

I have purposely waited several days before writing to you concerning your most impressive speech. I wish you could hear the reaction of the people in this area of our state of Oklahoma. The feeling here in Southwestern Oklahoma is that this was one of your most informative speeches. You certainly related well to the people, especially concerning defense.

I am finding more and more, as I correspond with my fellow mayors across the nation, that you definitely have the vote of the silent Americans, who are in the majority. 
The more I hear your speeches and read your policies, the more I am convinced that you are the man for this hour. A few days ago, I heard one of the greatest speeches I have ever heard,



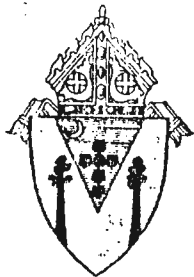

John Morley has written his third letter to the President (Tab I) requesting an appointment to deliver to him the teak case with photo which Taiwan's President Chiang Ching-kuo gave to him to "deliver personally." This letter indicates Morley is in New York and provides his schedule, which would permit him to make the trip to Washington, April 21-24. The President, or Mike Deaver, have indicated through Kathy Osborne that the President would prefer to have you or your staff meet with Morley, rather than the President doing it.

I suggest two options for handling it:

- A. Gaston and I meet with Morley in Gaston's office in OEOB on behalf of you and the President to receive the gift.
- B. Gaston and I meet with Morley in the White House Situation Room to receive the gift and you drop in for a minute to shake his hand during the meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend Option B and Gaston concurs. Your presence may be called for since it is, after all, a personal letter and gift from Chiang Ching-kuo for the President. Once you approve one of these approaches, and Jacque coordinates it with Kathy Osborne, I'll telephone Morley in New York to set it up.

In response to your note on John Morley's second letter to the President - I continue to think that the primary factor in whether the President should see him is the President's own relationship with Morley.

On the other hand, Morley says he not only has an elaborately encased photo, autographed by Chiang Ching-kuo to be passed to the President, but Chiang also gave him "a page long confidential statement" to be delivered personally to the President. So, if the President can see Morley on April 21, 22, or 23, it might be a good idea.

If he does, you might consider suggesting that the President have myself and Gaston Sigur and/or David Laux present. As I said in my previous note, we'd be interested in Morley's observations on Chiang's health, which we understand is deteriorating.

### ITS " THE REPUBLIC OF CHINA "...NOT " TAIWAN "

By misinformation, or deliberate design, some reporters, news commentators, columnists and others persist on calling " The Republic of China ", " Taiwan ". There is no country or political identity by the name of " Taiwan ". Taiwan is simply an island province of the Republic of China and it is identified as such world wide. The R O C also administers Matsu, Quemoy (Fukien Province)...the Hainan special Administration District of the Spratly and Pratas Islands Chain...They are all a part of The Republic of China, or " Free China "

Most of the 18 million citizens of R O C are Mainland Chinese. They have been migrating to Taiwan since the 17th Century. The largest migration came in 1949, when the communists usurped the China Mainland. Hundreds of thousands left to escape communist enslavement and they are still escaping today enduring dangers and sacrifices to gain freedom.

By Chinese tradition, the citizens of Taiwan who migrated from Fukien Province, are identified as " Fukienese"...those from Canton Province are known as "Cantonese" and so on. The children born to these also bear their parents provincial identification. Only the children born of Taiwan-born parents are known as "Taiwanese".

The constitutional capital of the Republic of China is Nanking, in Central China. But since the usurpation of the China Mainland by the communists in 1949, the Central Government of The Republic of China moved its capital to Taipei, Taiwan, one of its original provinces. Just as many governments have been forced to move their capitals to another area of their country, or even outside their country, during a crisis. In World War II the French Government, under President DeGaulle, moved its operations to London. But it remained as French Government and not referred to as " London ".

