Dear Ron:

Returning to a mundane world must seem dull and unexciting after your tremendously successful trip, but I am sure the rest is welcome. The television coverage here was not as complete as it should have been, partially because the times of the broadcasts were not known in advance, but all in all it has made a tremendous impression. I saw, and have on video tape, most of your two speeches from London and Bonn. I thought they were absolutely sensational and should rank high with the great speeches of history. Perhaps arrangements could be made to have them rebroadcast on . Public Television or some of the smaller networks. I am a firm believer in the program put forward by Tom Ellis to form an organization to buy time for a 30 minute weekly broadcast which could be programmed and advertised in advance where you could share with the American people, the problems of the Presidency, in an intimate way. I think this is the only way you will ever get a fair break from the media. I have thought that Don Fedderson, who syndicated the Lawrence Welk show could be brought into the program. Again let me congratulate you and emphisize what a tremendous success your European trip was. Your personal performance was superb and virtually flawless, not withstanding some of the sniping about fatigue. I don't know where you get your stamina.

My main reason for writing you at this time is contained in the inclosed copy of my letter to Helene regarding the Secretary of Labor. I am inclosing Victor Reisel's most recent column on the subject. It would appear that regardless of how badly we feel about the matter and what it has done to Donovan, it seems to be inevitable that a change will have to be made.

Information has reached me from many sources, that a tremendous Campaign is being launched to put Betty Murphy in that place. I am frank to say that I think, if this happened, it would be a disaster. I do not know her personally but I have talked to a number of very reliable persons who do know her well and they are all of the same opinion that I have expressed. One of such persons is Ralph Kennedy, who was Regional Director of the NLRB here in L. A. during the sixties and who also served one five year term on the Board in Washington, part of which term was served when Betty Murphy was Chairman. Ralph has been the mainstay in our effort to get out a complete report of the situation in the Board, which report has been completed and will soon be sent to you. He knows her well and he has served notice on us that if she is appointed Secretary of Labor he will withdraw from all activity in behalf of the Administration. He spend a great deal of time helping to. orient John and to make sure that he had the right people on his personal staff. He is now with Litton Industries. He confirms that she is very ambitious and in her effort to climb the ladder of fame she is trying to be all things to all people. When we were first working on John's confirmation she used to call John and tell him what they were saying at the AFL-CIO and we were sure

she was calling them back and telling them what John was saving. She would not be a person you could trust to carry out your program she would be too busy carming out her own. Also there is the problem of the Solicitor Tim Ryan. As you may or may not know, it has been discovered that Monica Gallagher, daughter of our old friend Leo Gallagher, of the firm of Katz, Gallagher and Margolis, was working as an Associate Solicitor in that Department and came under the critism of the Senate because of the alleged failure of the Department to properly handle the case are inst the Teamster Persion Plan in Illinois. I have no knowledge of her political activity or orientation but from her conduct in the hearings it is indicated strongly that she is not "our kind of folks". I am inclosing an excerpt from her testimony before the Subcommittee on Investigations of the Committee on Governmental Affairs. A person who has grown up in that would certainly be suspect unless her public conduct had shown a complete break with the communist philosophy of her father, which does not seem indicated here. I understand she is being reassigned to a post in a training program of some sort, in of all places, the Defense Department. To go back to my original point, Betty Murphy is alledgedly very close to Tim Ryan and would probably be reluctant to take steps that our friends feel is necessary in the Solicitor's office. For some reason, which I cannot understand, she has charmed Senator Hatch and I am told he has endorsed her. She also claims to have the endorsement of the Republican National Committee and she will no doubt, receive the approval of the AFL-CIO.

With regard to Curt Counts, it would seem to me that he is an ideal candidate. He worked tirelessly in lining up employer support for John's confirmation and at that time he indicated very strongly he would not be interested in any post for himself. However, he was denied the appointment to Secretary of Labor under Nixon when . Rockefeller made a deal with the New York Building Trades for support for Nixon and as a result Peter Brennan was appointed Secretary of Labor. He was the then President of the N. Y. Building Trades. Curt was offered the job of Under Secretary but declined. I am assured, that if you ask him to serve he will respond favorably. He has a very good rapport with the Teamsters from his relationship as the President of Trucking Management, Inc and with the other Unions as his position as head of the Federal Mediation Service. It is just possible that he might be able to help with John's confirmation, if appointed, although I have nothing positive on this. I do not, of course, know all of the pressures that may be upon you, but I feel strongly that most of your problems in this Department would be resolved with this appointment. As I point out in my Letter to Helene, I think there might be some opposition from the Right to Work group, but that would be somewhat eased if Dotson were to be moved up to Under Secretary. I doubt it Dotson would remain in the Department if Murphy were appointed. I don't know what your intentions might be about Lovell. Curt would have no problem with him one way or the other but there is some strong feelings against him in the Department.

