Dear Reverend Kent:

Thank you for writing and for giving me a chance to respond. First let me say there apparently isn't as much difference between us as you seem to think. I am totally dedicated to negotiations leading to legitimate and verifiable reduction of nuclear weapons by all nations and the two super powers in particular. I hope and pray that once such reductions begin we could one day see an end to all such weapons.

Some things, however, have changed since you left the service. We do not have parity -- quite the contrary. And we no longer excell in accuracy. The bulk of our weapons are more than 15 years old. The bulk of theirs are less than 5 years old. They outweigh us in megatonnage 4 to 1.

I have stated many times the overwhelming majority of people in the nuclear freeze movement are sincerely motivated and want peace. I join them in that. All I ask is that we negotiate a reduction first to where we do have parity — then we freeze. To freeze now adds to the risk of war because we are inferior to them in such weaponry. It is our willingness to modernize our forces that has brought them to the negotiating table.

I'm sure you realize that in my present position I have access to all the information available on this subject, in fact more than is available to almost anyone else. I make my judgements based on these facts. Again, I assure you I want peace. There have been four wars in my lifetime. I want also the total elimination of all nuclear weapons.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to express my dismay at your latest remarks regarding the nuclear freeze movement here in the United States. I am an Air Force veteran of the Vietnam conflict, having served as a member of Air Force Intelligence in regard to our campaigns in Laos, Cambodia, and Vietnam. I also served at Headquarters--United States Air Force in Europe for three years in the late sixties and early seventies. With this experience, I feel that I know a little bit about national defense, weapon systems, radar systems, and the relationships between super-powers.

Since leaving the Air Force, I have served as a campus minister and am now serving as an Executive Minister with my denomination. Last April, my denomination's legislative conference passed a resolution calling for a reduction of nuclear arms and their eventual elimination. A copy is attached for your information. I and many of my associates are active in the Kansas City Interfaith Peace Alliance and the Kansas City Nuclear Freeze Coalition. I believe you do us and the rest of the American people a great disservice when you distort the truth of the "virtual parity" which now exists between the United States and the USSR with regard to their total amount of nuclear arms. Furthermore, I am saddened that you believe that we would advocate "military and moral inferiority" between the United States and the USSR. Quite the contrary, for me, as a minister and a Christian, the nuclear arms problem is the quintessential moral question of our day. For any nation under God to intentionally plot the destruction of millions of human beings is surely immoral and inhumane.

It is because the nuclear arms problem is of such potential harm to innocent human beings--men, women, and children--that many moral Christians have chosen to take an active part in movements like the Freeze movement. It is not communist inspired. It is inspired out of an earnest desire for peace. And yes, peace through strength, because we already have the means to destroy every person on earth several times over. Our own Department of Defense confesses this. Russia's capabilities are stronger in land-based ICBMs, where we counter this with airborne and naval based missiles. Theirs are bigger; ours, more accurate. In short, we have admitted--on the record--that virtual parity exists. Our military specialists have even said they would not trade our capabilities for Russia's. And to say that a freeze would leave America weak is just untrue. France's and England's missiles in Europe already give the NATO forces a counterattack capability against Russia's 500 some odd missiles deployed in Western Russia.



Finally, I resent your implications that those of us advocating a mutual. bilateral freeze are engaged in "simple-minded appeasement." But given a choice between this and "simple-minded militarism" and with it a continued escalation of cold war rhetoric and further polarization between peoples of the United States and the USSR, I would still take the former. I happen to believe that being a Christian nation means setting an example for peace and Rearning to reconcile our differences from others, rather than threatening them--and everyone--with complete annihilation, which we are doing. Producing "first strike" weapons, like the MX, is the most egregious sin of all, as it provides an inducement to bloody our hands first, with some naive hope that we can actually win such a war. And who would want that sin on their hands and on their consciences? If America is ever to be an "ensign" to the world and an effective influence for peace, let us find ways to sincerely stop producing weapons of mass destruction. Let us freeze the production, deployment and testing of all nuclear weapons now, and quit telling the American people that we will be weak if we do. Let's be honest with them and stand up for some of the moral principles outlined for us by our ancestors. Let us once and for all work for a sustainable peace, and not jeopardize the futures of our children and our earth.

I implore you to listen to your own conscience as a moral man and a Christian, and ask yourself if it is worth it to bankrupt your morality and the morality of the American people by continuing an arms race which robs the coffers of the poor and further destabilizes an already fragile balance in our world. And please quit discrediting many fine Christian citizens—who are far from simple—minded—by making remarks like you made yesterday in Florida. The freeze movement will not go away. Too much is at stake. Please listen to what it is saying. Please listen. . .

