SUBJECT:

Request for USITC 332 Investigation on Fish

The fishing industry in the Northeastern United States has complained that it is facing a number of problems due to strong import competition from Canada as well as to competitive factors affecting their industry. Under Section 332 of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. 1332), the President may request that the U.S. International Trade Commission conduct an investigation of factors affecting competition between articles of the United States and imported articles in the principal markets of the United States. At the conclusion of its investigation, the Commission must provide you with a written report of its findings and any information at its command. By tradition, requests for Section 332 investigations are made by the United States Trade Representative at the direction of the President.

If you approve, I will request the U.S. International Trade Commission to conduct an investigation of the competitive factors which are affecting the performance of the fishing industry in the Northeastern United States. A proposed draft letter making that request is attached. This proposal has been approved by the Trade Policy Staff Committee.

Dear Campmates:

The Grove staff has produced a construction estimate on our kitchen renewal project. Without going into great detail, it involves razing the kitchen and rebuilding it completely, including replacement of all the substructure, enlarging the kitchen space by about 150 square feet and putting the plumbing system in new and sanitary condition. The rough estimate for the work is about \$17,500, which will probably increase somewhat when the final estimate is submitted.

We have contacted Dohrman's who, in turn, will confer with Ralph, our chef, examine the plan and site, and give us their reactions. Considering all the things they might recommend that we buy, plus replacement of some of our battered cooking tools, I cannot see more than \$12,500 for all kitchen equipment.

Dear Mr. President:

In the five months since you and Prime Minister Nakasone established the U.S.-Japan Advisory Commission a number of preliminary views have emerged from our initial deliberations. We consider these of sufficient importance in the light of your forthcoming visit to Japan to submit them to you at this time. They represent a statement concurred in by members of the commission from both sides, all of whom were present at the meeting at which this paper was agreed.

You will note that the Yen/Dollar exchange rate is mentioned as an extremely important factor in the competitive position of industries in Japan and the United States. Since this meeting at which this statement was prepared additional work has been done on the Yen/Dollar exchange rate issue, and extensive recommendations for corrective action have been given to members of your Cabinet by the Business Roundtable and other interested and knowledgeable organizations. This issue has been studied more extensively by our commission. I strongly believe the most important action you and the Prime Minister can take at your meeting in the trade area is to emphasize the necessity of bringing the Yen/Dollar exchange into more appropriate balance. Your joint leadership in emphasizing this issue would encourage the appropriate people in both Japan and the United States to take the action which would correct this situation. If the Yen/Dollar relationship is corrected, it will solve many of the other current trade problems.

We wish you well on your Asian trip and are delighted that you will have the opportunity to pursue your dialogue with Prime Minister Nakasone which got off to such an auspicious start in your earlier conversations this year.




