

Dear Mr. President:

Dear Ben:

A short time ago you were quoted as having told the press that no administration in 30 years has "demonstrated as much determination as President Reagan to roll back hard won gains of black Americans." You then described 1982 as the worst year in recent memory for blacks because of my budget policies.

Ben, there are no facts to substantiate such charges and they are a distortion of the actual record as well as of my own position on these matters. The number of cases involving civil rights litigation were 753 for only 9 months of 1982 as against 656 for all of 1980. In just 8 months of 82, \$9.7 million in back-pay and other monetary benefits was collected compared again to the full year 1980 when the figure was less than half that, \$4.6 million.

The results of complaint processing for victims of discrimination show appreciable gains. The number of persons benfiting from E.E.O.C.'s voluntary complaint settlements was 32,790 in the 1st six months of '82, a 53% increase over fiscal 1981 which includes 3 months of the Carter administration. The figures for investigations, settlements, etc. show similar gains for our nearly two years here.

As for our budget cuts, economic policy, etc., hasn't the lowering of inflation by almost two-thirds been of help to blacks as well as to others? Even people on welfare or at the poverty level of earnings have several hundred dollars more in purchasing power than they would have had if inflation had remained at the 1980 level. Yes, I know there is economic distress in the land and that black unemployment is exceptionally high. But all the political demagogery in the land can't hide the fact that this recession was caused by the high interest rates (the result of inflation) which prevailed in 1980 and much of '81. Our program was not yet in place when the bottom fell out. Now there are signs of recovery and I'm determined it will benefit everyone across the board. I hope that political prejudice will not keep you from really looking at our record and learning how unjustified your attack was.

Ben, if only it were possible to look into each others hearts and minds, you would find no trace of prejudice or bigotry in mine. I know that's hard for you to believe and that's too bad because together we could do more for the people you represent than either of us can do alone.

OMB Director Stockman and I are proposing several changes in the package of Medicare and Medicaid proposals that you approved after the Cabinet Council meeting on January 6. We believe these changes will make the Medicare and Medicaid proposals more compatible with the bipartisan Social Security compromise that has just been reached. As you will see, several of the proposals entail delays or freezes in scheduled Medicare reimbursement increases -- steps which are fully consistent with our new broad-based freeze approach to reducing the deficit. In addition, the proposals reduce the economic burden placed on beneficiaries.

The budget estimates in this memorandum were prepared by OMB staff, and they are subject to revision by the HHS actuaries.

The option numbers in this memorandum refer to options described in the decision memorandum dated January 6.

Reduce the Coinsurance Charged Under Option 1

- o Rather than paying 10 percent coinsurance (about \$35 per day) on hospital days two through fifteen in a spell of illness, Medicare beneficiaries would pay 8 percent coinsurance (about \$28 per day).
- o All other features of Option 1 would remain the same.

Delay and Reduce the Increases in the Part B Premium Under Option 2

- o The increase in the Part B premium scheduled under current law for July 1, 1983, would be postponed. On January 1, 1984, the Part B premium would be set at 25 percent of the projected Part B outlays for the aged. Future increases in the Part B premium would take effect on January 1 of each year so that they are on the same cycle as cost-of-living adjustments in Social Security.
- o On January 1, 1985, the Part B premium would increase so that total premium income equals 27.5 percent of projected outlays for the aged. In each subsequent year, the percentage of projected outlays covered by premiums would increase by 2.5 percentage points until premiums cover 35 percent of projected outlays on January 1, 1988. The percentage of projected outlays covered by premiums would thereafter be held constant.

In order to restore some of the budget savings lost from the foregoing changes, the following changes would be made in Medicare payments to hospitals and physicians and in Federal payments to the States for Medicaid.

Reduce the Target Increase in Hospital Costs Per Case Established by TEFRA

- o Under the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 (TEFRA), each hospital has a target increase in allowable costs per case. The target is equal to the previous year's cost per case (or after the first year, the previous year's target) increased by the percentage increase in the hospital market basket (a measure of the inflation in hospital input costs) plus one percentage point.
- o This proposal would reduce the target increase to the rise in the hospital market basket without the added one percentage point. This restriction would be effective only from October 1, 1983 to September 1, 1984.

In the package you approved earlier, Federal payments to the States would be reduced by 3 percent in FY 1985 and all subsequent years.
- o This proposal would maintain the 4.5 percent reduction established by the Reconciliation Act for FY 1985 and all subsequent years.

This memorandum provides my comments on Secretary Schweiker's January 18, 1983 memorandum on the Health Care Incentives Project.

Specifically, one of the proposals in Secretary Schweiker's memorandum provides that federal payments to the states for Medicaid be reduced by 4.5% in FY 1985 and all subsequent years. The President should be advised that:

- The Governors will oppose this proposal strongly.
 They feel they made their deal with Congress on Medicaid in 1981 and will oppose any further budget hits in this area.
- Considering our limited success on the Hill with Medicaid in 1981, it is unrealistic to expect that we will have any greater success in 1983.

I was concerned but faced with our budget battle and asked him to wait a year -- which he did.


