I rewrote the President regarding the timing. Then I had the run cancelled for 1982 because we did not know who to contact in Washington regarding the Services... no one except my friend who has more than enough to do running our great nation. Then you wrote to me and we've gotten to first base. How's this for a proposal to you:

We will begin in 1982 to set-up the run, anew. We will invite each arm of the military - army, navy, marines and air force. They will face a Nike Running team and the Los Angeles Fire and the Los Angeles Police Departments. The run by the latter two was done to the Olympics from Los Angeles to Montreal, Canada in 1976. This run also will be coast to coast. You provide your own vehicles and your colors, uniforms, doctors and trainers. We will provide the food, vitamins, nutritionists and gas. If you need more we'll get it for you at no cost to our government. I love my country and our President, and this is the Super Bowl of Runs.

The run will take 16 days and a great many young athletes from high schools and colleges will get a fresh new look at our military. It should help with recruiting and give our military a very favorable exposure -- that is just to mention a few of the added benefits.

The Police Brotherhood will cooperate with the L.A. Police Department as they have in the past in getting us across country.

D.C. and ending at the Los Angeles Coliseum just before the Olympics, again with the presentation of the President's Cup. In 1983, we will start in Los Angeles and go across country to Washington, D.C., arriving just before the First Lady's Birthday. Again there will be the presentation of the President's Cup on the 4th of July to the winning team.

If you find this run to your liking, a team event at no cost to our country, (with enough time to prepare for it), if you feel your teams can go day and night for 16 days, then re-contact me. The Re-Union is just that. I want to reunite our country (or at least help) behind our President.

The books we have on the run are voluminous. Each team and team member will be provided with maps of towns, their streets, rules, regulations, weather over the past twenty years, etc., etc. Well as you can see, it's well thought out, expensive, and the patent is pending on the run. It has already been A.A.U. sanctioned and run under their rules. I will next meet with your representatives here or on the Pacific Coast in early 1982. If the Interservice Sports Committee gives a tentative approval for 1983, if we are still in tentative accord, then your man or men will meet with our coordinators to see the logistics involved and routes to be run. If we are still in tentative accord, then we shall ask for your acceptance and approval of your participation in the Re-Union Run.

At that time you all can begin to have your own time trials to see who is strong enough to participate from the military teams. In September of 1982 the books will be ready for each team. In June 1983 the run will commence. As 1984 is an election year, I would like by then to see the interest of our whole nation in this run, with so many states involved, it's a natural.

Again, thank you for your kind consideration of this run. I sincerely hope, given a period of time, you will see fit to include at least one or more of your Service teams. Time has passed for 1982, please get just a tentative approval for 1983. We would love to include you.

With your kind permission, I am sending a copy of this letter along with yours to our President.

I can understand your concern and your hesitations. I can only hope that you will understand ~~my~~ why it isn't possible for me to re-vivify all those who went on strike. The law specifically prohibits public employees ~~from~~ from striking. As you say striking is an inalienable right - but not for govt. employees.

There is ~~the~~ difference. I was an officer of my union for some 25 years - President of that union for 6 terms. I led the union in the first strike it had ever engaged in. But even then I had to agree with F. D. R. who proclaimed that public employment was different & that strikes against the people could not be tolerated.

When public employees began organizing, organized labor at the highest levels supported them against only on the condition that they provide in their constitutions they ~~would~~ not strike. A strike is an economic combat between labor and management upon negotiations have failed to resolve an issue. But govt. can't shut down the assembly line. The service provided to the people, who in this case are the employees of all of us in govt., must be continued.

Mrs. B. Manning there are more than two million fed. employees. What message would we be sending to all of them if we allowed a strike by one group or gave immunity to those ~~if they~~ did strike? Believe me there is no thought of punishment ~~if~~ what we are doing. There just is no way I can avoid enforcing the

Sam. Let me recap what took place prior to the strike. I ordered our negotiators to point out to the "Patro" representatives that a strike would mean the union members had quit their jobs and we would have ^{no} alternatives but to replace them. Concerned that the Union officials had not notified the members of this I with held enforcement for 48 hours for the word to get around. I am confident did report back for work in those 48 hours and in fact we kept the door open longer than that to make certain everyone had gotten the word.

The speech during you mentioned is a letter that says Fed. employees who leave the govt. in this manner cannot re-apply for Fed. employment for 3 years. I am trying to arrange a waiver of that law so that all the 13,000 can apply for whatever govt. jobs are available without ~~any~~ ^{any} waiting.

We have an obligation to those who did stay on duty and who have maintained flying schedules at 75 or 80% of normal. At the same time however I do feel a very real sorrow for those who followed the union leadership at such a sacrifice. This is especially true of someone like you who served our country in uniform. Please believe ~~that~~ the flight of families such as that of your son is ~~not~~ of great concern to me.


