Dear Marjorie:

It was good to hear from you and I'm sorry about my own lack of writing. I'm afraid the days go by with me always thinking things will settle down. It's about time, I guess, for me to realize this is probably the regular pace and adjust to it.

Marjorie, I don't know what the Admiral and his organization are going to recommend, but I have to say it won't accomplish the things you listed because we've already done that. When we came here there was no question but that our military was in a sad state, and many people did think the draft was our only solution. That is no longer true. From a situation where we were only getting the castoffs of low intelligence, and not even enough of these, in our volunteer military, we now have a full enlistment with a waiting list. But we also have quality -- highest level of average or above intelligence we've ever had; highest percent of high school graduates and up; highest re-enlistment rate.

We have as many enlistees as we would require in a draft so, as you were hoping, we are already helping in reducing unemployment by about two million or more young people. Best of all, there is an esprit de corps
-- a spirit in the military we haven't had
in years past. I'm so darned proud of them
I could bust.

Dear Admiral Johnson:

I am in receipt of your letter of January 7, with regard to the U.S. Military Conscription Survey Project. And I am in complete accord with your views.

The draft is not only our choice for a strong defense, but it would alleviate the unemployment problem. And at the same time it would reduce the rampant crime we now have, because it gives the young people who have too much time on their hands something constructive to do. With the vast amounts of energy they have it is best to put it to good use or it becomes a destructive force. We need only to open our eyes to see what is happening today.

It seems to me when we did have a draft there was less crime committed and less drug abuse. I think our nodraft situation has created the disaster we have of crime, drug ab use, unemployment and a weak national defense.

T V NEWS, AFTER EMOTIONS, NOT MINDS



T V News is a popular, dynamic force in our society. It has drama, shock, clout, excitement. It costs nothing and is easy to watch from your easy chair. It is also convenient, leaving both hands free to sip a drink and munch a snack.

It carries more drama then the most expert writer of prose...showing war, killing, fires, earthquakes, accidents, police shoot-outs in sound and color. And its all presented by young, handsome personalities who read their scripts well and almost throw kisses at you from the screen. Nothing wrong with that?

But there is. As a veteran reporter here and abroad, I like T V News only up to a point. The point where news becomes show-business and is after the emotions.

Van Gordon Sauter, President, CBS News, confirmed this reaction in Esquire Magazine recently. He wrote: "The kind of thing we're looking for in our TV News is something that evokes an emotional response. When I go back to the Control Room, I tell them, goddam it we've got to touch people. A lot of stories have an inherent drama, but others have to be done in a way that will bring out an emotional response in our viewers."

"Emotional response", " reach out and touch people ", " done in a way ", meaning doctor-it-up when emotion doesn't exist? This is not news. Its show-business, group encounter sessions, psychodrama, intimidation and propaganda.

Intentionally eliciting emotional response is a legitimate function of the T V Soap Operas, the opera, movies, theatre, novels, sports and political speeches. But journalism, reporting? Never. Manipulating minds and hearts belongs to the editorial page, or editorial comments on T V. If journalism becomes a quest for emotional effect, than reporting becomes manipulation. The pursuit of emotional responses involves editorial judgements. These do not belong in a news program.

The T V news camera has an important part to play in portraying news. But it becomes deficient when it is used, for the most part, not to transmit information, but to convey scenes with the greatest emotional effect. Scenes, of course, can be informative. But its one thing for emotional effect to be a consequence of reporting and something else for an emotional response to be the aim of reporting.

Given the T V camera's capacities and T V News time limitation...22 minutes out of a 30 minute newscast, there is a temptation to make the most of the emotional wallop on every one of the 22 minutes. And that leaves out important news that do not have emotional clout.

T V News has an important role to play, so long as it reports significant news... and let the emotional response remain where it belongs...in " show-business ".

T V News has no equal in reporting exciting events here and abroad. It is a miracle of our time. And it can be used to inform dramatically and well.

CELEBRITIES AND U. S. FOREIGN POLICEY

U. S. Foreign policy, nuclear power in particular, is being debated by movie stars and celebrities who don't know what they're takling about.

This is no put down of actors who want to discuss our policy on the Middle East, El Salvador or South Africa...or even whether or not we should continue to expand our nuclear arsenal. As citizens they have the right to dissent. Many sincerely believe in their causes. Because we place a special status to film stars for their acting excellence, we have a tendency to accept their views on other varied subjects. Even their endorsements on autobomiles, perfumes, shave lotions and medicines for the control of headaches, stomach aches and dandruff.

The truth is they know little or nothing about the control of nuclear power or the control of dandruff.

Some are viewed on T V across the country espousing their views. Interviewers keep asking them for "their positions". On what grounds of authority film stars can express their positions. When it comes to a nuclear debate I prefer Edward Teller and Randell Forrester who are authorities on the subject but have different points of view. I would not ask Messrs. Teller and Forrester to debate on the cinema.

I am not doubting the sincerity of movie stars on any subject they choose to discuss. Sincerity is not under discussion. Expertise on the subject is. And because they influence the public who idolize them as actors, they should refrain from using their film popularity into the real world of critical and strategic subjects.

The problem with professional performers is that they have the tendency to perform. Its difficult for the public to distinguish what they hear as fact or, a rehearsed dialogue before shooting the film.

We are not so much concerned about what actors know on the subject of foreign policy, but on what they don't know. Its troubling. They cannot read foreign policy from a prepared script. The background is not there. So they talk in the fringes of the subject, expressing personal emotions, ideological leanings and the like without any professional experience whatever.

What inevitably happens is that actors and actresses are frequently heeded not for the words they speak, but for the characters they've played on the screen, or for their popularity.

T V talks shows, moreover, have long been guilty of setting up colebrity—guests as authorities on critical and complicated subjects around the world. And they allow them to blab on at will as if they wore wisdom and experience as easily as makeup. We watched a talk show interviewer ask a movie star, " How do you assess now, U. S. military power as compared to the Russians." Can't you imagine the K G D agents in the U. S. deployed in front of their T V screens, red-recorders in hand, awaiting the movie star's assessment.





Dear Eddie:

It was good to hear from you and I appreciate having the full quote you sent me. I've known of that quote but didn't have it in it's entirety. It will be useful.

Your words about it being too late to play politics are right on target and I must say there are signs that our opponents are aware of that. There may be a little sounding off now and then but I believe we're going to have some unaccustomed bipartisanship on a number of matters having to do with the economy.

Eddie, I don't believe the President has the power to declare an emergency short of war. One of our problems is the extent to which Congress has reduced Presidential powers. This is particularly true in the budgeting process. I don't believe there is a state in the Union with a budget system as Mickey Mouse as that of the Federal government. What I wouldn't give to have a majority in both houses. Believe me I dream of making some fundamental reforms before I leave this place.

I'm greatly encouraged by the recent economic indicators, especially the increase in employment and the drop in the unemployment rate. Both housing, and autos have turned up. Now don't tag me as excessively optimistic or whistling past the grave yard. I'll keep my feet on the ground and we are tapping the private sector for input. Paul Volcker is cooperating. Granted we have a long way to go but I think the start has come.

Inflation averaged out at 3.9% for '82 but in the last 3 months it ran at an annualized rate of 1.1%. Real wages went up 1.8% for the year but again the last 3 months the annualized rate of increase was 3½%.

Again, let me thank you for writing as you did and please let me have your ideas and your thinking.
