

BARBARA HELSINGIUS

Barbara Helsingius is one of Finland's most versatile and best-known singer/song-writers with a solid popularity throughout Scandinavia based on personal appearances on stage, radio and TV and through many recordings.


In 1961 Barbara Helsingius graduated as a Physical Education teacher from Helsinki University and received a state schoolar—ship from Finland to Stanford University, Californig. She got a Master-of-Arts in Education in 1963 and worked as a teaching assistant 1963-84. During this stay in the US she became interested in American folk-music, brought an assortment of songs back to Finland and became "the first local American folk-singer..."

Barbara soon became employed by the Finnish Broadcasting Company, left teaching and worked as an announcer and free-lance editor of various types of programs. In 1965 she acted as a hostess for a popular TV-series, was given a chance to sing and soon afterwards she cut her first LP album consisting of American folk-songs in Finnish. A successful career had begun.

In 1967 Barbara married Henry W. Koski, an American diplomat of Finnish descent, moved to the US where she soon appeared on several TV shows, some of which still are being shown, and on many radio programs.

In 1968 her husband was stationed in Oslo, Norway and Barbara was able to resume her Scandinavian career working for the Norwegian Broadcasting Company in DJ productions and also appearing as a singer both on radio and TV. Several TV-specials were produced by the NRK and two records (45's) were cut by a Norwegian company. While living in Norway 1968-1975 Barbara started writing her own material and also began singing Scandinavian songs.

In 1975 the decision was made to leave the foreign service and settle down in Finland where Barbara once again became involved in broadcasting as a free-lance editor. Since 1978 she has been a regular free-lance for Radio Finland broadcasting in English, Finnish and Swedish all over the world.



After returning to Finland Barbara has, with increasing success, toured Scandinavia. Her one-woman-show where she accompanies herself on her guitar, have been applauded by critics everywhere as "warm, human and humorous", she is said to have a "charming personality that spellbinds her audiences" with a "unnaffected yet intense approach" and her alto has been called unique. By many critics she has been called one of the truly great performers in Scandinavia.

In 1977 Barbara's second LP was released consisting of her own songs in Finland's second official language, Swedish: "Det var en gång" (Once upon a time)(RCA/PL 40042) and it was followed by the Finnish language version "Olipa Kerran" (RCA/PL 40093). This LP is also available in booklet form.

In 1981 Norwegian recording company Talent released "<u>Speiling</u>" (TLS 4055) with Barbara's Norwegian translations of her favourite songs from Finland. This very successful production was in 1982 followed by more songs from Finland: "<u>Fra Barbara med kjaerlighet</u>" (From Barbara with love)(Talent/TLS 4069)

In december of 1981 it was time for a new record in Swedish:
"Barbaras blandade" (Barbara's mix) with her own songs for RCA,
PL 40207, and in late 1982 an English version of "Speiling"
was released: "Reflection" (Kerberos/KEL 633).

Barbara's newest release, "Kahlaajatyttö" (The wading girl) (KEL 634) completes her unique production as she here sings in a fourth language, Finnish, her music to the poems of famous Finnish poets Aale Tynni and Aila Meriluoto.

Many of the songs Barbara has written can be found in various song-books and she has also published a song-book of her own: "Vill du visor min vän" , in Swedish.

During her career Barbara has also appeared outside Scandinavia, twice reached the finals in Irish song contests (Cisco '74 and '77) and won many prizes for her songs both abroad and at home. Many TV specials have been made about Barbara and her songs in both finland, Sweden and Norway and Barbara is anxious to emphasize the importance of Nordic co-operation as well as international friendship and she uses her singing to do so. She has also translated her own songs (as well as Scandinavian

songs and Finnish poems she has set to music) into the languages she uses: Finnish, Swedish, Norwegian and English.

Special point of interest: Barbara was a member of the Finnish Olympic team to Rome in 1960 as a fencer. She has long quit fencing and keeps in shape by playing tennis and exercising her two Siberian husky sled-dogs. Barbara has two daughters, Marika 15 and Karina 13.

Barbara is the chsirman of the Helsinki chapter of a Scandinavian song society.

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Dear Micks

Forgive my tardy answer to your letter of August 25. It sometimes takes awhile before letters get to my desk.

I'm sure you can understand if I take exception to your charge that I have been "groveling." On the other hand, I can understand why you would have such a misperception in view of the general tone of the press in reporting on anything to do with me or my Administration; such reporting invariably based on those unnamed sources they claim to be quoting.

Let me deal first with the matter of the International Business Women's Convention here in Washington. About 1200 women, most of them from other countries, arrived at the White House for a tour that had been arranged and confirmed. Then some bureaucratic bungle saw them turned back at the gate. When I learned about this, I called the President of the American group (who had arranged the visit) to see if there was any way we could reschedule the tour. Unfortunately, that was impossible.

Mrs. Madenwald was so depressed and embarrassed about having to apologize at the next morning's meeting that I asked if I could apologize instead. I don't think, under the circumstances, that could be called "groveling." She was almost tearful in expressing her gratitude. So next morning I was there and couldn't have asked for a warmer welcome. I received a standing ovation when I finished. Mrs. Madenwald was most gracious, which makes it hard for me to understand how within an hour of our parting she could have released to the press such a vitriolic attack. I received a wire of apology from the International President of the group and as I say, the members made me most welcome.

As for Ansel Adams -- yes, I was disappointed that he would go to the press. I've long admired his art and when I was told he disapproved of me I invited him and his wife over for a visit. In the visit I learned what you apparently know -- that philosophically he and I are on different wave lengths.

As for Barbara Honegger, she didn't even know what was in the report she signed. It carried word of about 25 laws we've already changed. While I don't support E.R.A. or abortion on demand, I also don't support inequality based on gender. As Governor, I had State laws that discriminated changed and set out to do the same with Federal laws over two years ago.

You say you want a President who is dedicated to serving all the people. Well doesn't that include addressing an organization which invited me to speak and which also invited the Vice President? No, we weren't well received but you'd be surprised at how many sought us out later to apologize for the organization and to express their appreciation for coming. Would we be doing the job if we only spoke to those who agreed in advance with what we were going to say? That's like preaching to the choir.

Mick, I'm still promoting the things I believe in and campaigned on and will try to convince the unbelievers. Remember I was once a member of the other party and became a convert. I think others can be converted too.

Dear Mr. President,

Quit groveling, Mr. President.