As indicated in my letter to Helene, I met with her and we had a very friendly talk. However, she seems firm in her decision to replace Connie Houseman with a young lady, whom Connie will train. He will then leave the Office. He did not disclose exactly where he was to go but he seemed satisfied with the situation.

year, however, I have never had any responsibility or control over the investigations, or the investigators in the SIS, who were involved in aspects of the investigation of the Central States funds. I have been accused of directing officials of the Special Investigations Staff to refuse to cooperate with the Department of Justice. In connection with this allegation, certain inelegant language has been attributed to me ["F --- Justice"]. I have carefully reviewed the specific testimony given by Mr. Shelvin and Mr. Lippe before the subcommittee on this matter. While I would contest the detail, I do not deny that phrases such as those mentioned may have escaped my lips on occasion. The most likely circumstances would have occurred in the context of a conversation with some Labor Department employee who, without authority or adequate justification, was invoking the name of the Department of Justice to influence a course of action under consideration by the Labor Department. If one of them advocated that the Labor Department take action which was inconsistent with its interests and mission to protect employee benefit plan assets, solely on the basis that the action might be in the interests of the Justice Department, I could well have been provoked to make such a remark to express my dismay with this line of argument. I absolutely deny that any such remark was meant to express any intention to interfere with or not cooperate with the Department of Justice.

Chairman Nunn. Ms. Gallagher, as you state on the bottom of page 3: "I do not believe there ever has been an occasion on which I suggested much less instructed* * *."

Did any of these remarks, basically in general terms, suggest that

the Department of Justice should have sex with itself?

Perhaps arrangements could be made to have them rebroadcast on Public Television or some of the smaller networks. I am a firm believer in the program put forward by Tom Ellis to form an organization to buy time for a 30 minute weekly broadcast which could be programmed and advertised in advance where you could share with the American people, the problems of the Presidency, in an intimate way. I think this is the only way you will ever get a fair break from the media. I have thought that Don Fedderson, who syndicated the Lawrence Welk show could be brought into the program. Again let me congratulate you and emphisize what a tremendous success your European trip was. Your personal performance was superb and virtually flawless, not withstanding some of the sniping about fatigue. I don't know where you get your stamina.

My main reason for writing you at this time is contained in the inclosed copy of my letter to Helene regarding the Secretary of Labor. I am inclosing Victor Reisel's most recent column on the subject. It would appear that regardless of how badly we feel about the matter and what it has done to Donovan, it seems to be inevitable that a change will have to be made.

Information has reached me from many sources, that a tremendous Campaign is being launched to put Betty Murphy in that place. I am frank to say that I think, if this happened, it would be a disaster. I do not know her personally but I have talked to a number of very reliable persons who do know her well and they are al<u>l of the same opinion that I have expressed.</u> One of such persons is Ralph Kennedy, who was Regional Director of the NLRB here in L. A. during the sixties and who also served one five year term on the Board in Washington, part of which term was served when Betty Murphy was Chairman. Ralph has been the mainstay in our effort to get out a complete report of the situation in the Board, which report has been completed and will soon be sent to you. He knows her well and he has served notice on us that if she is appointed Secretary of Labor he will withdraw from all activity in behalf of the Administration. He spend a great deal of time helping to. orient John and to make sure that he had the right people on his personal staff. He is now with Litton Industries. He confirms that she is very ambitious and in her effort to climb the ladder of fame she is trying to be all things to all mennle. When we were first working on John's confirmation she used to call John and tell him what they were saying at the AFL-CIO and we were sure

she was calling them back and telling them what John was saying. She would not be a person you could trust to carry out your program she would be too busy carming out her own. Also there is the problem of the Solicitor Tim Ryan. As you may or may not know, it has been discovered that Monica Gallagher, daughter of our old friend Leo Gallagher, of the firm of Katz, Gallagher and Margolis, was working as an Associate Solicitor in that Department and came under the critism of the Senate because of the alleged failure of the Department to properly handle the case areinst the Teamster Pension Plan in Illinois. I have no knowledge of her political activity or orientation but from her conduct in the hearings it is indicated strongly that she is not "our kind of folks". I am inclosing an excerpt from her testimony before the Subcommittee on Investigations of the Committee on Governmental Affairs. A person who has grown up in that would certainly be suspect unless her public conduct had shown a complete break with the communist philosophy of her father, which does not seem indicated here. I understand she is being reassigned to a post in a training program of some sort, in of all places, the <u>Defense Department</u>. To go back to my original point, Betty Murphy is alledgedly very close to Tim Ryan and would probably be reluctant to take steps that our friends feel is necessary in the Solicitor's office. For some reason, which I cannot understand, she has charmed Senator Hatch and I am told he has endorsed her. She also claims to have the endorsement of the Republican National Committee and she will no doubt, receive the approval of the AFL-CIO.

