

President Reagan's Saturday afternoon radio chats may make interesting reading in the Sunday paper. But in New York, at least, nobody is listening to the actual broadcast.

Both NBC and ABC feed the five-minute program to their affiliate stations at about 12:06 p.m. Then it's up to the individual stations to decide whether or not to pick up the broadcast—and currently, no stations on either network carry the program in the New York area. NBC airs a Democratic response to the talk at 1:40 p.m., and again it's up to the stations to air it.

The local CBS affiliate, WCBS, does not broadcast the entire talk, though it

does play excerpts throughout the day.

NBC said it has no idea how many of its stations pick up the President's broadcast. ABC estimates that about 300 of its more than 1,800 stations carry the program, but admits it's only a guess. The network points out that since the broadcast is noncommercial, stations are not required to notify the network whether they plan to carry it. Both networks say that excerpts from the talk are usually carried on their nightly newscasts.



Freedom as embodied in the human rights provisions of the Helsinki Final Act and in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of the United Nations Charter is the most precious heritage of any nation. The Ukrainian nation lost her short-lived freedom, when the Ukrainian National Republic was brutally conquered by the Russian communist armies in 1920. The establishment of the Ukrainia. Helsinki Monitoring Group subsequently and the courageous activities of the 38 members, all of whom have been incarcerated and exiled with long sentences, affirm, in your words, "that the human spirit cannot be crushed and that the desire for human freedom cannot be conquered".

Your pledge on behalf of the American people, Mr. President, "to do all we can to ameliorate the plight of those Ukrainians who have been persecuted by the Soviet authorities for attempting to assert their rights" strengthens the spirit of the freedom-fighters, and the spirit of democracy on this earth. It proves once again that the United States is in the forefront in the defence of freedom and human rights throughout the world.

As members of a body representing nearly 3,000,000 free Ukrainians, we, on our part, pledge to give full support to your government and Congress in all measures and activities which promote freedom, human rights, justice and the dignity of the human being.

Dear Mr. President:

Your Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives completes its designated one-year assignment today. Its mandate is ending successfully as you intended: to report results as opposed to resulting only in a report.

At the very outset please let us thank you for giving, time and again, the power and prestige of your office to our work. Your personal commitment to voluntarism, to encouraging neighbor helping neighbor, has been an inspiration and source of strength to the Task Force.

Throughout the year, beginning with the luncheon you hosted on December 2, 1981 and to this closing luncheon today, you personally supported over 25 White House meetings where you urged leaders from all sections of our society to join with you in finding new ways to meet the needs of America. And we are grateful for your extra effort in visits to cities all over the country where you honored especially innovative and productive private initiatives.

A compilation of your "extra-efforts" support of the Task Force is included in the appendix.

The forty-four members of the Task Force -- a cross-section of political opinion and leadership from academia, business, organized labor, government, foundations, religious, civic and not-for-profit organizations -- devoted themselves to being a catalyst to encourage existing organizations, individuals and communities to take leadership roles in finding new and innovative ways to meet the needs of society. All Task Force members made important contributions to this work. I am truly grateful for their help and support and am particularly indebted to the committee chairs, who offered so much of their time and talent.

By the same token, the staff of the Task Force, organized initially by Dorothy Drummer and guided since March by Jerry cuth, did a remarkable job. Comprised as it was of people in loan from, or underwritten by, a variety of businesses and organizations, the staff "mirrored" the same sense of dedication as the appointed Task Force members.

Starting in November 1981 with 3 loaned staffers, and willing volunteers, and 2 telephones, our offices at 734 Jackson Place soon became a hub of activity and excitement.

To staff each of our committees, to house the data bank, to respond to the opportunities for increasing private initiative throughout the country, we expanded also to all 4 floors, 730 Jackson Place; fourteen telephone lines, 35 loaned or contributed staffers, 40 interns, who processed "Project Bank" forms for the data bank, and literally hundreds of volunteers, many of whom devoted as much as 60 hours per week.

It became the most exciting place to work in town.

With financial contributions from many organizations matched by donations of materials and supplies by many others -- and with Task Force quarters provided by the Department of Commerce -- the entire effort became a show-case example of public/private partnership.

