Dear Mrs. Keller:

Thank you for writing. I hope I can respond to some of your concerns. With regard to mortgages on second homes, the interest will not be deductible in our tax proposal with one exception. We have asked for a \$5,000 cap on mortgage interest on first homes. If the interest is less than that and there is a second home, the remainder can be applied to that second mortgage.

Our proposal with regard to insurance is that a portion of the interest which accrues to the policy each year will be taxed as income. Our thinking is that interest on investments or bank accounts is so taxed. On insurance policies, the accumulated interest is taxed if the policy is cashed in but not if the policy is paid after death. However, this tax will not be applied to insurance already in effect but only to policies bought in the future.

I assure you we really are trying for fairness in the tax code.

Dear Reverend Miller:

I'm pleased to tell you we have eliminated the provision in the Treasury tax proposal that would have imposed a tax on fraternal benefit societies. It will not be a part of our tax reform proposal and if any in Congress should try to reinstitute it, I will oppose it.

As to the tax on increases in life insurance value, such increases — meaning the interest which accrues each year, is presently subject to tax. Let me explain, if a policy is cashed in during the life of the insured, the total increase is subject to tax. It is not taxed, however, when the policy is paid as the result of death of the insured.

Our proposal calls for an annual tax on a portion of the interest which is added each year. Also, it affects only new policies and not those presently in force. In today's world, life insurance is being marketed like all other investments. We believe that fairness is served in this, since interest on savings accounts or other investments is presently taxed.

I hope this answers some of your concerns.

Dear Mr. President,

As a member of the Aid Association for Lutherans, I am very much concerned about two tax changes now being proposed by the Treasury Department.

One proposal would eliminate tax exemption for fraternal benefit societies, such the Aid Association for Lutherans. This proposal would jeopardize the fraternal programs of these societies, such as scholarships and benevolent grants. You have urged the private sector to assume a greater role in assisting needy people, so that such people would be less dependent on government benefits. Last Thanksgiving I was able to distribute \$25 food certificates to several needy families in my community because of a grant made possible by a fraternal benefit society. Such a grant would be jeopardized if fraternal benefit societies lose their tax exempt status.

Another proposal would tax increases in life insurance values. I am worried about this proposed change because it would affect the financial security for which I have planned, making it more difficult to maintain my vital life insurance protection. This proposed tax change is unfair because I am being taxed on something that I have not received, that is, the value of my life insurance.

I am very unhappy with these proposed tax changes, and I urge you to eliminate them from the total tax proposal before it goes to Congress.

I should like to bring to your attention a great Americam - my son Jimmy Libman. Let me tell you something about Jimmy.

Jimmy is twenty-eight years old and has been totally deaf since birth. He was in formal learning situations from the time he was three years old until he graduated as an optical technician at the age of twenty-five from The National Technical Institute for the Deaf which is part of Rochester Institute of Technology.

After graduation, Jimmy worked for two retail establishments making reading glasses but could not earn enough money to look forward to a life that could afford him the opportunity of getting married and having a family. He became very despondent.

It was at this time that my wife, Jim's mother, talked to Jimmy about starting his own business and hopefully build the business to a point where he could have a bright future and perhaps be in a position to give other hearing impaired young people an opportunity to work and grow.

The enclosed copies of articles about Jimmy tell the story of what has happened to him in less than a year and a half. In addition, CNN News did a story which appeared about twenty times on March 8th and 9th and Independent News Network did a nationwide release on Jim this past Friday evening. The Today Show wants him to appear very shortly and William S. Rukeyser talked about Jim and Gimmee Jimmy's Cookies on his CBS News radio program.

Jim does not employ a publicity firm and we can only surmise that people who visited Jim's bakery and saw his strobe light system and the deaf people working there, spread the story which was eventually picked up by Fortune Magazine. Obviously, it makes a great human interest story and is an inspiration to handicapped people.

More importantly than anything, however, is that when Jim's story was circulated by the media, he received calls from various schools for hearing impaired youngsters. They asked Jimmy to speak to their young students and let them know his story. Jim has already appeared at two schools and speakes

to the students in sign language. Needless to say, he "brought the house down" - so did his cookies that he baked and gave to the youngsters. He is planning to visit other such schools.

Since he opened his shop, there has been a constant parade of parents who heard about Jimmy and who brought their hearing impaired children to meet him and to see firsthand what can be accomplished. He has also conducted tours of his cookie factory for classes of both hearing and hearing impaired elementary students.

Mr. President and Mrs. Reagan, because of all that I have written here and because Jim is truly a fine human being who has overcome a severe handicap to be part of our great free enterprise system, I say again that he is a great American and I wanted you to know about him.



While I recognize the fact that this cut may make attending college difficult for some students, I also believe that several other alternatives currently do exist. For example, I served three years in the U.S. Navy and saved some money while also participating in the tuition aid program (Chapter 32). I was not eligible for the G.I. Bill because I had entered the military after it had expired. However, I was still able to obtain \$8,100.00 to start school.

Watching your reception of the Villanova basketball team on TV Thursday morning made me decide to write this letter.

Before the reception the CNN newscaster made comments about today being "Nicaragua's day" in Washington.
