

Alejandro Orfila, Secretary General of the OAS, has written you a warm letter congratulating you on your trip to Latin America (Tab B). He also makes a number of substantive proposals that deserve study.

Facts

Orfila's letter strongly supports your personal interest in this hemisphere, particularly your theme of New World unity. In the letter he also makes a number of substantive recommendations which State and I believe need further study.

Discussion

State and I believe a substantive reply should be made by you after the Secretary General's recommendations have been studied. In the meantime, State recommends you send an interim response (Tab A).

Dear Mr. President:

I write to congratulate you on your inspiring and most successful visit to South and Central America. Your personal response to new regional currents and ideas, and your friendly receptiveness to the views of your neighbors have left a profound impression throughout the hemisphere. Following your mission, I have received a steady flow of enthusiastic comments from Latin America on the interest you have generated in the future of the Americas and the regional system.

In particular, many were struck by your proposals for a unified "New World." This powerful theme, which is periodically overlooked in the hemispheric dialogue, touches the most basic chords of Latin American history and sentiments. Even in moments of greatest turmoil our societies have inevitably felt that the American region must constitute an exception in the sometimes downward course of history by demonstrating a common unity of purpose and action.

It is a general feeling, Mr. President, that by focusing on this theme at this point in time you have opened a new door for OAS states both to modernize and update their regional system and to establish a new hemispheric order of friendship and development. Latin America concurs with your view that this region possesses the imagination, vast resources, and human talent and potential which can be combined to transform the Americas into a model of harmony for mankind.

Latin Americans particularly appreciate demonstrations of genuine and spontaneous interest from the United States and, above all, from its president. From the outset of your administration you have gained the esteem of your neighbors to the south by your repeated overtures of good will and friendship whether through your personal meetings with the chief executives of Mexico and Jamaica in your first days in office or recent manifestations of U.S. willingness to help stabilize the economies of Mexico and Brazil.

In presenting the Caribbean Basin Initiative at the meeting of the OAS Permanent Council held last February, moreover, you again evoked a responsive note in the hemisphere when you said that the

aims of your administration for the Americas are democracy, selfdetermination, economic development, and collective security.

In elaborating upon those themes at the November meeting of our General Assembly, Secretary of State George Shultz did much to overcome the mutual distrust between the United States and Latin America that had arisen as a result of the conflict in the South Atlantic.

The democratic example which your country provides and the strong support it lends to popularly elected regimes show clearly and in practice your belief that democracy is not merely a high ideal but a goal attainable by all, though circumstances may at times impede its exercise.

All OAS members share the goals of democracy, development, self-determination, and collective security which you have set forth so succinctly and all must collaborate in their realization. Towards this end various substantive proposals have been advanced to help generate new courses of combined hemispheric action. While not in any way excluding other questions, from my experience as OAS Secretary General I believe that any current list of pressing regional issues must give priority to:

- The Caribbean Basin Initiative. Much of Latin America looks with considerable interest at your program and hopes that the U.S. Congress will act on each of its broad components.

On the Telemission Program to ten U.S. cities in which I had the privilege of participating with you, Mr. President, I added that your program is not only necessary for the Caribbean Basin but that it can serve as a central foundation for a broader inter-American policy on development cooperation. The Caribbean Basin proposal might therefore serve as a bridge for bringing together the entire *hemisphere into an overall regional development policy.

A special session of the OAS General Assembly dealing with Inter-American Cooperation for Development has been a constant pre-occupation of the foreign ministers and the various OAS organs. So far, regrettably, this proposal has not gained the kind of positive momentum required to bring it to realization. However, work undertaken with a view thereto has produced substantive elements of a framework for advancing the concept of a new regional order which you outlined during and after your recent mission.

- A conference of Finance Ministers to examine alternative measures for reordering the international financial system and its mechanisms. Following your recent presidential mission to Latin America, Secretary of the Treasury Donald Regan suggested the possibility of holding such an international meeting. Latin America looks with favor on any initiative dealing with this vital subject.