We concerned ourselves with fulfilling the two principal functions outlined in the Executive Order which established the Task Force:

- 1. Promote private sector leadership and responsibility in meeting public needs.
- Foster an increased level of public/private partnerships in order to decrease dependence on government.

We adopted five key missions in our role as catalyst:

- To identify examples of successful or promising private initiatives and partnerships and to give these national recognition in order to promote their broader use.
- 2. To encourage increased and more effective use of human and financial contribution resources of religious groups, businesses, organized labor, foundations and philanthropic organizations, including more creative use of leadership, management expertise, training and volunteer work.

- To encourage the formation and continuation of community partnerships -- private organizations working with local government -- to identify and prioritize community needs and then to marshal human and financial resources.
- 4. To identify government obstacles to private initiative and make recommendations for their removal, and to formulate incentives to inspire and incite the private sector to undertake new initiatives.
- 5. To contribute to the development of public policy in areas of concern to the Task Force.

In all five areas, we found that success depends on volunteers and the spirit of voluntarism so essential to the strength and progress of our nation.

To carry out the mission of the Task Force we divided work among eleven action committees. All Task Force members were assigned to committees and each acted as an autonomous group in fulfilling its mission. Their respective findings are delineated in committee reports which outline mission and detail results achieved, and are attached to this letter.

The Task Force membership did not seek a consensus statement on such matters as the impact of changes in federal spending patterns, or the proper role of government and of the private sector in meeting the needs of society, or the appropriate role of government and the private sector in support of not-for-profit organizations. This was not our mission.

Neither did Task Force membership, as a body, seek concurrence on each and all reports, or undertake to analyze policy implications for the range of findings and observations offered. One exception is the report of the Contributions Strategies Committee, whose recommendations on goals for both cash and in-kind giving by individuals, corporations and foundations was approved by the full Task Force.

Where we did find consensus was on the importance of reinforcing the volunteer spirit and building partnerships, both important traditions in American history, and both never more needed than today.

We successfully fulfilled our first mission by establishing a computerized project bank. As of December 1, it contained 2,500 examples of how organizations, individuals and communities have met their needs. It has been very helpful to those organizations and communities seeking solutions.

believe that the project bank should be continued and re formed an ad hoc group of Task Force members to help mine where best to place it. We have received specific, and their desire to continue, maintain, and expand the data bank.

Because of the great interest in the subject of private initiative and community partnerships, many institutions have issued comprehensive studies in the past year, such as the Committee for Economic Development and SRI International. The Task Force commends particularly the report by the American Enterprise Institute, Meeting Human Needs: Towards a New Public Philosophy, which was commissioned by you in June 1981. It is an outstanding work and has been extensively used by the Task Force.

In addition to promulgating strategies for giving, and to joining with Independent Sector in funding an Advertising Council campaign on voluntarism, we stimulated the formation of State Task Forces by 42 Governors, encouraged several hundred national organizations (religious, civic, trade and professional, organized labor, academic, business, not-for-profit) to add private sector initiative to their work agenda, and identified impediments which deter private initiative action, and incentives which might be used to encourage job creation and job training.

The Marshalling Human Resources Committee, assisted by leaders from twenty-one national volunteer organizations, has published <u>Volunteers: A Valuable Resource, Prepared</u> for Policy Makers. Also, it brought fifty youth volunteers from more than thirty communities to Washington, D.C. to meet with you personally. Your inspiration resulted in their returning home committed to new collaborative youth volunteer initiatives in 1983.

The Community Partnerships Committee has published "How-To Guides" to stimulate development of community partnerships, and is publishing an outstanding book entitled, "Investing in America." Their efforts focused particularly on the need to cut across the lines between public and private, between for-profit and not-for-profit institutions. Outstanding examples of these are contained in the Journal of Community Action autumn issue, which is devoted exclusively to partnerships. It was published jointly by the Task Force and the Center for Responsive Governance. There are literally thousands of public/private partnerships now in existence or being formed throughout the country.

The Committee on Government Liaison has worked closely with all major departments and agencies, first to determine private sector initiative activity, and second, to encourage

er sensitivity in all policy making matters to private rative and public/private partnership potential.

Mr. President, we have found new commitment by both vate and public sector leadership to work in partnership. There is an exciting opportunity for this initiative, creativity, and commitment to be joined with local government in finding new ways to meed needs.

