

Dear Miss Accaso:

Thank you for writing and giving me the chance to reply to the "S.T.O.P. News" and its so-called fact sheet, which I found somewhat lacking in facts.

There is no question about the horror of nuclear war. I believe with all my heart that a nuclear war can never be won and must never be fought. The problem facing us is how to prevent such a thing from ever happening. In that regard, I have to point out that a President of the United States has access to more information than the authors of the fact sheet can possibly have, no matter how well intentioned they are.

Let me give you a fact: The Soviet Union has a definite superiority today in nuclear weapons. We have asked them to join us in talks to reduce the number of such weapons, and I've even offered to get rid of such weapons all together. In the meantime we have had to modernize our own force to reduce the Soviets' superiority and thus give them some reason to talk to us. It is true they proposed the nuclear freeze, but that was to freeze us into a position of inferiority, making it possible for them to attack with no risk to themselves.

I won't try to correct every so-called fact in the paper you sent me, although I assure you I can. As an example, take the first two items -- that beginning in December '83 we plan to deploy hundreds of nuclear missiles in Europe and that the world will be only six minutes from nuclear war.

It is true we are going to deploy Cruise and Pershing II missiles in Europe. In 1979 (before I was President) our NATO allies asked us to do this and we agreed. It has taken until now to have such missiles available. What the fact sheet didn't say was that the Soviets have about 1300 nuclear warheads targeted on all of Western Europe, all capable of hitting the European cities in six minutes or less. The missiles we are just beginning to put in place are a deterrent to indicate that a Soviet attack could result in great damage to them also. The paper also does not show that I have invited the Soviets to join in disarmament talks to get rid of such weapons or at least reduce the number. The Soviets so far have insisted that our NATO allies should have no missiles, but they are only willing to reduce their own warheads to somewhere between 800 and a thousand.

Another item as an example, we are building 100 MX missiles. The paper says the Soviets will try to catch up. We are the ones trying to catch up. The Soviets have hundreds and hundreds of new missiles bigger and more powerful than the MX. We at present have nothing to match them. Again, we are trying to build a deterrent.

I hope you will look further than S.T.O.P. for information to help you arrive at a decision. In the meantime, let me again say, my most cherished goal is peace and the elimination of the nuclear threat hanging over the world. I must be frank and say I am disappointed that teachers -- no matter how well intentioned -- would resort to such one-sided tactics and impose such misinformation on students.

Thank you again, and God bless you.

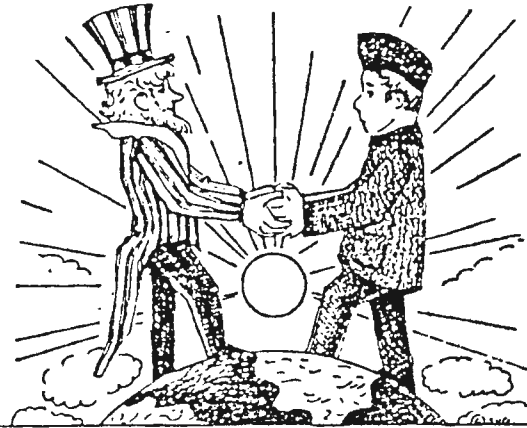
