This is the first and only development in the effort to bring "new life" to that troubled area.

Dear Ms. Guillory:

Thank you for your letter of November 13. It has just reached my desk, hence this delay in responding.

I hope you won't think I'm taking advantage of you but your letter was so forthright and fair, I'm compelled to do a little soulbaring in reply. Nothing has been so frustrating to me in public life as the image that has been created of me -- a false image -- may I say, with regard to my approach to racial differences.

I grew up in an America that had yet to hear the term "civil rights." We lived in a small town in northern Illinois but segregation as a matter of course was in place to almost the same extent it was in the deep south. The only exception was the public school. We were poor but I was blessed with a mother and father who raised me and my brother to believe there was no greater sin than racial or religious prejudice and bigotry. My father being Irish had known and experienced in his youth the bitterness of bigotry. You know, there was a time in this country when you could find signs on certain establishments: "No dogs or Irish allowed."

Well, anyway, in my college football days I played in the line beside a young Black man. We fought and bled together and became the closest of friends, a friendship that lasted until his death just a few years ago. I thank God I was able to have him here in the White House before that sad day.

My first career was as a radio sports announcer broadcasting major league baseball -- the Cubs games out of Chicago. I had no Willie Mays or Don Newcombe to talk about. The Spalding Baseball guide said baseball was a "game for Caucasian gentlemen." I was one of a small group in the early 30's who editorialized and complained that the game should be opened to Blacks as it finally was.

When I became Governor of California, I discovered the civil service tests were rigged to keep Black State employees pretty much at the bottom of the ladder. I changed that. As Governor, I appointed more Blacks to executive and policymaking positions than all the previous California Governors put together.

Now, in my present job, I've continued that practice. We have opened government contracts to minority-owned businesses, and launched a program to preserve the historic Black colleges and universities among other things.

Forgive me for belaboring you with my frustration but please be assured I am and will be a President of all the people. Like you, I don't feel "freebies" are the answer. Equal opportunity is. Wherever in this land someone's Constitutional rights are being denied, it is the duty of the Federal government to enforce those rights at the point of bayonet if necessary. And your friend was right; the first President to do that was Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Again, thank you for writing as you did and for giving me the opportunity to sound off.

I am a Black American citizen, and I voted for Mondale in the past presidential election. I'm not making these pronouncements to annoy you, but to provide a frame of reference to assist you in comprehending this letter.

Initially, I was overwhelmed with a sense of despair and foreboding at the news of your reelection by such a dominating margin a week ago. At that time, I perceived the American people's endorsement of your administration as an indication that concern for the plight of vulnerable groups in our society is no longer a popular American sentiment. As a member of one of those vulnerable groups, the thought frightened me. I felt that my voice, along with the voices of other Black people in this country, was insignificant and inconsequential, considered more "whining" to be ignored.

Since that time, I have accepted the fact that through the democratic process, you have been chosen to serve as -President of the United States, my country, for four more years. I congratulate you on this accomplishment and wish you success in executing the tasks which lie ahead.

Instead of remaining silent, wringing my hands, or discussing the state of the country within the confines of my own spheres of relatives and friends, I decided to shrug off the feeling of helplessness by exercising my right of free speech. I decided to write you a personal letter, conveying my feelings concerning an issue which I feel is of paramount importance.

As you serve as President of all of the people of the United States, please commit yourself to ensuring that equal

opportunity for all is not just an ideal state, but a reality.

I am not a proponent of hand-outs or freebies. I firmly believe that in order to build strength, pride, and character in a people, the bonds of dependency must be broken. However, I am just as convinced that self-help and self-sustenance cannot be achieved unless the opportunity to uplift oneself is available, unfettered by the artificial barriers of prejudice, hatred, and discrimination. There are many Black people in this country who live by the credo that .they can pull themselves up by their own bootstraps -- that is, if a foot isn't on their necks. Oh, I know that all of us have our prejudices and preferences, and it is virtually impossible to change the way each individual thinks about and relates to another. I'm not asking you to attempt such an impossible undertaking. People will have to answer to their maker for the way they treat their fellowmen. But where that prejudice, discrimination and hatred rears its head in a deliberate, systematic manner to interfere with the constitutional rights of others to enjoy life, liberty, and to pursue happiness within the confines of the law, I am asking you to use all the resources at your disposal to stamp it out forthwith!

I was quite concerned to hear the recent news that a Black family was attacked by Whites in an apartment complex in Chicago. It is this mentality, this kind of blind hatred which must not be allowed to fester and grow. America should be a place where people are free to live where they choose, and according to their means. I want to be able to feel confident that my children won't have to refight the same battles which were waged in the sixties to advance, or just to maintain, the civil rights of Black people.

Do what you must do to ensure that all people in this country have the opportunity to partake freely of the Great American Pie. If your conviction to serve as President embraces this concept, then Black people in this country will have nothing to fear during the next four years. Someone reminded me the other day that it was Eisenhower who sent the troops into Little Rock.

I hope many more Black Americans in this country will write to you to express their feelings and opinions. I feel a little better after having done so.

Dear Ms. James:

I thank you for your letter and for your prayers. I believe deeply in the power of prayer not only when we pray for ourselves but when others pray for us.

I understand why you think we come from "opposite ends of the spectrum" and that I don't care for the community to which you belong. I understand, because ever since I've had this job, political demagogues and self-serving spokesmen have described me in those terms without ever bothering to check whether there is any truth in their statements.

Ms. James, I don't think anything has frustrated me so as this false image that has been created. In the first place, I was raised and grew up in poverty. But that didn't keep my mother and father from teaching my brother and me that bigotry and prejudice were the worst sins in the world. And at my age you know I'm talking about a time when no one had ever used the term civil rights.

From my boyhood on, I have been active in trying to right the wrong being done our Black citizens. As a sports announcer broadcasting big league baseball, I campaigned for an end to the rule that barred Blacks from organized baseball.

As Governor of California, I forced a change in civil service exams that were rigged to prevent Blacks from holding anything but the most menial of State jobs. I appointed more Blacks to executive and policymaking positions than all the previous California Governors put together.

And now as President, I've seen that we removed the barriers that were making it difficult for minority businesses to get government business, contracts, etc. We also have done a great deal to preserve the historic Black colleges and universities which have done so much for Black youth and which are now having financial problems.

Please believe that I intend to continue being the President of all the people. I thank you for your generous words and for giving me the chance to state my case.
