COMMACK, N.Y. (AP)-President Reagan is going right to the top when it comes to campaign contributions.

"Dear Mr. God," begins a three-page letter bearing Reagan's signature delivered Tuesday to the Rev. Doyle Daugherty, pastor of the Church of God here.

The letter continues, "I am calling upon

you to make a most unusual sacrifice. The sacrifice: \$120 in campaign contributions to keep Republican senators in office."

Dear Sheldon:

Thanks very much for your letter and your suggestion re the debt. Believe me my dream is not only to balance the budget but to begin whittling that debt down. Your letter was the subject of discussion at a recent Cabinet Council meeting on budget matters. The result of that discussion was that balancing must come first. A tax to reduce the debt while we still have to borrow would take the pressure off the spenders. But we are all agreed that once we muscle spending down to match revenues then we must begin a program of debt reduction.

I was surprised to learn there is a fund (not large) in the Treasury made up of contributions for the purpose of debt reduction so earmarking a revenue source would be no problem.

I'm still determined we must amend the Constitution to provide for a balanced budget. In the meantime we must go after the present and projected deficits. Our hope that the Democratic leaders in Congress would join in a bipartisan effort toward that end has died aborning. They'd rather play politics. Right now I'm working with our Senate Republicans on a plan to reduce the deficit. We're close to agreement.

Dear Mr. President:

As a charter member of your Ground Floor Group I urge you, in the interests of your reelection and the continuation of the broad-based economic recovery you have skillfully engineered, to use your powers of leadership and persuasion to identify the Federal Debt as a threat to our national well-being and to our position as the world's most powerful nation.



Dear President Ron:

This letter from Academician G. A. Arbatov was written before Andropov went to his Kremlin Valhalla. I had said something about hoping that some of the sparks flying about would prove to be constructive after all. But that was then and Chernenko is NOW, and while everyone discounts the difference of one man, I often reflect on Stalinization which had that country by the throat for all those years, and One rambunctious cat named Khrushchev came in a few years behind him and startled everybody by debunking the Georgian for the butcher he was. Stalin became the most mobile corpse around, first alongside Lenin in the Mausoleum, denied the Kremlin Wall, then a plain unmarked grave, and finally it has a headstone with his bust atop. Strange country, but it has individually sentimental people. The Inna Sheidina he mentions was "Tex" Thornton's quide and interpreter (and on the staff of Arbatov's Institute) when Tex made his visit in 1969, well before detente and the small opening. It had to touch Arbatov that it was cancer which took both Tex and Inna. He had a great respect and affection for Tex, the first official visitor to the USSR under auspices of his newly formed Institute, and in Moscow told Tex he'd like to make him an "honorary member of the Communist Party". Tex said he would have to reciprocate in some way, and would make each member of Arbatov's Institute a shareholder in Litton Industries with one share each -- and that ended that. As there is often the requirement for warm-up "small talk" at these international affairs, I thought if you encounter Arbatov somewhere, your special perspectives on Tex might provide such an exchange.

Continued Assignment to the Organization of American States of Dr. Ruth Mondschein, Director of Special Programs and Projects of the U.S. Department of Education

I am very pleased to announce that Dr. Ruth Mondschein will continue to work with the General Secretariat until May 8, 1985, on detail from the U.S. Department of Education. The U.S. Secretary of Education graciously acceded to my request that the significant contribution by Dr. Mondschein since June 1980 on behalf of the handicapped children of Latin America and the Caribbean be continued. This act of inter-American cooperation will allow the member countries and the Organization to capitalize on the four successful regional festivals and symposia which have been organized by Dr. Mondschein for handicapped children and youth throughout the Americas in Disney World, Lima, Bridgetown and Guatemala.

The General Secretariat, with Dr. Mondschein's advice and guidance, will work over the next fifteen months to create an institutional framework for long-term inter-American cooperation on behalf of handicapped people. For this purpose, the Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped was founded in 1983. In 1984, its program will be designed and initiated-with a major effort to attract financial support for the work of the Foundation from member governments and the private sector.