With regard to Curt Counts, it would seem to me that he is an ideal candidate. He worked tirelessly in lining up employer support for John's confirmation and at that time he indicated very strongly he would not be interested in any post for himself. However, he was denied the appointment to Secretary of Labor under Nixon when Rockefeller made a deal with the New York Building Trades for support for Nixon and as a result Peter Brennan was appointed Secretary of Labor. He was the then President of the N. Y. Building Trades. was offered the job of Under Secretary but declined. I am assured, that if you ask him to serve he will respond favorably. He has a very good rapport with the Teamsters from his relationship as the President of Trucking Management, Inc and with the other Unions as his position as head of the Federal Mediation Service. It is just possible that he might be able to help with John's confirmation, if appointed, although I have nothing positive on this. I do not, of course, know all of the pressures that may be upon you, but I feel strongly that most of your problems in this Department would be resolved with this appointment. As I point out in my Letter to Helene, I think there might be some opposition from the Right to Work group, but that would be somewhat eased if Dotson were to be moved up to Under Secretary. I doubt it Dotson would remain in the Department if Murphy were appointed. don't know what your intentions might be about Lovell. Curt would have no problem with him one way or the other but there is some strong feelings against him in the Department.

As indicated in my letter to Helene, I met with her and we had a very friendly talk. However, she seems firm in her decision to replace Connie Houseman with a young lady, whom Connie will train. He will then leave the Office. He did not disclose exactly where he was to go but he seemed satisfied with the situation.

year, however, I have never had any responsibility or control over the investigations, or the investigators in the SIS, who were involved in aspects of the investigation of the Central States funds. In May, I assumed, in addition to my regular duties, the temporary role of acting director of the Special Litigation Staff, the new unit created to handle litigation involving the Central States funds. A new Associate Solicitor will be joining us next week to take over that responsibility.

I would like now to turn to the charges which have been aimed at

me.

I have been accused of directing officials of the Special Investigations Staff to refuse to cooperate with the Department of Justice. I do not believe there has ever been an occasion on which I have even suggested, much less instructed, anybody in the SIS or elsewhere not to cooperate with the Department of Justice in the proper execution of its mission. In connection with this allegation, certain inelegant language has been attributed to me ["F - - Justice"]. I have carefully reviewed the specific testimony given by Mr. Shelvin and Mr. Lippe before the subcommittee on this matter. While I would contest the detail, I do not deny that phrases such as those mentioned may have escaped my lips on occasion. The most likely circumstances would have occurred in the context of a conversation with some Labor Department employee who, without authority or adequate justification, was invoking the name of the Department of Justice to influence a course of action under consideration by the Labor Department. If one of them advocated that the Labor Department take action which was inconsistent with its interests and mission to protect employee benefit plan assets, solely on the basis that the action might be in the interests of the Justice Department, I could well have been provoked to make such a remark to express my dismay with this line of argument. I absolutely deny that any such remark was meant to express any intention to interfere with or not cooperate with the Department of Justice.

Chairman Nunn. Ms. Gallagher, as you state on the bottom of page 3: "I do not believe there ever has been an occasion on which I sug-

gested much less instructed* * *."

Did any of these remarks, basically in general terms, suggest that

the Department of Justice should have sex with itself?

Ms. Gallagher. The language which, I think that it is going to be complicated if we keep doing—if you won't find it contemptuous of me, I will say yes, that I said, "Let Justice go fuck itself."

Chairman Nunn. It seems to me that a reasonable person could gather that you were suggesting less than the expression of full coop-

eration with Justice, using those terms.

Ms. Gallagher. That would be true if the Department of Justice had actually said the thing that was being alleged that they had said. When in fact the name of the Department of Justice is being invoked by some Labor Department employee who doesn't want to do his job, and who is saying that the reason he doesn't want to do his job is because the Department of Justice doesn't want him to, it seems to me one appropriate kind of response is to say the kind of thing which I said, which is a way of saying I just don't believe that.

Chairman Nunn. I would think though other people listening, who might not have known the full context of those remarks as you have

The factor which determines lengths of continental United States assignments is our need to meet our commitments overseas. In some cases, such as when we are short of soldiers with critical skills, this results in shorter tours in the United States.

The Army has as its goal to ensure that all continental United States tours are at least 36 months in length. Progress has been made, but we are not there yet.

You say I'm so far removed from the average family that I can't understand your problems. Mr. Loebker I read about myself and the stories that say I only like, understand and tolerate rich people, and I get pretty frustrated.

I'm one of a family of four. My brother and I are all that are left — our parents died before any of this happened. We were poor and lived in a small town in Illinois. I worked my way though a small college in Illinois with a little help for playing football. In those days that meant they saw that you got a job washing dishes in the dining hall.

I've kept contact with all the friends I knew in those days. And now, though it may be hard to understand, I'm surrounded more on a daily basis with the same kind of people I always knew than I am with the so-called rich; the security detail, aides and staff and, to tell you the truth, our friends though successful now, had backgrounds like my own.
