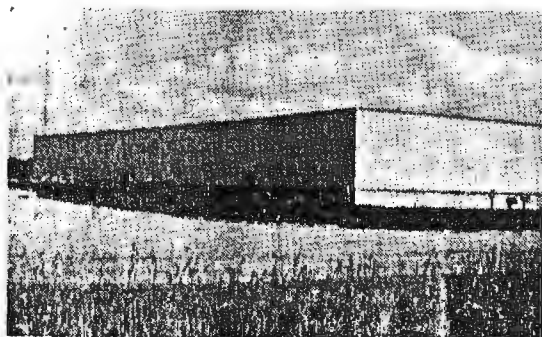



Dear Mr. President,

I sat alone on a hilltop, looking down on a Korean village. It was the morning after the Burma bombing. Our battalion had already been in the field for a week training, but this morning I was watching the Korean military. Some reserves have been called up; army regulars are very much in evidence. The more I considered our situation, the more I found myself struggling against a sense of futility. The entire Korean nation is involved in a daily struggle for survival. They are desperately aware that they could be overrun at any time. Whatever security they enjoy comes, in large measure, from our presence.

But what if North Korea came south? The south Koreans would rise as one to defend themselves against inevitable slavery and death. We would use every soldier and every piece of equipment in the division to assist them. But would it be enough? Initial losses would be heavy and, true to form, the American news media would be "back shooting" and second guessing our efforts within a week. Congress, with its usual lack of courage and conviction, would waffle between your calls for support and the media's naive tolerance of Communist murderers. In the last analysis it would be you and us (the military) vying with congress and the media for public support. And we already know how that would turn out! Time and time again in the last thirty years, the Executive Branch and the military have been thwarted in their efforts to keep treaty commitments and support allies by cowardly congresses intimidated by an egocentric left leaning media. Who could reasonably expect it to be any different this time?

Many of the people I serve here, well trained and courageous as they might be, would be sacrificed in a war we would not be allowed to win. The people we would be fighting to save would ultimately be handed over to totalitarian slavery by the very


people who sent us here to keep them free. We who are here (and you, I suspect) know what a tragedy such a defeat would be. All that South Korea is and could be would be forever lost and their suffering would be beyond measure. But that story would never be told, just as the news people never tell us about the torture and injustice in Cuba, or Vietnam, or North Korea, or Nicaragua, now that they have been "liberated". Is it any wonder that our allies are uneasy. Since World War II, we have backed down each and every time we have been challenged.

I have no illusions. If war breaks out, I will die here and so will many others. But rather than be remembered for courage and bravery in the defense of freedom, newspapers and TV programs in our own country will paint us as misguided pawns interfering in the internal affairs of a far away country.

In the course of this somber meditation, I remembered that you will arrive here shortly. As my Commander-in-Chief would you entertain a suggestion from one of your very junior staff officers? During the various stops of your visit, would you be alert to whatever opportunities arise for you to speak words of encouragement to those of us whose lives are "on the line". Words like spirit and morale have more significance than most of us ever before realized. Since the sentiments earlier expressed are shared by many others here, your positive, explicit support will reinforce commitments already made. Soldiers deserve to know that their sacrifices, present and potential, are appreciated. We need to be reminded that the MEDIA IS NOT AMERICA.

Thank you for all you have already done for our country and for the military family. Keep us in your prayers as you are in ours.

We'll continue the fight.

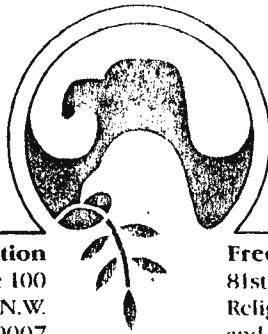

Even though we did not succeed in passing Tuition Tax Credits at this time, I want to thank you for all your support and help with the effort.


I was especially impressed by the work of Steve Galebach and by one of your former White House staff, Bill Barr. They did an excellent job.