The Republic of China has been in existence since 1912. The communist government on the Mainland, known as the " Peoples Republic of China " has only existed since 1949. The ROC operates within the capitalist, free-enterprise system, as in the U. S. The P R C is under the communist-socialist system. The economic success of the R O C is acknowledged around the world...while the communist P R C is still backward, primitive, poor, unable to compete in world markets. This reporter has again recently visited both Chinas. There is no comparison possible. The prosperity of the Republic of China is living proof of the success of freedom and free enterprise. The Republic of China is the economic miracle today.

Some observers, either by error or deliberate design, show lack of respect for the true sovereignty of the Republic of China, by referring to it as " Taiwan". The 18 million free citizens have the same legal and constitutional rights as any other sovereign citizens of any country in the world, to be referred to as citizens of the Republic of China ...not "Taiwan". Taiwan is simply a province within the Republic of China, just as the 50 States of the United States are separately identified, although they are administered by both their individual local governments, as well as the Central, or Federal Government in Washington, D. C. Exactly the same is true with the Republic of China and its provinces, administered both by the Central Government in Taipeh and local administration.

It is the avowed purpose of the present millions of free citizens in R O C and the millions who will migrate in the future, to bring their freedom and democracy to their compatriots on the China Mainland, now suffering poverty, deprivation, and communist enslavement.

THE " K G B " ... SINISTER ARM OF THE KREMLIN

I have seen the long, ruthless arm of the K G B in some 48-world newstrips todate, in every major center, in every social, economic, industrial, educational and even religious function of modern society. I have known it as the MGB, NKGB, NKVD, OGPU and CHEKA before my time in the Bolshevic Revolution. The K G B recently established an even larger International Division, located in an isolated forest on Ring Road outside Moscow.

Our C I A estimates that over 300 K G B secret agents operate in the U. S. through the United Nations, Soviet Embassies and Consulates in the U. S., Canada, Mexico; Soviet newsmen, Amtorg Trade Agency, Aeroflat Airlines, Intourist Travel Agencies and many phony Front Organizations. These agents are equipped with some of the most sophisticated electronic spy-gadgets in the world today. A K G B defector revealed that over \$1 billion is now spent on propaganda activities in the U. S. alone, through Communist-Cells, Front Organizations, phony Peace Councils, Anti-War, Anti-Nuclear Groups, etc. The K G B forges documents, cables, letters attributed to the White House, State Department, U. S. Embassies...counterfits millions of U. S. dollars, Government bonds, Treasury Notes... in an effort to damage and embarrass the United States.

" COCOM " of N A T O Intelligence, monitors East-West technological operations. They report that the K G B assigns some 20,000 agents exclusively to steal the West's tech-inventions. The Soviet Consulate in San Francisco has 50 K G B agents infiltrating the " Silicon Valley" around San Jose, California. K G B agents have been caught and expelled from the U. S., Britain, Norway, Denmark, Turkey, Spain in recent months...and from Italy as a result of the investigation of the attempted assassination of Pope John Paul II, in St. Peter's Square, May 13, 1981. It is from Bulgaria, the largest K G B operation in the Eastern-Bloc, that the accused organized their attempt to kill the Pope.

The leading conspirator of today's K G B, is its former Director, who still runs it, and runs Russia, Uri Vladimirovich Andropov, who succeeded Leonid Brezhnev. His secret files on Soviet officials made it possible. To negotiate with this notorious conspirator on disarmament, nuclear-numbers, balance of forces, without on-the-spot inspection, is to engage in Russian-roulette, with our security and the survival of the Free-World.

Imagine our record when things get going as they appear to be. The present pent-up demand for everything will explode in our faces. The average auto on the street today is over 7 years old. The demand for cars, houses, appliances, etc will be enormous.

I didn't pull these statistics out of a hat. They are official figures from the World Bank, International Monetary Fund, Organization of Economic Cooperation, The U. S. Chamber of Commerce, C I A, U. S. Treasury, Labor Statistics, U. S. Budget...and my nosing around world capitols for facts. Will the pessimists ever learn.
