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

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



Big Trip Almost Last One

No Drugs, Wrestler Back on Top

EDMOND — Dwayne Orr hit the bottom two vears ago this month.

He sat in the principal's office at Edmond High School, a victim of a Valium overdose.

"I thought I was going to die," said Orr. "I took too much Valium. I wasn't aware of anything going on around me. My life was gone."

It wasn't gone. The road back wasn't easy. But Dwayne Orr has made it. He's a normal teen-ager finishing his senior year at Edmond High School.

He's also one of the state's top wrestlers.

"I can actually laugh these days without getting high," said Orr. "I can sit around and have a conversation with my friends without getting stoned. I'm a normal teen-ager. I can still get in trouble in class or be late for a class but it is

"I feel like a million dollars. I live for one day at a time. I don't worry about my past. I live for this day and the next one. I'm striving to be a good human being.

It wasn't always this way. Orr can't remember the first time he did drugs. He can't remember

how he became a drug addict.
"I was just around it," he said. "I'm not really sure how it happened. By the sixth or seventh

grade I experimented with a lot of drugs.
"By the ninth grade, I had thrown away all the ones I didn't like and kept the ones I did like. It is Although it was Valium that caused his downfall really got bad that year.

Orr, an outstanding baseball player as well as

wrestler, started losing interest in sports. His performance on the field and mat started reflecting the trouble he was having away from school.

"I was coaching him in baseball in junior high," said Byron Graham, Edmond's high school wrestling coach. "He lost all of his desire in the ninth grade. He lost everything he had. He was a good wrestler. He finished second in the Perry Tourna-

"But he was losing it all that year. He tended to gripe a lot. He wasn't real receptive to anything. He had no goals. He became a burden to his coaches and teammates."

Orr admitted the drugs sapped him of his desire and goals. He said he cared more about the drugs than his family, sports, school, everything


"In the eighth grade I was just smoking a lot of grass," said Orr. "I could hide that in sports. As long as I did good in baseball and wrestling, everyone thought Dwayne's doing OK. Then, drugs became more important to me than my

"I can't even remember the ninth grade. I don't remember school at all. Every morning be-fore school I would go to the park with friends and get high. Pretty soon I was tired all of the time and I had to be high just to be normal. By the 10th

grade, I was history. I was gone."

It came crashing down the following year.

at school, he claims "I didn't even really like Valiums. It was drugs and I had to have it. I liked coke (cocaine) and LSD. I really think LSD is what

Orr's parents did what they felt best. He started Chris parents did what they felt best. He started this sophomore year at the Oklahoma Christian School in Edmond. "One good thing came out that," he said. "I took a blg step and became a Christian I accepted Christ into my life." Christian. I accepted Christ into my life.

But he was still on drugs. He didn't like the school and he moved back to Edmond High School. He was kicked out of school after the overdose incident and finished the year at a continuation school. He went to counseling every Tuesday and Thursday.

"I wanted to quit," said Orr. "At this point I was so strung out that everything was gone. I didn't think there was any way back. I gave everyone the runaround."

He was reaching the end and knew it. He was Esent into a drug rehabilitation center at Presbyterian Hospital in Oklahoma City at the start of the & back on the team. He really started coming on

"The people at that center said I was too rebellious," said Orr. "They wanted me to cut my hair and I wouldn't. I thought rehabilitation came from within and I didn't think it was important."

After a month, he was transferred to the Ado-lescent Care Unit at Hillcrest Medical Center in Tulsa. He was about to be saved.

"I met a lady there that turned my life around," said Orr. "Nora Bullock. She's the greatest lady in the world.

"I don't know what it really was. She just Beams. understood me. She was always talking to me. She "I wi was like a second mom to me. I don't know how long I was there, I think maybe two months. I was different. I changed."

Orr got a two-day summer vacation once he got

home to Edmond before starting back to school. "The other kids would stare at me and wonder 🖟 what I was doing back in school," said Orr. "I had to prove to them that I had kicked it. They couldn't believe that it was true, that I really was off drugs.

"They noticed my eyes had cleared up. After a while they realized it was true. I made friends again. I had a new life, a better life."

He spent the first semester on probation. He was allowed to work out with the wrestling team but only after school. He would miss 45 minutes of practice every day because he was taking six full hours of academics. Then, the second semes-

ter he was allowed to rejoin the wrestling team.
"He had to prove that it was all behind him," said Graham. "He asked me if he could come back out and I told him I wasn't sure. I wanted to make sure he had it all cleared up. That whole semester he worked out after school and would

stay late to work after practice.
"When the second semester began, I let him and had a great attitude."

He finished the season as a state runnerup, losing to Midwest City's Darryl Clark in the finals. He handed Shawnee's Brett Beams his only loss of the season in the semis.

He later starred on Edmond's state tournament baseball team, starting a game in the state tour-

He's come back determined as ever this year. He's 11-1 and has won the Geary and Anadarko tournaments. He's twice beaten Perry state champ Scott Chenoweth. His only loss is 7-6 to

"I will work harder," said Orr. "I really want to be a state champ. That's a goal of mine.

"I now have other goals. I want to go to college and wrestle in college. I have my life back. want to do something with it."


