

Decontrol of Natural Gas Prices

Briefly, the events of the past three years in the petroleum industry have been quite dramatic and surprising. Because of two political happenings in the Middle East, the deposition of the Shah in Iran and the Iran - Iraq war, the price of oil was raised from about \$13/Barrel to \$34/B in 1981, where OPEC has tried to stabilize it. Events during 1981 has shown that this price level is too high and demand has slumped while production outside OPEC has increased. As a result prices have been weak as each nation in OPEC (other than Saudi Arabia) has tried to regain its market share. And an attempt in the U.S. to raise crude oil prices at the well by \$1.00/B failed. Demand in the U.S. is down 15% because of the high price, imports are down 25% and oil production is slowly increasing as a result of a doubling of the drilling Natural gas is also being developed rapidly. even some shut in production waiting to find a market. The price stability now prevailing should last barring a Middle East blowup for three or four years while inflation catches up with the too-high oil prices.

When you decontrolled all oil in February it was predicted that prices of products would rise substantially. Nearly a year later prices at the consumer level are actually down and we are back to a competitive marketing environment in the U.S. and Europe. I believe the same thing would happen in natural gas if decontrol of all natural gas prices over a period of time were to be implemented; that is, the price increase would be much less than generally estimated.

For various geological and technical reasons, we have been finding more gas than oil as our exploration and drilling effort has more than doubled within the U.S. and it is probable that we have at least 10-15% shut-in producing capacity, or several trillion cubic feet on an annual basis. If all restrictions on price and use were to be lifted so that all gas sold at competitive BTU levels with oil, the average price would rise to about \$4.50-\$5.00 per MCF at the well-head and consumption of oil and gas would decline further, thus reducing imports of oil even more.

This would require lifting price controls on old "vintage" gas as well as all other higher priced categories, over a three or four year period, starting in 1983 but with a time certain for final decontrol. As occurred through decontrol of "old" oil, the price would go up less than expected and all fuels would be free to compete with each other. Granted, the 15-20% of "vintage" gas now selling below \$1.00/MCF would rise substantially but, if necessary, a windfall profits tax on this "old" gas could be applied which would phase out, as in oil. Here the purpose is to have all gas and all oil sell at similar BTU prices to the consumer. This would make it difficult for any gas distributor to buy large amounts of incremental gas supplies at premium prices and "roll it in" to his over-all sales.

The complete deregulation of oil and gas selling at about \$34/B of oil and gas equivalent, would leave coal prices well below oil and gas on a BTU basis, so they would rise also as would production. By then, all three hydrocarbon fuels would be competing vigorously for all markets where they can be used and the result would be less overall consumption of energy in the U.S. and increased domestic production, thus further reducing our need for imported oil. And the so-called "energy crisis" would be largely solved without government regulation through free-enterprise economics.

An even bolder idea in line with your aim to reduce excessive governmental regulations, would be to deregulate the interstate natural gas pipelines. Their volume has been rather stagnant for a decade and no new long interstate pipelines have been During this period they have used their cash flow to built. diversify into many other fields, but principally oil and gas exploration and production. This diversification has gone so far that a large majority of the interstate pipelines have more than half their earnings from sources other than transporting natural gas. With higher prices for natural gas their demand would decline moderately and with high fixed costs they would have to raise tariffs, to maintain earnings, which would again cause well-head prices to rise less than otherwise expected. And the ability to "roll-in" high-priced, uncontrolled natural gas would become uneconomic so that the \$7.00-8.00/MCF uncontrolled gas would also come down to the competitive BTU level at about \$5.00/MCF.

Deregulating the whole natural gas industry, except intrastate and city distribution would also lead to fewer imports of gas from Mexico and Canada and at lower prices. It would almost certainly make Prudhoe Bay gas transported through Canada uneconomic since there would be no market for \$10.00/MCF gas (the estimate of the delivered price in the U.S.). Prudhoe Bay Gas should be taken to Valdez through a parallel pipeline to the

Alaska crude line and liquefied to be shipped to the U.S. West Coast or to Japan.

In summary, there is an opportunity over the next four or five years to completely deregulate the natural gas production and interstate pipeline industry with only modest effect on the consumer. It would finally place all three major energy sourcesoil, gas and coal-on an equally competitive basis and lead to near self-sufficiency in energy in an emergency if the Strategic Reserve is filled and capable of producing 3 million B/D for six months.

I realize this is a difficult problem politically but the first six months of 1982 is crucial if the phase-out is to start in January 1983, and, with the "windfall-profits tax", help balance the budget.

SUBJECT: Offer of Loan to U.S. at Low Interest Rates

In response to your December 14 note to Secretary Regan, we advise against serious consideration of the proposed offer of a \$1 trillion loan to the U.S. from an unidentified foreign source at a below-market interest rate of 5 to 6 percent.

Treasury has received many such informal proposals in recent years. This year they have been averaging about one a week. One offer was as high as \$26 trillion, but most are in the hundreds of billions. At times, as a courtesy, Treasury has met and corresponded with intermediaries, but it becomes immediately apparent that these parties are either "con artists" or extremely naive. The fraudulent types are primarily interested in appearing to be "negotiating" with the Treasury (for purposes of inducing a party on the other side to take them seriously), and they generally attempt to continue discussions with us long after we have made clear that we do not take such proposals seriously.

We usually respond to such inquiries (most come in by telephone) with a brief statement that we have no interest in the proposals. Attached is a copy of a typical written response.

Dear Ms. Anderson:

Secretary Regan has asked me to respond to your letter concerning your desire to arrange a loan to the U.S. Government.

The Treasury does not arrange private placements of its securities with individual investors, nor does it tailor the interest rates, maturities, and other terms and conditions of its securities to suit the needs of any individual investor. Rather, the Treasury offers its securities to the public at regularly scheduled public auctions, ranging from weekly auctions of 13-week and 26-week Treasury bills to quarterly offerings of longer term securities. The Treasury reserves the right to reject any or all bids at these auctions, and limits the amount of securities that may be purchased at an auction by any individual investor.

The Treasury welcomes and encourages individual investors to participate in the auctions of Treasury securities. Applications to purchase securities in these auctions may be obtained from any of the Federal Reserve Banks or branches or from the Eureau of the Public Debt in the Treasury Department. Also, many banks and other financial institutions will submit applications to purchase Treasury securities as a service for their customers. The enclosed pamphlet, "Buying Treasury Securities at Federal Reserve Banks", contains detailed information on how investors may participate in the public auction of Treasury securities.

Special issues of Government debt are sold only to Government accounts, Government agencies, foreign central banks or international official institutions.


