GUIDELINES ON HELP WANTED NOTICES OR ADVERTISEMENTS UNDER THE FEDERAL AGE DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT ACT

Section 4(e) of the Act prohibits "an employer, labor organization, or employment agency" from using printed or published notices or advertisements indicating any preference, limitation, specification, or discrimination, based on age.

When help wanted notices or advertisements contain terms and phrases such as "age 25 to 35," "young," "boy," "girl," "college student," "recent college graduate," or others of a similar nature, such a term or phrase discriminates against the employment of older persons and will be considered in violation of the Act. Such specifications as "age 40 to 50," "age over 50," or "age over 65" are also considered to be prohibited. Where such specifications as "retired person" or "supplement your pension" are intended and applied so as to discriminate against others within the protected group, they too are regarded as prohibited.

NOTE: The overall content of the ad may reveal an intent to discriminate and should be considered along with the use of any specific terms.

Although help wanted advertisements by private employers containing a specification for <u>Vietnam Veterans</u> would otherwise be of doubtful legality, the Department plans no action in this type of situation in order to assist in the Nation's effort to obtain jobs for these returning veterans.

Advertisers must also consider interpretations under State and local laws dealing with age discrimination and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Title VII prohibits publishing of advertisements by employers, labor unions and employment agencies when such advertisements discriminate on the basis of sex. Some of the terms listed above indicate an arbitrary preference for members of one sex. The use of such terms may violate Title VII and State and local laws and advertisers should get in touch with the Equal Opportunity Commission and other appropriate State or local agencies if they have questions in this connection.

In any event we apologize for this <u>alleged</u> violation and are not running the advertisement again. As a matter of curiosity, I would like to know who has determined that the use of the word "Junior" discriminates against older persons. We use the title Junior Officers in our bank, and the legal profession has Junior Partners and in neither case is age a determining factor, but merely the status of the individual on the ladder of succession.

I've just seen on our public television station WVIZ in Cleveland "Crisis to Crisis" by Barbara Jordan. I'm outraged. The Democratic Party should pay for one full hour of politicing. I'm sick of all Senior Citizens being placed in the lonesome, starving category. Yes, I'm a Senior Citizen.

Operating without government control in 1977, one full time administrator was paid less than \$6000.00 and the balance was used for utilities, operating expenses and improvements. Instead of taking a grant from the government, it paid \$2,608.00 in taxes to various city and state funds, and contributed \$2,016.28 to the Ashland County Fair Board for rental of its food stand."

Don't tell me Sr. Citizens can't and shouldn't do their part.



It has taken me some time to write this letter to you and alas, I have finally completed it! Thanks to Mr. Jerry Zipkin and Mrs. George Berlinger (one of the ladies who joined meethe day of our visit with you), the Alzheimer's Disease & Related Discorders Association was able to have your support and final signing of the proclamation for National Alzheimer's Awareness Week.

I was very honored to meet with you and to have a memento of our meeting through the pictures which were taken. I had the strong feeling that you wanted to inquire about my mother's well being. Therefore, I am taking the opportunity to tell you about her.

Ever since I was a child, I knew that my mother was an exceptionally beautiful and talented lady, who, to my despair, drank and therefore was very difficult and at times completely irrational. I feel sure that her drinking and hergreat unhappiness was due to the fact that she knew something dreadful was wrong with her. She was having difficulty memorizing lines, remembering what day it was, and becoming incredibly moody, until she cut herself off completely from the outside world.

Alzheimer's Disease is slow and insidious. It can attack people tranging from their thirties to eighties. It is not the normal aging process, it is a neurological disorder which attacks the brain and brings about a degeneration of nerve endings, there by hampering the passage of signals among brain cells. These are the signals that carry instructions telling us how to think, what to do, and how to act. It was horrible to see my mother who was perfectly healthy, slowly lose control. What's more, is that she often was aware of what was happening - that something outside of her control was taking over her life. My mother is now living in New York City under the care of 2 - 12 hour nurses. I take care of her and see her every day. Sadly, she is in the last stages of the disease and I pray that she is not suffering too terribly.

I-realize how very busy you are and that you have very little spare time. But, perhaps, some day you will be able to meet and share with me whatever you can remember about my mother.


