



Dear Mr. President:

I want to tell you how well my discussions went with Prime Minister Nakasone during my recent trip to Japan. When I gave him your letter about our new exchange program inviting the 47 Japanese Prefectures each to send an exchange student, as a response to Japan's program inviting each U.S. Senator to send a student to Japan, his reaction was especially positive. "This is most happy news!" he exclaimed. "Thank you very much; I completely agree with the President. I fully share his view. I hope the American students coming here will be warmly welcomed, and I am sure the students from each Japanese Prefecture will be welcomed in the United States." (A copy of your letter is enclosed for your convenience.)

Japanese business leaders also reacted very positively to proposed increases of exchanges of young people. I met with a number of top leaders to discuss how corporate support of youth exchange could be enhanced. They were very inspired by the leadership of your President's Council for International Youth Exchange. I think it likely that a Japanese counterpart will be established in the near future.

In my discussion with Prime Minister Nakasone, I related how the President's Council for International Youth Exchange comprises about 100 of America's top corporate chiefs who are matching the \$10 million Government appropriation over three years. Prime Minister Nakasone expressed his desire to involve corporate leaders in Japan as we have done here.

I suggested to him that he consider a tax deduction for corporate support of international exchanges. My line of reasoning offered to him was a concept that the initial tax revenue loss arising from a deduction would in turn create tax revenues as the original deducted amount was spent on airfares, lodging, books, etc. Further, when American students come to Japan as part of the exchange program, it would be interesting to find out how much money they bring to be spent in Japan. Adding the tax revenues generated by the dollar expenditures in Japan together with tax revenues generated in implementing the exchanges, conceivably could offset the original loss of tax revenue.

The President The White House Deck FYI no wysty The Prime Minister was extremely intrigued with this idea. He said, "I have been personally thinking about this problem for a long time. Either the government could increase funds for exchanges which is not always easy to do, or we should rely on the private sector. I think we should rely on the private sector." He said that he would try to develop this.

The Prime Minister's support for exchanges reinforced in my own mind the importance of bringing up your President's Youth Initiative at the Williamsburg Summit. Nakasone's strong support of youth exchange follows the earlier endorsements by Chancellor Kohl and former Prime Minister Spadolini of Italy. Formal support of youth exchange by the seven leaders, recorded in the final statement, will be a significant step in developing national and international visibility for the program, as well as the needed financial support.

Our efforts to include the President's Youth Initiative at the Summit have borne fruit. We have received confirmation from Under Secretary Lawrence Eagleburger that youth exchange will be on the agenda at Williamsburg. Judge Clark has directed that a photo opportunity with the seven leaders and a group of young people also be scheduled during the course of the meeting. Both the group photograph and mention in the final statement will dramatize the importance we place on contact and understanding among future generations.

I am pleased that you are able to receive Charles 2. Wick, the Director of the United States Information Agency, and my personal representative on the President's International Youth Exchange Initiative because I know that you and I share the belief that the experiences of our young people indeed shape our future world. I was moved when you were here in January by your description of the experience which your own daughter had as an exchange student in the United States. That is what our initiative is all about -- the turning of nations into individuals.

Mr. Wick is visiting Japan to discuss with his counterparts in your Government various topics involving information and cultural exchange which are of interest to both our nations. None of them is more important than the Youth Exchange Initiative. From the United States side, and with our funding, we hope to be able to double the number of exchange students between the United States and Japan while maintaining the high quality which has been a hallmark of these programs. Che of the most significant new programs being planned is intended to return the generous Japanese hospitality offered to American youth through your program involving the United States Senate. Our program would bring one young person from each of your prefectures to spend a year attending an American high school, while living with an American family. Mr. Wick will be discussing details of this program with Foreign Minister Abe and Minister of Education Setoyama.

Mrs. Reagan joins me in sending you and Mrs. Nakasone our very best wishes. We look forward to seeing you very soon.