- Whereas, We have been commissioned to "lift up an ensign of peace, and make a proclamation for peace unto the ends of the earth" (Doctrine and Covenants 102:11) and
- Whereas, We have been instructed to obey our Lord's commandments and "be in the forefront of those who would mediate the needless destruction while there is yet day" (Doctrine and Covenants 150:7) and
- Whereas, We have taken a stand against proliferation of instruments of mass destruction (WCR 1087) and have indicated a need to urge nations toward responsible reduction and elimination of such and,
- Whereas; There are already enough nuclear arms stockpiled to destroy every major population center in the world several times over; and
- Whereas, The stockpiling of instruments of mass destruction as a strategy for deterrence of war is increasingly questionable as more and more nations gain capability for mass destruction; therefore be it
- Resolved, That we, as a church, through appropriate administrative representatives of every jurisdictional level (world, national, regional, district, stake, pastoral unit) shall inform the appropriate governmental officials of the need for responsible reduction and eventual elimination of nuclear armaments; and be it further
- Resolved, That we, as a church, urge the conversion of resources of war to productive forms of human development; and be it further
- Resolved, That we, as a church, encourage our people to set aside one day per month to pray and fast for peace and disarmament; and be it further
- Resolved, That we, as a church, join with other organizations that are constructively promoting a reduction of instruments of mass destruction.

Dear Mr. Castine:

Private sector initiative is alive and well here in Western New York! The story of the Variety Club of Buffalo and its 21 year tradition of caring for sick and handicapped children is one of dedication and dynamic volunteerism, recently in the face of severe economic stress.

The men and women of Variety's Tent No. 7, through their annual Telethon have, since 1962, raised some \$9 million to support programs and facilities at Children's Hospital of Buffalo and its Rehabilitation Center. Some \$2.5 million of that total has been raised in the past two years. While the funds have been critically important to the health of the region's youngsters, even more extraordinary is the almost universal community response to and participation in the Telethon effort.

The 1983 Variety Club Telethon--Tent No. 7's 21st consecutive and the oldest locally produced telethon in America--is evidence that the human spirit continues to transcend adversity and that a willingness to share--no matter how difficult the circumstances--is an inherent part of the fabric of this community. Gifts and pledges of \$1,307,747 were received, a sixteen percent increase over 1982. This was achieved despite Buffalo's 19 percent unemployment and the general economic debilitation affecting the entire Western New York economy. The money came from

both the general public and the business community.

However, the real beauty of this project is the breadth and depth of such total participation. There are major special events which raise hundreds of thousands of dollars; there are door-to-door solicitations by boy scouts; there are spaghetti suppers and pancake breakfasts; there are aerobic jazz marathons, skate-a-thons and runa-thons. There are companies big and small, retail stores, food chains and bars, taverns and restaurants involved; United Auto Worker locals, Masons, Knights of Columbus, VFW Posts, church groups and countless social, fraternal and service clubs all raise money for the Telethon. It is truly a celebration of the life and health of our children. The events listed below should give you a better flavor of this unique effort.

- Some 2,500 children and adults participated in KIDS BOWLING FOR KIDS, which raised over \$100,000. Fifty-eight individual bowling proprietors donated their alleys!
- Four major food chains put together a common promotion involving per unit allowances from vendors and suppliers which raised over \$115,000. Some 180 supermarket products from more than 50 different companies were involved in the promotion.
- Our daily newspaper, The Buffalo News, organized some 3,000 volunteers who braved the cold of a February morning to sell, for a \$1 donation a special edition of the newspaper, featuring a cover section on Children's Hospital—on street corners, expressway ramps, at bus stops, in shopping malls, supermarkets and fast food restaurants. This project raised over \$85,000.
- A local penneysaver initiated a door-to-door solicitation by its 700 carriers and raised some \$20,000.
- Thirty-four volunteer groups called "satellites" organized raffles, dinners, sales, dances and solicitations in communities throughout Western New York, northwestern Pennsylvania and southern Ontario to raise some \$125,000 for the kids.
- Some 75 schools from throughout the area conducted an array of events and projects and students brought in over \$65,000.
- Residents of a senior citizens' home held a four hour Rock-A-Thon, raising some \$500.
- Mark time 50 night spots and restaurants not together two raffle promotions among their patrons and raised \$58,000. This promotion

- involved hundreds of volunteers among the members of the Erie County Liquor Licensees Association.
- A group of aerobic jazz dancers danced for four hours and raised \$12,500 from sponsors.
- A handicapped adult suffering from cerebral palsy collected \$500 over two weeks.
- A group of volunteers in Attica, an outlying town, sponsored a Haunted House in October raising \$2,300 for Telethon '83.