Within the OAS, we have already made some preliminary assessments of the issues which might be considered in a meeting of this kind. Several months ago the idea was advanced that, in view of the profoundly serious nature of Latin America's debt picture and the hemisphere's economic situation, the OAS Ministers of Finance might hold a special meeting to examine and deal with this problem. This idea has now been taken up within the Inter-American Economic and Social Council, which recommended that its Executive Committee conduct a review of the proposal.

Perhaps a conference of OAS finance ministers might be a major first step towards a world meeting of finance ministers. The discussions and conclusions of such a meeting might assist in preparations for a larger global conference.

- Using the regional system to improve cooperation between the industrialized world and Latin America. With the downturn in the world economy Latin America has been experiencing difficulties in its economic and trade relationships, not only with the United States, but with the other industrialized nations of the OECD. In this instance interest is being expressed in the hemisphere in having the regional system, with the United States as a principal partner, serve as a bridge for improving economic relations with the rest of the industrialized world.
- Encouraging international peace and development in Central America. The problems facing Central America at present are related to years of neglect. Your administration, Mr. President, and those of other OAS members have taken a profound interest in helping the Isthmian countries find their own solutions to their problems. In the long run any other course, experience attests, does not produce lasting results.
- All OAS countries are concerned with Central America's future. It is clear that this area must reach its twin objectives of liberty and justice through reliance on the democratic processes outlined in your various policy messages. It is also evident that all OAS members are anxious to assist the Central American countries realize their democratic ideals in accord with the region's democratic inheritance.
- A proposed meeting of presidents and heads of government of the Americas. This proposal, which originated with three chief executives of Latin America, has met with considerable interest and, indeed, enthusiasm. Those advancing it see it as a central vehicle for imparting a fresh sense of dynamism to the hemispheric association.

Previously, similar presidential meetings were held in 1956 (Panama) and 1967 (Punta del Este, Uruguay), and both made an extraordinary contribution to directing the regional relationship onto newer and more secure grounds.

Having had the privilege of assisting in OAS planning for these previous presidential meetings I recognize, Mr. President, that preparations for a similar effort would have to be thorough and solid. Various other individuals also recognize this fact and as a consequence some hemispheric leaders have already advanced the idea of a preliminary meeting of foreign ministers to assess the dimensions of any presidential conference, consider a possible agenda, and set limits to any meeting and its purpose.

Each of these questions on the current benispheric agenda—the Caribbean Basin Initiative and the proposed OAS Assembly on Cooperation for Development, a possible inter-American conference of OAS finance ministers on debt, finance, and the economic crisis; hemispheric concern with Central America's development and relations between Latin America and the OECD countries—seems to relate directly, Mr. President, to your vision of a unified "New World" for the American region. It may well be, in consequence, that action with regard to them could serve as substantive input into any presidential meeting which might be considered.

The American Hemisphere is moving rapidly towards the centennial of its formal association in a regional system. By your continuing personal enthusiasm and support for the concerns of your immediate neighbors and friends, you are injecting a new sense of optimism and purpose into the regional relationship. I trust that my commments will assist you and your administration as you seek to determine the next steps in your inspiring efforts to infuse a new sense of hemispheric unity, purpose, and action into all the nations and peoples of the Americas.

Dear Mr. President:

In November of last year you asked me to ascertain the anti-arthritic medications used by Dr. Luis Carrillo in Mexicali, Mexico. Unfortunately, although we contacted Dr. Carrillo by both telephone and letter we have not yet nor do we expect to receive the information that you asked for. Dr. Carrillo mentioned that he uses many medications that are approved for use in countries other than the United States but declined to give any specifics of therapies he employs.

I have asked the Food and Drug Administration to determine whether there are currently any anti-arthritic drugs available outside the United States which offer significant advantages over currently approved drugs. They report that there is only one other potentially useful drug not yet approved for use in our country. This drug is called Auranofin. The FDA reports that a drug identical to Auranofin is currently under review in our country.

In summary, there appears to be no major classes of anti-arthritic medications available outside the United States that offer significant clinical benefits when compared to drugs currently in use in this country.
