

My dear Mr. President:

This note is tardy because I have had two cases before the Federal Communications Commission and a legal proceeding before Federal Court in Los Angeles.

You were great, truly great, Mr. President, in the State of the Union address. Of course, we have become accustomed to the excellence which is with you in your every presentation and in your every "move" as our greatest President in modern history.

Far more important than my observation, however, is the response that I note as I travel across the country. Since your address I have been to seven different states and all I hear is laudatory comment, even from those who are on the other side of the political "isle." Even those folks recognize how fortunate we are to have Ronald Reagan with us as our President for the next four years.

Ron, last summer we bought a home in Carefree which as you know is twenty miles north of Scottsdale. We are on the side of Black Mountain so we overlook the Valley of the Sun and the views, day and night are so spectacular they are almost beyond belief. We gave up the home in Monarch Bay, South Laguna, for a number of reasons, not the least of which was the fact that the constant dampness, now both day and night, because of the El Nino effect, was bothering Dorothy and injuring her health. When we first bought a home on Monarch Bay seventeen years ago, the daytime humidity would be three to six percent. Now, it is fifty-five to eighty-five percent for most of the That added to the constant nighttime dampness was a little bit "too much." Then the increased population in that area has posed traffic problems that seem almost insurmountable. On top of that, my business enterprise is such that the "commuter run" between Chicago and Phoenix will be much easier than being located seventy-seven miles south of Los Angeles Airport and fifty-five miles north of Lindbergh Field.

When I took early retirement from my responsibilities on day to day management as President of Tribune Broadcasting Company, Chicago, New York, and other cities, I was told that I should work only three hours a day, three days a week. The blood pressure pills did not work so I implemented my own regimen and now my blood pressure is just where it was when I played football at Michigan, and resulting therefrom, is a schedule that Dorothy says has me working twenty-four hours a day, "eight days a week." To show you that she is partially correct, I am opening a branch office in Phoenix in early April. This will service our clients in the western states and should ease my travel schedule somewhat.

Once again, Mr. President, I want you to know of the tremendous spirit you have created in America. The people of our beloved land believe in their President and they have all the faith in the world in that which you are attempting to do to strengthen our nation and to broaden the base of hope and opportunity for all.



MANCHESTER — The U.S. Supreme Court yesterday left intact a telephone rate system that will add \$1 to the monthly bills of New Hampshire customers beginning in June.

The justices, without comment, refused to review a Federal Communications Commission rule approving monthly assessments for all telephone customers.

New England Telephone Co. said through spokesman Paul Hardiman that it is pleased with the ruling.

The statement said the \$1 increase is "the only way to help keep rates as reasonable as possible for all" telephone users.

Businesses with more than one telephone already are feeling the effect of the new rate system.

Since May, they have been paying up to \$6 more a month.

For half a century, some of the expense of operating a local telephone service was subsidized by higher-than-necessary charges for long-distance calls. PHONES Page 12


To Pat and Shelley Buchanan, welcome back to the White House. During their courting days, both served there. Pat's office was at the north entrance and Shelley's at the south.

Attached is a letter in response to Ms. Jordan's appearance on "Face the Nation." It is carefully structured for you to make your points. But, frankly, I do not advise your sending it. There was almost no press and media reaction to Ms. Jordan's statements. And, she was technically right on how the top and bottom income groups fared over the 5-year period she was discussing.

This comes about because the first two of the years she was discussing, 1979 and 1980, did indeed set the stage for a poor 5-year performance. It has only been the last two years that have seen significant changes.

If you send the letter, and she releases it to the press, and re-opens the dialogue it will not necessarily be to your Administration's advantage.

Dear Ms. Jordan:

I watched your recent appearance on "Face the Nation" with interest, and thought I might offer a few comments.

We have both been longtime advocates of economic growth and greater economic opportunity for the disadvantaged. I share your concern that the economic recovery has not yet reached all parts of the population. We will not rest until it does.

You mentioned that the bottom forty percent of the population had lost income over the last five years, while the top twenty percent had gained. This was somewhat misstated. Both groups, indeed most working families and those on fixed income, lost real income between 1978 and early 1983. Double-digit inflation prior to 1981 and the increased unemployment of the recessions in 1980 and 1981-1982 had the effect of reducing real income for all segments of the population. As we both know, it impacted the lower-income groups the hardest.

The decline in real income was one of our major concerns upon coming to office. However, from 1982 through 1984, inflation was only 3.9 percent, wages grew faster than prices, and real compensation rose an average of 1.1 percent a year.

We are making progress. Since the end of 1982, 7.3 million jobs have been created and employment is at record levels. But it is not enough that there are more jobs or that real wages and real incomes for those who have jobs are rising

again. We must do even more. We will continue to pursue policies that foster economic growth, Enterprise Zones to bring revitalization to our declining cities, and a Summer Youth Employment Opportunity Wage that will allow the private sector to create an additional 400,000 jobs for our young people.

You remain a powerful voice in America and I value your opinions. Your continued participation in public discussions is valuable and enriches us all.

Unfortunately, when the State's name was being registered, it was mispelt by one letter, hence OREGON and not OREGAN. We also note that there is a town in Oregon named EUGENIA and suspect there is a link with the founder of the State.

It is remarkable that a kinsman of Mr. Ronald Reagan should have founded one of the States over which he now presides as President of the United States. We would be pleased if you would bring this fact to the notice of the President when you meet him in Washington.

We again wish to thank you for your kindness in meeting us in Glengarriff last month and appreciate your co-operation in taking our gifts to Washington for presentation to President Reagan on our behalf

Unfortunately, when I met President Reagan in
Ballyporeen my research was not complete enough to disclose in front
of the cameras, but now I'm happy to have this information conveyed to the
President.