This catalogue of events could go on, but through what has been briefly described you should have a general picture of the nature and extent of the project. It all culminates in a 21-hour live television show telecast on the area's top-rated station, WKBW-TV (Capital Cities Communications, Inc.), which donates all of the air time and the time of its many personalities. During the show there is a virtual parade of people and organizations who have raised money for the Telethon; live entertainment featuring nationally-known and local talent occurs; and most importantly, an additional \$300,000 is raised on the pledge phones.

The Variety Club Telethon in Buffalo epitomizes private sector initiative and because it is people in an economically depressed region rising above their problems to assist sick and handicapped children--and because they do it in such a generous and selfless way and have fun doing it!! It is a great cooperative venture involving people, businesses, and organizations.

I'm sorry we are on opposite sides on this one but I can't back away from it now. I'm puzzled because this measure rolled through Congress before the last election. There was no mention of it then. Dear Mr. President:

I can no longer "hold my peace" concerning the withholding issue. There must be a better way to come up with \$2 to \$5 billion annually (depending on the estimates you read) to help solve your very important budget problem. I recognize it is difficult now for you to change your direction on this subject and hopefully your advisors will develop a reasonable compromise.

A recent poll indicated that only one out of four Americans support the idea and my experience leads me to believe that those "ones" are hard to find. I have enclosed a typical letter from a bank to a customer which, of course, invokes the thought of bureaucracy, red tape, penalties, problems, etc.

Mr. President, what you agreed to last year is not what withholding is today. There is confusion and disarray in both the amount of revenue that will be raised and in how the system will be implemented. For example, I understand the U.S. Treasury has exempted itself for six months.

Some years ago, when Jimmy Carter's people thought of this idea, we all complained. Now we are asked to support a bad concept. Our company will gladly cooperate with any proposal you request (we can certainly afford an additional \$1 million in expenses after having lost \$40 million during the last two years). Our problem is not the computers, the cost, the extra work, but the reaction of the public.

Mr. President, your friends don't like withholding, maybe because you have been a foe of this kind of thinking for so many years. Members of the financial community would be glad to work with you to achieve a solution to this problem.

Dear Security-Holder:

As a result of the passage of the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA) of 1982, beginning July 1, 1983, The First National Bank of Chicago as dividend or interest disbursing agent will be required to withhold 10% of each of your payments as Federal Income Tax. To expedite the processing of Certificates of Exemption we are refusing to accept any Certificates not provided by us as dividend or interest disbursing agent. It is therefore necessary for you to complete the enclosed form and return it to us to be exempt from withholding.

If you file a Certificate of Exemption when you are not entitled to do so, or if you willfully fail to revoke an exemption when you are no longer entitled to one, you could be subject to both Civil and Criminal penalties. Requesting Presidential Support for Naming Brunel Christiansen to National Cowboy Hall of Fame

Thank you for forwarding the materials you received in connection with the above-referenced request.

We, too, were unable to locate any previous Presidential correspondence with Mr. Baumgartner. His name does appear, however, in the "first name" file, presumably as a result of earlier correspondence. As to Mr. Christiansen, who is evidently deceased, the library found no information on him in a check of standard biographical and other source materials (including the computerized "NEXIS" service covering major publications). No derogatory information was located on the National Cowboy Hall of Fame.

Based on the foregoing, I think the decision whether to comply with Baumgartner's request is basically a personal one for the President, probably depending primarily on his relationship with Baumgartner (whom Assistant Secretary of Agriculture William McMillan describes, as you may have noted, as a "long and consistent supporter"). I would only note that the negative results of the checks we have been able to make (i.e., we haven't found anything bad) does not provide complete assurance that the individuals and organizations in question have not been involved in anything potentially embarrassing. Also, one obviously has to weigh the general issue of how much the President wants to get involved in things of this sort; as you know, requests like this tend to mushroom whenever anyone receives a favorable response.





shops ... all of which are doing very well. Most of our older shops caught up with the previous year in November and December, to end the year with higher grosses than in 1981. Even two poorly managed shops came out ahead.

And then came 1983 ... and by February the majority of our shops were hitting all time highs ... one up a whopping 96-1/2%. Again, that means that our customers are spending because they know the recession is over.

The pressures on you are unending but the knowledge that you have achieved what you set out to do for the economy, should help balance your regrets as to the inevitable price to be paid.

As we pull further and further from the recession, the pressures on you to have more government programs for this and that and everything will be enormous. Yet what this country needs is more of what you have been doing, not less. We need the tightest possible hand on the purse strings so that government infusions into the economy do not stimulate and, indeed, cause another inflationery spiral. Hang in there! And hang tough!

You have been more, as President, than we ever dared hope of any man taking your office at such a terribly difficult time. You have saved this country from an economic collapse that would undoubtedly have been followed by a social collapse.

You are an extraordinary man, and the right man in the right place. Don't you dare consider not running again.