FOUNDATION OF AMERICAS FOR HANDICAPPED

TO BUILD ON SUCCESSES OF OAS SYMPOSIA

WASHINGTON, D.C., SPECIAL (OAS) -- In observance of the International Year of the Disabled proclaimed in 1981 by the United Nations, the Organization of American States (OAS) initiated a series of programs to benefit the millions of handicapped throughout the hemisphere.

During the years that followed, the OAS held a number of very successful regional symposia aimed at increasing educational and vocational opportunities for the handicapped. While the symposia focus on employment and education issues affecting the disabled of the Americas, they also have a festive air about them, featuring such well known artists as Burl Ives, Debby Boone, Tom Sullivan, who is blind, and the Gallaudet Dance Troupe, made up of hearing-impaired performers, as well as craftsmen who demonstrate that in the arts there are no handicaps. The theme of these symposia has been "The Magic in Me," attempting to illustrate to those taking part that the handicapped have an integral role to play in their native countries' future.

Disabled persons from 27 American nations participated in the first symposium held in 1981 at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida. Since then, OAS symposia have been held for the handicapped of the Caribbean in Bridgetown, Barbados, for those of South America in Lima, Peru, and for the disabled of Central America, Panama, Mexico, and the Dominican Republic in Guatemala City, Guatemala. In November, 1983, the OAS sponsored a special symposium on the employment of handicapped youth in the Bahamas.

As an outgrowth of these symposia, a Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped has been established with the support of the OAS and the public and private sectors of countries throughout the hemisphere as an ongoing instrument for promoting the fulfillment of the needs and aspirations of the handicapped of all nations of the Americas.

President Ronald Reagan, congratulating the organizers of the foundation and the OAS, said, "Your continuing efforts to assist the handicapped to overcome both physical and attitudinal barriers have the full support of the U.S. Government, and I wish you every success as you work to enrich the lives of disabled people throughout our hemisphere."

OAS Secretary General, Alejandro Orfila, who serves as chairman of the foundation's advisory council, expressed his conviction that the efforts of this foundation would serve "to enhance the importance of the things that unite us, not those that divide us" in the hemisphere.

The goals of the Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped include:

- 1. To identify existing and potential employment opportunities for the handicapped and to provide the necessary skills training and support services to allow the handicapped to take advantage of these opportunities.
 - a. To initiate, strengthen, and support basic and applied research on "special education" for the disabled.
 - b. To promote and advance the study of new techniques, treatments, and procedures in rehabilitating the disabled.
 - c. To foment the generation of employment opportunities for the handicapped.
- 2. To encourage persons with appropriate sensitivities, skills, and training in existing facilities to address the problems of the handicapped as a career field and to prepare them for such work throughout the hemisphere.

- 3. To provide the physically and mentally disabled of the hemisphere with a better understanding of the opportunities available to them and to enhance understanding on the part of governments, public and private institutions, and the people of the hemisphere of the attitudes, perceptions, and aspirations of the disabled.
- 4. To contribute to the promotion of employment and vocational independence for disabled persons with direct rehabilitation services.
- 5. To ensure dialogue and the regular participation of existing facilities for the disabled in the hemisphere and to promote the exchange of methods, techniques, treatments, and mutual assistance in improving the quality of life of the handicapped.

The Washington-based foundation regards vocational and educational programs to be the most effective tools in creating better understanding on how business, government, labor, and educational and research institutions can cooperate together to assist the disabled in rehabilitation and employment.

What began in 1981 as periodic, regional symposia for the handicapped has now become, with the establishment of the foundation, "a permanent, sustained, comprehensive effort to help disabled people to help themselves," said Dr. Jayne Baker Spain, the Foundation's Chairman of the Board.

Col. Barney Oldfield, Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation, stated, "In all the concern for human rights in the world, all too often overlooked are the human rights of the handicapped. In a small way, the Foundation will make their needs more visible and their employment more attainable than may have been the case in the past."

The President of the Foundation, Julio Matheu, former Minister of Economy of Guatemala, said, "I am fully persuaded and confident that the Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped can, will, and must now urgently respond to the

most pressing needs of the disabled with vigor and compassion to stimulate the energies of private citizens and institutions throughout the hemisphere."