Nowhere was this better illustrated than in the work of the Communications Committee, which developed scores of these stories for print and broadcast media.

More than 70 television stations stressed these themes in both news and feature programming.

The videotape which you, Mr. President, made specifically for the Task Force, was used widely on television and in our speaking appearances across the country.

Hundreds of newspapers featured the "Brighter Side of Today's News" human interest stories, and these continue to be run in scores of association and company magazines.

Pat Boone's musical theme, "Lend a Hand, America," and the feature stories which he recorded, have been distributed to some 5,000 radio stations.

As the Task Force phases out its activities, I recommend:

- 1. That the Task Force Executive Order be permitted to expire on December 31, 1982.
- 2. That you continue to articulate the need for increased private sector initiative in every aspect of our nation's life and that you continue to urge all community leaders to join in local partnership as a most effective way to meet the needs of the community.
- 3. That there be created an inter-agency committee chaired by a cabinet officer. This group would:
 - a. Encourage increased sensitivity in policymaking to impacts on initiative, voluntarism, and private sector involvement.
 - b. Encourage cabinet initiatives which increase agency reliance on the private sector and public/private partnerships, in program development and implementation.

- That the White House Office of Private Sector
 Initiatives be strengthened and that the Special
 Assistant to the President for Private Sector
 Initiatives be the focal point for federal government initiatives in this area.
- 5. That you create a Bi-Partisan Advisory Council on Private Sector Initiatives, comprised of no more than 15 distinguished individuals. This new Council should meet regularly with you to review private sector initiative goals and objectives for your Administration.

The Task Force is grateful for your inspiration and support. We especially thank Mike Deaver, Jim Rosebush, Jay Moorhead and Michael Castine for their support.

We conclude our work, Mr. President, where we began, with the preamble of our mission statement: "The greatness of America lies in the ingenuity of our people, the strength of our institutions, and our willingness to work together to meet the nation's needs."

Dear Mr. Lachowicz:

Forgive me for being so late in answering your letter of November 11, but it arrived while I was away from Washington. I am just now catching up with my mail.

Let me assure you that I feel as deeply as you do about the abuse of human rights of the people in the countries you mentioned. We are engaged in actions as a result that are hurtful to the Soviets. I lifted the grain embargo because no other free world nations would join us and we were, therefore, hurting only our own farmers. We did have another thought in mind; the Soviets are facing grave economic problems — our sale of grain further drains them of hard cash.

We have also finally succeeded in getting our allies to join in an agreement that denies credit to the Soviet Union and restricts trade in high technology.

In the meantime we maintain contact and seek, through quiet diplomacy, to bring about changes. And, of course, we are negotiating with the hope of reducing the arsenal of nuclear weapons.

Our goal is peace and freedom for the enslaved people behind the "iron curtain."

Dear Mr. President:

In your statement on the second anniversary of the date when "a Communist government was compelled to grant formal recognition to a free trade union, Solidarity" in Poland, you stressed that the struggle between the repressive Polish government and the Solidarity goes on.

"One can imprison protesters, club and disperse demonstrators with tear gas and water cannons", but the dream of independence will survive.

Solidarity is a state of mind, and no one can crush that feeling. The Polish people may suffer repression, but no one can diminish their desire for freedom.

Poland was forced into the Russian colonial empire by the agreement at Yalta, in which the U.S.President participated.

The division of the world into spheres of influence is the cause of all our troubles since the end of the WWII.

By helping Russia to modernize her military industry and by supplying food for her occupational forces, we are to a great extent responsible for the existence of a colonial Empire.

The break of all trade relations, including grain embargo, should be our response to the Soviet Union for what takes place in Afghanistan, in Poland, and in the once free states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

Is the monetary gain more important to us, than the fate of millions of people in Russian colonies, endangering our own future?

"To the extent that we ignore an unknown nation and an unknown people, to that extent we ultimately risk our own security", states Paul Simon, the U.S.Congresman.

Church, Retirees Settle

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — The United Methodist Church has agreed to pay \$21 million to nearly 2,000 residents of church-sponsored retirement homes who said they invested more than \$300 million in worthless lifetime care contracts.