"The most important outcome of the symposia was the formation of the Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped in order to continue and expand upon the achievements of the past few years by means of a permanent vehicle to sustain the successful pattern of cooperation of the public and private sectors of the United States, Latin America and the Caribbean so as to improve the lives of the millions of handicapped in the Americas," said Dr. Ruth Mondschein, the Executive Producer of the OAS symposia for the handicapped who is on loan to the OAS from the U.S. Department of Education.

Working together through the Foundation of the Americas for the Handicapped, the public and private sectors of the hemisphere will be able to make significant contributions toward the advancement of knowledge and understanding of the attitudes and aspirations of the disabled of the Americas by supporting and expanding upon previously successful international efforts throughout the United Nations Decade of Disabled Persons and beyond.

My husband and I returned last week from a lovely two week vacation on the island of Tobago in the southern Caribbean. while there, we decided to take a one-day side trip to the island That turned out to be the highlight of our entire vacation.

Not only is Grenada a beautiful island where we would like to. vacation in the future, but also while there we felt more proud of being Americans than ever before in our lives. Once the people of Grenada discovered we were Americans they welcomed us with open arms. They simply could not thank us enough for our troops having "rescued them" last October, as they phrased it. We hardly needed to ask any questions at all. The people we met - our taxi driver for the day, a man in the nutmeg factory, a lady in the cocoa factory, and others - just seemed to have a genuine need to talk and talk about their terrifying experiences of the past years until we "liberated" them. It was certainly a most eye-opening experience. We learned so many things which much of our liberal press in this country has evidently chosen not to print, probably because it would make the American people realize that you and your administration made a wise and the only moral decision you could have made in sending our troops into Grenada last October. Our American people need to know without a doubt that this was indeed a rescue mission for the Grenadians, as well as for our students on the island, and not an "invasion" as some have suggested!

We were simply amazed at the "graffiti" on walls around the island with phrases such as, "...thank you Americans for rescuing us; God bless Reagan; welcome American troops; stay with us forever," etc. We were truly filled with pride when we read these statements. We met a few of our soldiers and Marines along the streets of St. George's, the capital city, and talked with them. They all felt that they were doing the right thing in being there, and were needed and appreciated. We asked some of the local people if our troops were behaving properly while there - occasionally some of our servicemen have been known to behave in not exactly the proper manner befitting Americans in foreign countries - and all said there were no problems with any of our servicemen; they are setting a good example for our country.

It was heartbreaking to learn of the terror the Grenadians had experienced since the Communists from Russia and Cuba had taken over their island. The worst of this take-over had lasted "four years, seven months and eleven days" prior to our arrival last October, as many of the people repeatedly told us. At times they were all under "house arrest" having to stay in their homes for various lengths of time under the threat of being shot if they went out - and some were! Then, as I am sure you are well aware, everyone there was under a complete curfew for four days just prior to the time our soldiers and Marines arrived. The people could not come out of their homes or even be seen on porches or in their windows without being shot. This was a terrible hardship to many there who are without running water, electricity and toilet facilities in their homes, especially those with small children, who ran out of food and water! Those were the most terrifying days of the entire Communist occupation for the Grenadians.

The most heartbreaking event of all which brought tears to our eyes and made us simply enraged at those heartless Communists, was the true story of what happened with our accidental bombing of their mental hospital on a high mountain overlooking St. George's harbor. The ancient Fort Frederick on that mountain, next to the mental hospital, was being used as one of the headquarters for the Communists. Somehow they learned that our planes were headed there for a bombing so they took their flag off the fort and placed it atop the hospital! Of course, our plane headed for that target and dropped the first bomb on it. When the pilot saw the nurses running out of the hospital building he tried to avert a second strike by swerving his plane, but the second bomb had already been automatically released. It did miss the hospital a second time but hit some nearby houses which caused some civilian casualties.

After returning home from our trip, we were so filled with the pride of being American citizens, so grateful to God for living in a free country which, even though we do have our problems, is still the best country on earth in which to live, and so grateful to you as a strong President who is unafraid to make right decisions even though they may sometimes be politically unpopular at the time, that we simply had to write and express our feelings and our sincere thanks to you. God bless you, Mr. President, and may He continue to guide you and all the leaders of our country in making the best, moral decisions for our country and the world.