Tentative settlement of a class-action suit by the elderly residents was reached yesterday after the church agreed to a refinancing plan of Pacific Homes Inc., which operated seven posh retirement centers in California, Arizona and Hawaii before going bankrupt in 1977.

Judge James Focht scheduled a March 9 Superior Court hearing to determine if the agreement is fair to all parties.

In addition, the settlement must also be approved by a bankruptcy court in Los Angeles and by the church's Racific and Southwest Annual Conference.

Although Judge Ed Butler (who presided over the settlement conference) admonished altorneys not to discuss details of the case, a source told UPI the agreement could "add up to well over \$30 million in benefits to the plaintiffs over the next decade."

William Lerach, attorney forthe residents. "It assures our clients they will receive the care, including nursing and convalescent home care for the rest of their lives, which they had contracted for."

The Superior Court trial began in August following a ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court that the United Methodist Church could be sued as a whole for actions taken by its individual agencies.

The lawsuit was filed by 161 elderly residents of Pacific Homes on behalf of 1,900 people who said they were detrauded of more than \$300 million in propaid care and housing contracts at the retirement centers. There are currently about 1,400 surviving plaintiffs.

My husband, Luis Velazco, is also on ATF agent who works out of Hartford, Connecticut (near where Ariel lived) and was quite close to Ariel. His untimely death has left us feeling so helpless and numbed.

It is my hope that as a tribute to Ariel, you read this in one of your rare (perhaps nonexistent) quiet moments that you may have. My hope is to convey to you, somehow, a more personal picture of the man Ariel was and the impact his death has left.

Although you did not know him personally, you should know this. He had great hopes and possessed an enthusiasm for life that drove him to volunteer to work in Miami with the task force. He was not transferred---- he volunteered to go. He was a young ambitious father who was a part of America known as the hard working, decent commonfolk. I emphasize decent because that is a quality to be cherished in this crazy, erratic world. President Reagan, there are alot of us decent people out here in America, and we should keep sight of that fact in light of how Ariel died.. However, we are monumentally proud of Ariel and his work and words can not describe the void felt, already. I want you to miss him, too.

I understand you telephoned Ariel's wife, Elsie. I am sure you touched her, somewhere, and as time passes, she'll cherish the thought behind the call. Thanks, too, to Vice President Bush for his telephone call. Knowing how busy your lives are, a moment shared by you is greatly appreciated. Ferhaps more than you will ever know.

It may be, now, that my husband will be sent to Miami to continue Ariel's work with the task force. Even though I know the possibility exists that he, like Ariel, may not return to our two very young children and me, I will send him off to Miami with pride. He and all the other agents are committed to curbing the massive drug problem in Florida, and they are professionals. We should be very proud of all the agents' dedication.

My message is this. We all loved Ariel in some way, whether it be as a co-worker, friend, son, father, or husband. Although he is gone, now, his death should not go unnoticed by the nation. We should all recognize and appreciate the fact that Ariel gave his life while helping make this world a cleaner place in which to live and to raise our children. May God bless his wife and children.

No, I never had the experience of working with her on stage or screen -- I'm sorry to say. Yes, I was acquainted with her as we all knew each other in that Hollywood of the Golden Era. I have come to know her better in these later years when we are both somewhat removed from that time and place.

She is ever and always a lady; a lady of warmth and kindliness, as eternally feminine as she was when she captured the hearts of all who saw her on stage or screen.

What was her secret? Certainly it wasn't just theatrical artistry although she was a superb actress. There was more to it than that. There was beauty and an inner light that was Helen Hayes herself shining through every role she played.

Many, many years ago an American patriotic poem was set to music to the noble strains of your anthem "God Save The Queen." Our American poem, however, lost much in the transposition because in order to fit the music it had to be badly phrased.

During World War II a great ceremony was held in Soldiers Field Stadium in Chicago. Helen Hayes was introduced to a crowd of 125,000. Looking so tiny down on the floor of that great stadium she recited that poem, the words that everyone in that crowd had sung hundreds of times. I think it was the first time we had ever heard the beauty of those words. The silence when she finished was, I'm sure, a greater ovation than any she had ever received.

Perhaps others could be effective in reading that poem, but would anyone else think of it?

If anyone is looking for sheer enchantment, tell them to run a Helen Hayes picture.
